

Jesus has been teaching the crowds from a boat on the Sea of Galilee. Afterwards, he decides to set out in the boat to the other side of the lake. But people get into other boats and follow him - an indicator that the number of Jesus' followers is on the increase.

Suddenly, a violent storm erupts. These are common on the Sea of Galilee, which is about 200 metres below sea level. The hills around it reach to a height of about 800 metres where the air is cool and dry. However, at the level of the lake, the climate is semi-tropical and the air is warm and moist. The difference in height between the surrounding hills and the lake causes large temperature and pressure changes. These generate strong winds which funnel through the hills and drop down onto the lake, with violent results. As the lake is quite shallow (60 metres at most), the winds can whip up waves of two metres or more. This is the kind of storm that hits the boats. The waves are smashing against Jesus' boat and the vessel is gradually filling.

But Jesus is sound asleep in the stern on a cushion. This would seem impossible but Mark has added this detail for a purpose, Jesus has authority over all chaos, including the situation in which the disciples now find themselves. While they are his disciples and call him "teacher," they still have much to learn about him. In fact, their fear is so great that they doubt his willingness to save them. These disciples have seen all his miracles and have heard his teaching, yet they still do not recognise the presence of God's power in him.

When Jesus awakes, he rebukes the winds and the sea, and restores calm. His response to their tack of faith is harsh. There was no reason for the disciples to be afraid. "How is it that you have no faith?" he asks them. It's obvious they are still a long way off from the fullness of faith which he desires for them.

Jesus' words fill the disciples with awe. They wonder who he is, but the answer to their question is going to involve a long journey – one that will be filled with misunderstanding, fear and failure - before they finally come to true faith in him.

LEARN

God is with us always, in good times and bad

It is okay to experience doubts and difficulties so long as we continue to trust in God

PRAY

Pray for those who feel as if they are caught in a storm – the ill, depressed, suicidal, bullied, those who suffer discrimination or intimidation – that they may experience Jesus's soothing, calming, saving presence with them.

SAY

"Lord, help me to trust in you at all times."

REFLECT

ne of the most beloved characters in the classic BBC comedy series Dad's Army is the butcher Lance Corporal Jones. Jones is brave and full of enthusiasm for the fight against Hitler, but whenever action or danger is imminent he becomes near-hysterical and runs around frantically shouting, "Don't panic! Don't panic!" at the top of his voice, which, of course, only adds to the panic and confusion.

At the very moment when he needs to be calm and have his wits about him, Jones is the very opposite. He becomes a hindrance rather than a help.

While Jones is a fictional character, he is also relatable. We may know people somewhat like him; we may even fall into the same category ourselves. The one who can keep a calm head in times of crisis is someone we admire, someone we trust, someone who can be given a position of leadership or responsibility.

The disciples in today's Gospel panic when the storm brews. They are scared for their lives. No doubt they are aware of tragedies that have occurred on that very lake, of boats that went down during storms, of lives lost. They fear it will happen to them. They are incredulous that their master and teacher is able to sleep right through it. Doesn't he realise the danger they are in? When Jesus calms the storm, they are awestruck. Even after all this time, they still do not appreciate who Jesus really is. Their faith is still lacking.

All of us, at one time or another, in one way or another, will encounter storms along the journey of life. They are part of the human condition. Like Corporal Jones, we can feel overwhelmed, panicked, afraid. This is where our faith comes in. We are asked to trust in God's loving presence at all times, to trust that even in the most difficult situations God is with us, that God will never abandon us. Even when God appears to be sleeping, we know we need not be afraid.

DO

As Christians, we know that Jesus is with us in the midst of any storm in which we find ourselves. But he is more than with us; he calls on us to face that storm. To have courage. To trust. To be not afraid. Think of the challenges and difficulties you and your loved ones are facing at this time. Ask the Lord's help in facing them.
