If you have, you will enjoy it even more the more you sing it. The Wednesday service itself is more casual than Sunday service and the sermon more conversational. For these reasons, these are the perfect services to invite friends, especially friends with minimal church background.

So, join us for the season of Lent as we prepare our hearts and minds and souls for the resurrection of our Lord!




### February 18 and 21—PERPETUA AND FELICITY (c.202)

The noble woman and nursing mother, Perpetua, a slave Felicity, and several other catechumens and believers were martyred in a Carthage amphitheater by being thrown to wild beasts. Her writings and narrative of her martyrdom are among the most revered of all Christian literature.



Augustine, named one of the four great Doctors of the Western Church, is arguably the most influential Christian theologian of all time. His symbol recalls his sense of the believer's heart aflame with the love of God. His mother, Monica, is remembered for the perseverance of her prayers towards her son's conversion.

### March 11 and 14—JOHN DONNE (1572-1633)

John Donne, dean of St. Paul's Cathedral in London, was an eloquent preacher. He is honored especially for his poetry, which exemplified the 17th century style of complex syntax and eloquent metaphors.



### March 18 nd 21—NICOLAUS COPERNICUS (1473-1543)

Copernicus was a church administrator, working in politics, canon law, medicine and economics. Before his death he published his astronomical study, which demonstrated that the sun, not the earth, is the center of our solar system.

### February 25 and 28—AUGUSTINE (354-430) AND MONICA (331-387)

March 4 and 7—FRANCIS (1181-1226) AND CLARE (1193-1253) OF ASSISI Francis is perhaps the most beloved of all the saints. He is founder of the Order of Friars Minor (Franciscans) and took literally a verse from the gospels to live in complete poverty. Clare, inspired by Francis, established an order of women dedicated to contemplative prayer, radical poverty, manual labor, and extreme austerity. "Praise and bless my Lord and give him thanks and serve him with great humility."



### **FEBRUARY MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT**

### Erin Mitchell talks about Lutheran Social Services

Erin Mitchell is a clinical therapist with Lutheran Social Services of Northwest Ohio. She works in the Findlay office. She offers her thoughts about this vital local ministry:

1. Tell us about LSS. What are some of the services of LSS, especially in the Findlay office? Lutheran Social Services' Findlay office currently offers counseling services for adolescents and adults. We are currently seeking to add a therapist who works with children to our team. We provide counseling for individuals dealing with depression, anxiety, life transitions, family issues, trauma, chronic pain, grief, anger management, substance abuse, and other issues. In addition to meeting with clients in our office inside St. John's Lutheran Church, two of our therapists provide counseling on site to clients (both individuals and groups) who live at St. Catherine's Manor in Findlay. Lutheran Social Services also operates an Emergency Choice food pantry at the Findlay office, which eligible Hancock County residents may utilize once a month.

2. Where do your funds come from? Lutheran Social Services is funded by the LSS Foundation through individual. church, and corporate donations. Gifts may be general or targeted for a particular office or ministry (such as Findlay Food Pantry.) LSS also receives reimbursement for counseling services through private insurance, Medicaid, Medicare, and self pay. The LSS Food Pantry is staffed almost entirely by church and community volunteers (and we always have room for more!)

3. What is your position (and why did you choose to do this work)? I am a clinical therapist with LSS. I chose to go into this field because I was helped by counseling at a very difficult time in my life, and felt that my calling was to help others in the same way. As a Christian, when the position at LSS became available I welcomed the opportunity to work for a Christian organization and incorporate clients' spirituality into the counseling process.

4. What are some of the most pressing and serious issues, needs, problems, concerns in the Findlay area? How does LSS address these? The opioid epidemic continues to affect our community significantly. PTSD (posttraumatic stress disorder) is more common than many people think, occurring in individuals affected by such traumas as rape, domestic violence, child abuse, and natural disasters, as well as in active duty and veteran military service personnel. Depression and anxiety are also prevalent in our community. All forms of mental health issues are in many ways a "silent epidemic," as individuals fear the stigma society still attaches to mental illness.

Food pantry clients must meet state and federal income guidelines for food assistance. Those who do not meet these requirements are referred to other community agencies for help with food. A large number of our counseling clients fall under Medicaid income requirements and many also receive food stamps or other assistance. We have a sliding fee scale to make our counseling services more available to those who are without any form of insurance. When a client has a need that our agency cannot address, we make every effort to refer them to other community agencies and connect them with helpful resources.

5. Martin Luther said, "But know that to serve God is nothing else than to serve your neighbor and do good to him in love, be it a child, wife, servant, enemy, friend....If you do not find yourself among the needy and the poor, where the Gospel shows us Christ, then you may know that your faith is not right, and that you have not yet tasted of Christ's benevolence and work for you." How is this so at LSS? Like Martin Luther's original followers, our clinicians, support staff, volunteers, and clients come from "all levels of society."

Where do our offerings go? In 2017, First Lutheran budgeted \$750 for LSS. Our Cross of Love contributions totaled \$1151. The Christmas Love and Memory Tree totaled \$1680. We contribute to this vital ministry in many other ways, including personal gifts, volunteer hours by members and also by giving through our Synod Mission Share.

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## Repeat The Sounding 6

Well, good day to everyone. How kind of you to take time to read my ramblings today. It is February and I am still thinking about Christmas. You see, a friend of mine gave me a beautiful snowflake ornament Christmas gift with the words

"repeat the sounding joy" scripted across the front. Snce then, I have thought about those words quite a bit. What do they mean? With nothing to do for a 'minute' the other day, I googled the phrase. Lo and behold, I found an article online entitled "Repeat the Sounding Joy" by Jamie Hughes that explores what the phrase meant to the shepherds and what it means to us today.

I am going to attempt to summarize Hughes article to help explain my sudden fascination with this phrase. So...the shepherds kept watch over their sheep that night as they always did. They probably spent the evening star-gazing. But this one night, the spot where they sat suddenly overflowed with the light of heaven and the glory of God. And "the angel of the Lord came upon them." (Luke 2:9)

And the shepherds burst with joy. Did they remember the Old Testament prophecy or was the need to go to Bethlehem part of the message of that night? Either way, they, lowly shepherds, got to share the good news. They were God's first tellers. They were chosen to share the "the good news of great joy." One young man tells their story as he talks to no one on a dead cell phone. The PETER JENKINS readers hear of the poverty and politics these desperate people are leaving behind.

Now the "big corporation" has introduced genetically-modified corn into the Mexican fields, a corn whose seed cannot be saved as in the past history of the country and then planted next year. At times the story is hard to process, for it is not a fun read. Eyeopening to say the least.

And I have begun, again I might add, The Walk Across China by Peter Jenkins. This time I will finish without interruptions...I last picked up the book when I was also reading The Summit, covering the climb of Mount Everest by a blind man. Once I realized Jenkins was also traveling to Everest I had to say "no way". Now I can finish without everyone on Mount Everest at the same time!




