ting of meats and other foodstuffs. Light is a force of power. Darkness is not. It merely reoccupies the space vacated by light. It is nothing more than the absence of light. As salt, we are to preserve what we have inherited from God. Simultaneously, we are to operate as light, having been dispatched by the glory of God to bring this light into the darkness.

The ideals, beliefs, preferences, pursuits, and practices of the people who populate a particular region, create the culture of that region. ## COUNCIL VISITS THE PORT OF VA RICHMOND MARINE TERMINAL

The Port of Virginia, Richmond Marine Terminal, was the site of a tour for five Navy League members on June 20. This was led by Tom Cross leading up to his presentation at our Summer Luncheon on June 21. The Richmond Marine Terminal is located near Commerce and Bells Road on the James Rier. It handles roughly 900 container boxes each week going to or from Hampton Roads. Barges pulled by tugs carry the containers taking 12 hours one way. Shipping by this method costs under half that of trucks, and also alleviates road traffic and congestion in the Hampton Roads area. The number one export is soybeans and for imports, it is furniture. The facility's business is expanding. Think logistics and supply chain.


### NORFOLK HARBORFEST TALL SHIPS

# Summer Luncheon, 6/21/23, Tom Cross, Port of Virginia

Our goal was to learn about one of Richmond's most unnoticed commerce centers, the Richmond Marine Terminal. It is on the James River, north of I-95 at the Bells Road exit. If you did not already know it existed, you would never notice. Yet, nine thousand ocean containers pass through this small facility each month, sometimes more. Richmond is a barge port. It can accommodate cargo ships, but the most efficient logistical method is containers loaded on barges.

Our keynote speaker, Tom Cross, Director of State and Local Government Affairs for the Ports of Virginia, extended his comments beyond the Richmond Marine Terminal to overview all six of Virginia's port facilities, including the unique inland port in Front Royal, VA. Much of Tom's presentation focused on the 2021 supply chain crisis and how Virginia's ports are uniquely positioned to avoid such a situation in the future. First, Virginia's technology is top-of-the-line compared to all other U.S. ports. Another simple-to-understand concept is trailering of containers. In all other ports, a shipping line's containers must be carried on that shipping line's trailer; a Maersk container cannot be carried on an Evergreen trailer. If a trailer from the same company is not available, the container waits for one. The Port of Virginia owns its own trailers available to all containers, so containers never have to wait for a matching company trailer. It is applied common sense that makes a tremendous difference. If trailer availability can improve delivery times from Virginia by one to several days, Virginia's ports become favored. There are more nuances similar to these that make Virginia's port systems one of the best in the entire world.

In our support of all sea services, we include the Merchant Marine. In the past, our focus has been on the U.S. Merchant Marine's support of military logistics with less attention given to the truly civilian side of our command of the oceans. Tom Cross opened a whole new vista for us. Our nation's well-being certainly depends upon our Navy, Coast Guard, and Marine Corps. But our financial well-being depends heavily upon our ocean commerce. Now we know.

## **USS RICHMOND (CL-9)**

Did you know the month of July is the centennial anniversary of the commissioning of the *mighty* **USS RICHMOND**? (Commissioned 02/07/1923).

The ship's bell and commissioning plaque are on permanent display at the Navy Reserve Center Richmond.

The **USS RICHMOND's** bell is made of brass, weighs 570 pounds and is inscribed, "**U.S.S. RICHMOND 1923.**"

Plaque Builder's, from U.S.S. RICHMOND (CL-9), brass; inscribed: "U.S.S. RICHMOND, The Wm. Cramp & Sons Ship & Engine Building Co., Philadelphia PA USA 1923."

Facts About the Service of the light cruiser USS RICHMOND (CL-9)

- 3rd warship of its name. The prior USS RICHMOND (1860-1919), a steam sloop, fought in the Battle of New Orleans under ADM Farragut. The original was a Brigantine, serving 1798-1801 in the Caribbean.
- 1937-1943, flagship of the Scouting Fleet of the Submarine Force, U.S. Fleet.
- 1943-1944, lead ship in TG 16.6 around Aleutians. Sister ship was USS SALT LAKE CITY
- Conducted blockades of the Japanese-occupied Attu and Kiska islands
- Battle of Komandorski Island (27 March 1943 pictured above) feading to recapture of Attu
- Occupation of northern Japan until late 1945

## REMEMBERING RICHMOND NAVY LEAGUE COUNCIL MEMBER – REAR ADMIRAL ROY FRANCIS HOFFMANN, USN (Ret)

We regret to inform you of the passing of Rear Admiral Roy Francis Hoffmann, U.S. Navy (Ret) on 8 November 2022 at age 96 or 97. RADM Hoffmann enlisted in the U.S. Naval Reserve in April 1943, was commissioned in June 1946, and served as a Surface Warfare Officer until his retirement in September 1978 as Commander, Naval Base

Charleston/Commandant SIXTH Naval District. During his service he was awarded a Silver Star, three Bronze Stars with Combat "V", a Purple Heart and a Presidential Unit Citation.

The MV Ocean Giant has completed its mission to Antarctica, by offloading cargo at McMurdo Station. This delivery included two tugs and components to construct a causeway which was used to offload the ship. The supplies will support the station during the harsh winter months. Of local interest, the LEWIS B PULLER (ESB-3) supported United Arab Emirates (UAE) pilot training in the Arabian Gulf. This went smoothly, enhancing interoperability with allies. MSC has assisted in the return of Army equipment from Poland to Texas. The 1,600 pieces of equipment were loaded on the hired ship **ENDURANCE**, an American roll on roll off carrier. The USNS TRENTON (TEPF-5) assisted Emporio della Solidarieta (an organization to help needy families in Venice, Italy). They sorted, dated and repackaged pasta that was donated.
