Resilient Ancestors

If you haven't seen on YouTube the video "Praise Song for the Pandemic" written and read by Christine Valters Paintner, you are encouraged to do so. Paintner reads:

Give thanks for your ancestors for the wars and plagues they endured and survived, their resilience is in your bones, your blood ... 1

In May we give thanks for our mothers, their mothers and their mothers. We can go back to the first. Eve was the mother of all living.

And Adam called his wife's name Eve, because she was the mother of all living. (Genesis 3:20)

Mary faced the uncertainty of becoming with child without being married. She survived giving birth to her Son in a stable. As if that wasn't enough, when she and Joseph took Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem to present Him to the Lord, the devout man called Simeon forewarned, "yes, a sword will pierce through your own soul." (Luke 2:35)

Mary's heart was pierced when her Son was mocked, spat upon, beaten and scourged. Her own soul was pierced when her pure Son was crowned with a crown of thorns and nailed to the cross for the sins of all humans.


Give thanks for mothers and their resiliency.

"As the week of March 16 began, I made my last visit to the grocery store on that Monday. It was a different shopping trip. My mind was focused on staples, dried beans and canned goods, meats I could make into dishes that I could freeze. I arrived home with the groceries and felt good that we were well stocked and sort of looked forward to having more meals at home. That week was like being on vacation, free to do as you wanted, no where you had to go, nothing that had to be done on a time schedule, just sweet freedom. I liked it. The second week, beginning March 23, when the official closures were in place, I became aware of home as sanctuary. Since I meet the "at risk" criteria, Steve became the shopper. I took pleasure in cooking each day. It was during this week that we realized we had lost weight, not because we were dieting, but because our diet had improved. I was so grateful that at this point in my life, I was blessed with a comfortable, safe, secure home that brought me not only shelter but pleasure, and the luxury of retirement. I was also aware of all the young people who were struggling to deal with school closures, day care, whether their job could continue and how they were going to support their families and meet their needs. Also, all the people in the medical community, firemen, police, all those who serve the community, the challenges and dangers they were facing with exposure to the virus as a further danger. My being in sanctuary gave me the opportunity to spend more time in prayer for all those, and others, on my heart and mind. The pleasure of reading scripture and allowing it to resonate and comfort, not just myself, but reading it for the good of the world during this time, trusting that God will use this for our benefit and good in some way. Psalm 91 has been a regular passage. The fourth week brought Steve's birthday on April 7th. I arranged a "drive by" birthday gathering and we served pre-sliced cake to each car. This is one he will never forget. The blessing of friends and family gave me comfort and strength every day. Finding ways to stay in touch and stay well is a challenge but also, its own comfort. We are all in this together and our Mighty God holds us all in His hands. My prayer continues to be that we are better for this; that we yearn to keep the gifts we have found in this time, by continuing to live in a way that retains them for our good and the good of God's entire world." "I made a couple of grocery runs for Toni Knie. Toni lives in an apartment at Danberry, but early on they weren't providing very good meals and no fruit for residents. I talked with Mary Hall, (our late friend, Harriett's daughter-in-law), and she volunteered to shop every week for Toni. She likes her milk to drink and fruit and cookies. Easy to shop for her basic needs! Mary's offer was greatly appreciated as Danberry is about an hour from Steele, and Mary is quite a few years younger than I am. She has even delivered flowers along with Toni's groceries. Toni is making the best of their "lock down". The Steele Food Pantry operated on schedule April 17. The coordinator, her husband, granddaughter and church member filled bags for the clients. We had bought ahead when stuff was "on sale" so had a pretty good supply of food on hand. They only had four volunteers at the delivery point and 36 vehicles drove up (served 111 people) and had the bags placed in their trunk. Everybody got four bags and large families got five. They did not want to send anybody to Birmingham to pick up food at the food bank in April.
