Gwendolyn Smith RCF

was born in the Mt. Gilead community, two miles west of Kearney; Clay County, MO. I was the 2nd child with two brothers. Our family moved to Browning, MO in 1937. Life centered around the farm, country school, mom's "Stitch & Chat-

ter" quilting club and the community 4-H clubs. My father and brother helped clear the right-of-way for the REA. The four years of WWII were my high-school years.

Upon graduation (1945), I accepted my grandparents invitation to spend the summer with them in Wichita, KS and go to work with my grandfather at Boeing Aircraft and save money for college. My work was the 11 hour night shift, carrying rivets to "Rosie and the other Riveters" to build part of the wing of a B-29 bomber. A wonderful summer and a great work experience. In late August, I cashed my paychecks and could afford a year at Mizzou.

The summer of 1946, I went with a group of student friends to sell magazines for Cappers Publishing Co. There was a manager that mapped the territories, made "Tourist court" or "Rooming house" reservations and furnished a 1946, ninepassenger Chrysler limousine for our travels in parts of Illinois, Indiana and Ohio. Our cost was \$.05 on the dollar of our sales. Our work: We used a memorized speech to give away a nice Searchlight cookbook with a five year subscription to Household magazine (cost \$5.00). The first time we earned it we were paid with a \$100 dollar bill. WOW!

By September we each had enough money (and some had more than enough) to pay college expenses for the 1946-1947 year of school. It was a great summer. I went to school that year but stayed at home that summer to help my mother after her surgery...No money means no school, so I passed the teacher examination and taught Hackler Country School in Linn County for two years and took extension education courses from KSTC and I went to summer school at MU in 1948.

While at MU, there was a chance for a blind date to go ice skating, if you had your own skates. I just happened to have the white shoe-skates that I had purchased with prize money for my 4-H calf when I was in the 8th grade. That blind date happened to be Bob Smith from Clarence, MO. It was a beautiful



January day in 1946. The ice skating was very poor. Neither of us ever ice skated again but we kept our skates. Our children used them for decorations for our 50th wedding anniversary in 1999.

Bob made the baseball team at MU as a walk-on and lettered three years as a lefthanded pitcher. In the spring of 1949, he went to play semi-pro baseball in the Iowa State League in northwest Iowa. We were married at Storm Lake, Iowa in June 1949. His team was the Schaller Red Capes. He played there two summers then signed to play for the Boston Red Sox's organization the fall of 1950.

In 1951, he played at Scranton, PA. Except for one season with a damaged leftarm, he never played below AAA (triple A) ball and had a 1st half season with the Red Sox and a 2nd half season





with the Indians. The years of 1951 thru 1963 we lived in nine states, 15 major cities and two winter ball seasons in Venezuela (Caracas and Maracaibo). Except for these two winters, we were always at home on the farm south of Clarence so our three sons could stay in the same school.

Our oldest son started school in 1958. After that the boys were at home for the entire school year. I drove us to Bob's home base town when school was out and we left before baseball season ended to be in Clarence for the first day of school. During the winter months I did substitute teaching.

After the 1963 baseball season, it was back to full-time farming until about 1980. Bob started a feed lot equipment business in Clarence and I was his bookkeeper. We closed the business in December of 1999 and enjoyed our 5th wheel trailer until June of 2003 when a tractor over turned to take Bob's life.

I lived at the farm and enjoyed the garden, flowers and mowing our huge lawn until the pains of age made me realize I couldn't do all that very much longer. Loch Haven had an RCF apartment available. I accepted the opportunity and moved here August 1, 2015. There can be happiness at every stage of life and the wonderful ladies who work here provide us the support we need to be comfortable and as independent as possible while we enjoy doing our favorite things. The food is delicious! We enjoy educational programs, fun games, Sunday School, Thursday church and special outings to shop.

Bob was a wonderful father to our three sons. He taught them to work by working with them and he always took time to play and enjoy teaching the skills of hunting, fishing, boating and of course the skills of baseball.

All of our family came to Macon in April to celebrate my 90th birthday, including seven grandchildren and six great grandchildren.



Slow Cooker Taco Soup

1 lb. ground beef

- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 (16 oz.) can chili beans, with liquid
- 1 (15 oz.) can kidney beans, with liquid
- 1 (15 oz.) can corn, with liquid
- 1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce
- 2 C water

2 (14.5 oz.) cans peeled & diced tomatoes

1 (4oz) can diced green chile peppers 1 (1.25 oz.) package taco seasoning mix

1. In a medium skillet, cook the ground beef until browned, over medium heat. Drain and set aside.

2. Place the ground beef, onion, chili beans, kidney beans, corn, tomato sauce, water, diced tomatoes, green chile peppers and taco seasoning mix in a slow cooker. Mix to blend and cook on low setting for 8 hours.

3. Top with cheese and sour cream or any of your favorite toppings.

2. In small batches, fry the corn tortilla wedges until crisp. Remove from heat and drain on paper towels. Salt to taste while warm.

Churros



1 C water 2 1/2 T white sugar 1/2 t salt 2 T vegetable oil 1 C all-purpose flour 2 quarts oil for frying 1/2 C white sugar, or to taste 1 t ground cinnamon

1. In a small saucepan over medium heat, combine water, 2 1/2 tablespoons sugar, salt and 2 tablespoons vegetable oil. Bring to a boil and remove from heat. Stir in flour until mixture forms a ball.

2. Heat oil for frying in deep-fryer or deep skillet to 375 degrees F. Pipe strips of dough into hot oil using a pastry bag. Fry until golden; drain on paper towels.

3. Combine 1/2 cup sugar and cinnamon. Roll drained churros in cinnamon and sugar mixture.

 Heat oil in a large, heavy saucepan, to 375 degrees F.
