When I lived in San Francisco we often came up to partake in various wine club festivities and see an occasional art show on the Plaza. After living here now for four years I've learned that there is so much more to Sonoma, you just have to dig a little deeper.

My discovery of things to do here started with joining the Sonoma Valley Jazz Society and volunteering. I help out by serving wine at the shows. I've produced a show (a good learning experience) and participate on their board as their marketing director. The Society produces a free show on the second Tuesday of the month at the Plaza during the summer months. We have a show coming up on September 10th starting at 6:00 p.m. Why not come and check it out. You can go to

Next, I joined Newcomers. The organization has a quarterly luncheon and several other activities you can participate in. They have monthly meetings and a monthly Happy Hour.

Terri Barnett and I recently went to an interesting fundraiser for Pets Lifeline. It was held at the *Moon House* in Glen Ellen (located

next door to the Glen Ellen Market.) Behind the big iron entry gates lies a magnificent mansion that is a true work of art! It was designed and





built by Douglas Fenn Wilson who is an accomplished author and artist. It was a fun evening with a harpist, delicious hors d'oeuvres and wine. We got to roam around the entire house and the host's studio. Fascinating!

Since I'm short on space, I'll just briefly tell you about two other events I went to that were interesting and a lot of fun. If you haven't been to our Sonoma Valley Museum of Art on Broadway, run don't walk and catch the current exhibit of Oakland-based artist, Arthur Monroe (until September 8). Monroe's work followed the mid-century cultural movement of the New York School of Abstract Expressionism and the modern Jazz and Beat cultures in New York and the Bay Area. I attended a program featuring his son and two of Monroe's contemporaries. They shared how the Jazz and Beat movements influenced Monroe's work.

We've all seen the ads and posters for the performance group, *Transcendence* playing at the Field of Dreams, but have you actually seen their shows? The show I saw was fantastic! Such talented performers, all of whom have appeared on Broadway. They're only here for a short while longer and I urge you to go.

We have a monthly colorful and informative newsletter with the exceptional work of both editor **Valerie Camarda** and proofreader **Linda Jackson**. Every month a multi-page publication comes out to inform us of things happening in our neighborhood and in our surrounding area.

Linda Jackson also takes care of all Clubhouse reservations.

Our landscape is always looking top notch and leading that effort is **Tom Flinn**. This position works with the handling of requests for

changes or improvements from the Community, and Tom works closely with the Board on expenses and funding of the work. He also works with the landscape contractors on various things that need to be done.

Social Activities are led by **Lois Rogers** who organizes our Monthly "First Friday" Socials, and other holiday celebrations throughout the year, including our upcoming barbecue in September, and our Holiday Party in December.

TREASURER'S REPORT AS OF JULY 31, 2024

There was one reserve expense in July in the amount of \$3,788.50. This was for an automatic chlorine and acid pump for the pool. The amount in the reserve fund was still in good shape at \$570,351 at the end of July. Also, as discussed and approved at the July Board Meeting, the funds from our U.S. Bank certificate of deposit that matured in July were deposited into a new 12-month CD using the CDARS network at Heritage Bank. The CD was purchased from Western Alliance Bank (Phoenix, AZ) in the amount of \$117,600 at an annual rate of 4.81%. The transaction was fairly easy and straightforward, so we will probably continue to use the CDARS through Heritage Bank for the purchase of future CDs. The next CD that will be maturing is a Poppy Bank CD in September of this year.

Operating expenses through the end of July were still mostly under budget (by about \$5,028), but the under-budget amount has been getting tighter over the past few months and will probably disappear in the next month or two. I'm expecting expenses to "catch-up" after the slow spring period, especially in the utility and landscape categories, so we will be keeping a sharp eye on expenses over the next few months. Our operating cash stands at about \$26,725. Subtracting current liabilities of \$20,729 from this amount leaves us with ready cash of about \$5,996, which means we may have to dip into our ready reserves to pay upcoming bills.

We are still dealing with a number of homeowners who are behind in payments for one reason or another, but the delinquency total did decrease from \$7,723 last month to \$4,955 this month. We discussed at the last meeting the delinquent notification process used by our new bookkeeper, and perhaps the system is starting to work. We also voted to levy a lien against the homeowner with the longest and largest delinquency record, but the homeowner paid up and the lien is no longer necessary.

I've also had the sprinkler heads tested again and we found many in need of replacement. Some were even buried under the lawn so they weren't getting any water to the lawns. They packed them all up and I carried them all over Italy, on a train even. Never thought they'd be so big when wrapped. They went with me in the overhead bin and landed safely in our home. So here's a picture of my fall flowers in the kitchen window. The pretty pot hides the cheap greenhouse liner that fits it perfectly. I have six liners so I can grow replacements, ready when I need them. Be well and enjoy our beautiful Sonoma fall.

SAFETY AND WELFARE

This just in from Newser.com:

Federal regulators approved updated COVID-19 vaccines on Thursday, shots designed to more closely target recent virus strains—and ideally whatever variants cause trouble this winter, too. With the Food and Drug Administration's clearance, Pfizer and Moderna are set to begin shipping millions of doses, which should be available in days. A third US manufacturer, Novavax, expects its modified vaccine version to be available a little later, the <u>AP</u> reports. "We strongly encourage those who are eligible to consider receiving an updated COVID-19 vaccine to provide better protection against currently circulating variants," said Dr. Peter Marks, the FDA's vaccine chief.

The agency's decision came a bit earlier than last year's rollout of updated COVID-19 vaccines, as a summer wave of the virus continues in most of the country. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention already has recommended this fall's shot for everyone 6 months and older. While most Americans have some immunity from prior infections or vaccinations or both, that protection wanes. Last fall's shots targeted a different part of the coronavirus family tree, a strain that's no longer circulating, and CDC data shows only about 22.5% of adults and 14% of children received it. Experts answered questions, per the AP, concerning:

- **Skipping the new shot**: That's "a hazardous way to go," said Dr. Robert Hopkins Jr. of the National Foundation for Infectious Diseases. Even if a person's last infection was mild, the next might be worse or leave the unvaccinated with long COVID symptoms.
- **How soon to be vaccinated**: This summer's wave of COVID-19 isn't over, but the inevitable winter surges tend to be worse. And while COVID-19 vaccines do a good job preventing severe disease, hospitalization and death, protection against mild infection lasts only a few months.
- **People at high risk**: Those in this group shouldn't wait but instead schedule vaccinations once shots are available in their area, Hopkins advised. That includes older adults, people with weak immune systems or other serious medical problems, nursing home residents, and pregnant women.
- Younger, healthier people: Children and younger adults with no major issues "can get vaccinated anytime," Hoskins said. There's no reason to wait, he added—though it's OK to seek the shots in the fall, when plenty of doses will have arrived at pharmacies and doctor's offices.
- An exception: The CDC says anyone who recently had COVID-19 can wait three months after recovery before getting vaccinated, until immunity from that infection begins to wane.
- **Flu, too**: Health authorities say it's fine to get COVID-19 and flu vaccinations at the same time, a convenience so people don't have to make two trips.
