His resurrection from the grave confirmed that his work of salvation was finished and his ascension back to his Father marked his work on earth complete.

The disciples feared Jesus' departure and what the future would be without him, so none of them asked the question, "Where are you going, Lord?" Through faith in my ascended Savior not only do I ask that question, I rejoice in the answer.
