

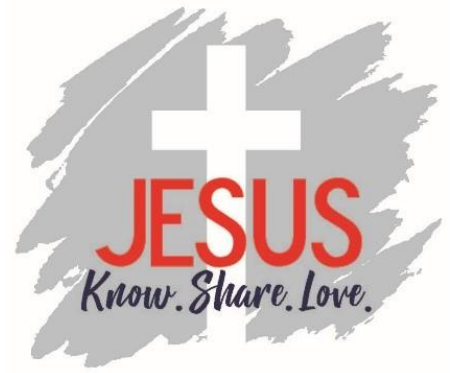

God's Encouraging Word ... *when I am frightened*

“Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.” - Isaiah 41:10

Soon, students and teachers will be headed back to the classroom. Some students will be getting on a bus for the first time, some will be away from Mom and Dad for the first time, or they are headed to a new school and a new classroom. Many of those children will be very anxious. The other side of that classroom door is completely unknown. The worst could possibly happen. They will wonder if they can even do it!

Likely, the same can be said every time we have an opportunity to talk about Jesus. We're afraid. More than that, terrified. What if the worst happens? We could look so foolish. We could stammer and trip over our words. We could say things all wrong, or run into a question to which we don't have an answer. We could lose a friend or come off as "weird." What if people find out that we believe Jesus with all our heart but still sin against him? What if they call us hypocrites?

It is to such terror-stricken, spiritually terrified people that God speaks through the prophet Isaiah: "Do not fear, because I am with you."

Picture a new kindergartener walking onto the school grounds and confronted by a couple of students intent on taking his lunch? Just in time, the youngster's older brother in sixth grade walks up to ward off the bullies.

God is with us, just like the big brother was with his little brother. Except our God is infinitely more powerful, infinitely more wise, infinitely more caring. He is not just our big brother, he is our God. The creator-of-all-things has our back! The courage we need to speak up about our faith rests in the one in whom we believe—the one who came to be with us to rescue us from sin and death. In his great love for us, he strengthens and helps us, and keeps us safe.

So, do not be afraid. Don't be afraid this fall or at any time to talk about the Savior who has come to rescue all humanity. Do not be afraid. He is with you.

Influencing God's Children

Sunday Morning Bible Class

A Bible Study for Families

July 22 Lesson One—Influences: Past and Present

Many things influence our attitudes and actions. The greatest influence, though, continues to be our parents. God wants Christian parents to influence their children to faith and godly living. Scripture gives us many good examples of the outcome of a godly influence in a child's life. It also displays for us the results of ungodly influences.

July 29 Lesson Two—The Importance of Parental Influence

Parents have been given the primary responsibility for instructing, encouraging, and disciplining their children and for influencing them in the faith and in God-pleasing living. Christian parents are not without God's help as they work to do this. God's Word gives us direction through clear statements and examples. God also teaches us how to correct our children when they do wrong.

August 5 Lesson Three—Train With the Law and the Gospel

Parents influence their children best through daily exposure to God's Word. There they hear God's law and God's gospel. They see examples of judgment over sin and of blessing to those who follow God's laws out of love for their Savior.

When parents must discipline their children, they have an opportunity to show their children God's law and gospel in action. They rebuke and curb wrong behavior while always giving their children the encouragement that comes from God's forgiveness.

August 12 Lesson Four—Teach Children to Know the Will of God

There are many ways to influence our children in their faith and life. Teach them God's Word. Model your own faith. Discuss the truth with your children at every opportunity. Share insights you have into God's blessings in Christ. Use teachable moments to instruct your children, either in what Jesus has done for them or in how Jesus wants them to live. Focus on teaching your children Bible lessons. Support your children's teachers at Sunday school or your Lutheran elementary school. Be aware of what they are teaching your children and work with them as the opportunity presents itself. Help your children with memory work assignments.

August 19 Lesson Five—Help Children Improve; Teach Respect

Our sinful nature makes growth in faith difficult. Yet we should never despair, because the Lord is with us and he promises to forgive us and help us. We should help children show respect toward those in positions of authority.

August 26 Lesson Six—Virtues to Instill in Our Children

Those who influence children want the children to be obedient. They want them first to be obedient to God's will and second to the will of those over them. In this area, as in all other areas, children are influenced through the gospel and through our gentle and sensitive way of dealing with them. Other areas of influence include helping them be truthful in what they say and diligent when given a task or job to perform.

We had a fantastic mission trip and youth rally! We visited the Creation Museum and Ark Encounter (full size replica of Noah's Ark) in Kentucky. We helped with Ascension Lutheran Church's Soccer Camp in Jacksonville, NC. Some of our teens also helped provide them with music for church and Pastor Brandt

preached. We also had lots of fun and recreation. We visited the beach a couple of times; toured a WWII battleship; saw some retired helicopters at the airfield connected with Camp Lejeune; and played lots of bean bags. Our teens were able to do some learning, serving and relaxing. They were a great



service to Ascension Lutheran, bonded with each other and the teens from Ascension.



Four of us went to the WELS International Youth Rally in Bowling Green, OH. It consisted of opening and closing services, two keynote presentations and the opportunity to choose 4



out of 12 other smaller group sessions. We were tired by the time we arrived at the youth rally, but found it encouraging and refreshing to gather around God's word with 2,000+ other WELS teens.

Thank you to everyone who helped make this trip possible through donations and items for the silent auction. Thank you to all who kept us in your prayers. A special thank you to Ascension Lutheran for taking excellent care of us while we were there. We also stayed at other WELS churches as we were travelling – Amazing Grace in Florence, KY and Peace of our Savior in New Carlisle, OH. They were extremely kind and hospitable to let us use their facilities which also helped to keep the price of the trip down.



The trip was a blessing in many different ways, both for our teens and for Ascension Lutheran. We would love to do more trips like this in the future. Unfortunately, funds for the Youth Group were one of the many things that could not be increased in this next budget. (The Youth



Group is budgeted to receive \$1000.) If we want to do more trips like this in the future, we will either need to get additional funds put back into the budget, rely on your direct donations or expect the teens and their families to pay for the brunt of the expenses.

Please continue to keep our teens in your prayers and offer your encouragement as they continue to look for ways to serve our Savior in their lives and through our congregation.



July 2018 - Lutheran Mobile Clinic

Central Africa Medical Mission (CAMM) – Malawi

Earlier this month Beth and I returned to the United States for a very brief visit to attend our youngest sons' graduation. We stayed in Thiensville, Wisconsin with Beth's brother Pastor Kurt Ebert and while there, we attended a CAMM fundraising rummage sale held at his church - Christ Alone in Thiensville. When we spoke to the folks who were running the sale, they wondered how the \$3,000, typically raised by the sale, might be spent. That question started me thinking that perhaps many of the groups and individuals who support CAMM might like to know how their gifts and donations are used. So, for those who are curious, here is a little Lutheran Mobile Clinic by numbers:

4,000 to 5,000: That's how many patients we have seen on average per month over the last 3 months. We are seeing the number of Malaria patients drop off as we move into the dry season (winter) here.

\$3,000: Will pay our fuel bill for around 5 months. We operate clinics in four Villages each of which is about a 45 to 50-mile round trip from the house. We have two rugged Toyota Landcruisers. These are the ambulances of choice over here, they can carry up to 12 people plus all of our equipment and medications over some very rough roads. As you might suspect, they are thirsty beasts.

\$3000, will also pay for about 6 months of vehicle maintenance. The dirt roads are hard on vehicles and parts are not cheap.

\$1000: Will pay salaries and some benefits for all of our Malawian staff for about a week. We have twenty-one people on the payroll –nurse/midwives, clinician, nutritionist, registrar, driver, clinic maintenance men, clinic nutrition workers, guards, a gardener and a house keeper.

\$350: Will pay for our pharmaceutical supplies for a week. Malaria medications are provided by USAID and vaccinations are provided by the Malawi government. All other medications are paid for by the clinic and provided for free.

200: That's roughly how many pill bottles we hand out a week. We use them for liquid medications that we buy in larger bottles and then pour into the smaller pill bottles that are sent from the United States.

\$100: Will provide us with a 3-month supply of maize and soy for our nutrition program.

\$75: Will pay the weekly salary of a nurse/midwife who has bachelor's degree in nursing.

\$50: Will provide infant formula to three babies for a month. As part of our nutrition program we currently provide infant formula to 6 orphan babies who are under 6 months.

\$20: Will pay for the quarterly gift given to each of our four clinic volunteers for their help in running clinic. The gifts consist of tea, rice, soap, salt, Vaseline, washing powder, sugar, matches and oil – mundane gifts by US standards but valuable in a Malawian Village.

\$7: Will pay for a locum Nurse/midwife for a day. When our staff is on vacation or sick, clinic operations must go on, so we hire fill in (locum) staff for the day.

Our annual budget for in-country operations is a little about \$130,000. In-country does not include Beth or my payroll. We are a low cost, low overhead operation dedicated to showing Gods love and serving our Lord by providing quality healthcare to the people of Msambo, Suzi, Mwaulomwe and Thunga Villages, and with God's blessing and your gifts we are doing just that.

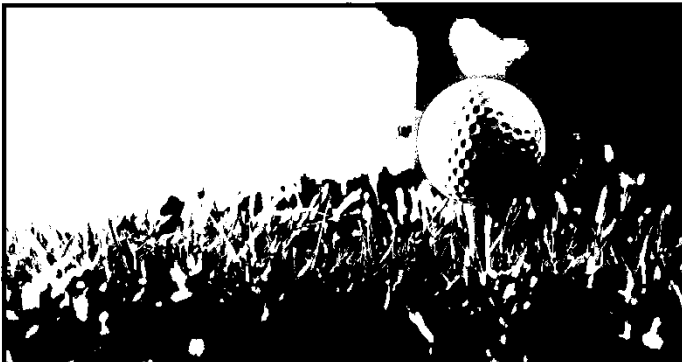

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Needing to Share Jesus

When it became about sharing Jesus with another broken heart, God's Word worked.

We met at a church carnival and got to talking in the line to get a gyro. He hadn't been with a group of people who loved Jesus and were kind to him like us in his life, so he was willing to have me come over to his house and visit. Before long, we were going through a Bible Study about who Jesus is, who we really are in God's eyes, and what God has done for us through Jesus. Each time we met, there were more questions and old stories about things he'd seen or done that he didn't understand. As we talked about God's Word, the Spirit answered his questions and healed his heart. Before long, he was gathering with us to worship and taking every devotional book or magazine he could get as his desire to remain connected to Jesus grew.

We pray together that our eyes stay open to see the opportunities all around us - like meeting someone in line at a church carnival waiting to get a gyro. When we realize our calling is to tell someone else about something that changed our own lives, the conversations turns from wanting to share Jesus, to *needing* to share Jesus.

When we want to share Jesus, it seems that the conversations take place too soon or are disconnected from the situation. When we realize what God has done to repair our own broken hearts, it becomes easier to recognize what the brokenness looks like in others. And when we see the needs of others, we are able to help because our shared *need* is only met with the Word of God.

Sharing Jesus became real when I had a real conversation with someone. I pray God continues to keep my eyes open to see broken hearts and to share Jesus with them. I also pray that God reminds you of your broken heart and his power alone to heal you - and I pray you see the brokenness in others to share with them the only Words that work:

The Spirit of the Sovereign Lord is on me, because the Lord has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners.
