


SACRAMENTO RIVER DELTA HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Invitations will be in the mail early in the new year, announcing the fourth annual meeting of the Sacramento River Delta Historical Society. Chairman Maryn Whitney is planning a renewal of 1979's successful potluck dinher to be held on Monday, January 21st, at St. Anthony's Parish Hall in Walnut Grove. Each family is asked to provide a main dish, saled, or dessert and to indicate their selection when responding to their community representative who will be listed on the invitation. Wine, bread, and coffee will be provided by the committee.

All members and friends are cordially invited to attend the evening's festivities which will begin at 6:30 p.m. Entertainment will be provided by the talented Clarksburg musical ensemble. The New Holland Combine. A slide show program of vintage photos will test the memories of long-time residents and history buffs. Mr. Verle Weight, Director of the LDS Geneological Library of Sacramento, gave an informative review of the process of "Discovering Your Roots" at the September 17th meeting held at the Isleton Community Center. He offered a list of cluding home sources, LDS resources, county records, state and national archives, and immigration reports. He emphasized that family trees should be personalized with information such as occupation or position and not just the statistics of names, dates, and locations.

Mr. Weight stated that in a few families it is possible to find information as far back as the 1500's, but that most histories will average six generations; a complete tree of 15 generations would include 16,383 ancestors!

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MUSEUM

Since opening for its third season the Dai Loy Museum has had 10,708 visit-The 1979 viewers have come from 37 states with Nevada, Oregon, and Washington leading the list, but also in-cluding guests from such diverse areas as North Dakota, Florida, and Maryland. Twenty-eight foreign countries were also represented in the current register; England, Taiwan, and Canada had the largest delegations, but Italy, South Africa, Brazil, Denmark, Panama, and the Seychelles Islands contributed travelers who were pleased to view the Locke, California gambling hall.

Maintenance work was done this spring with new picture captions being added, plastic overlays affixed to photographs, and additional display items catalogued. Work was suggested to improve the lighting above the award display without losing the total dim effect of the building. A new pedestal sign was made to replace the sidewalk banner which had become one tourist's souvenir when it was inadvertently left outdoors after closing.

From its many visitors, the museum has received \$1,579.40 in donations. It Ping Lee, Gerry Gardner, and Kay Wheelis the continued hope of the board that er. With changing conditions the rent has increased to \$100 a month, but repairs, utilities, and insurance expenses been kept to a minimum. Many hours of volunteer work have made it possible for all to enjoy this historic collection, and without such dedication the project would be impossible.

Ninety-one "sitters" have served the museum with most taking at least two The museum was open 73 days from March 17 to November 18, including 4th of July and Labor Day, but excluding Easter. Special tours have also been arranged for large groups from schools and other historical societies. The Staff is co-ordinated by Emeline Pylman.
