#### PUBLIC WORKS

In the last three years more than 400,000 new homes have been built and nearly one-half received federal government assistance.

Of this total close to 100,000 of this total close to 100,000 homes were built with the aid of direct National Housing Act loans. The total amount of direct N.H.A. loans in the past three years was almost \$1 billion.

Compare this with less than 8,000 housing loans totalling less than \$58 million in the previous three years.

More homes are being built and more direct housing loans are now available than in any other period in history.

The amount of N.H.A. money available for direct lending available for direct lending was increased, and has conti-nually increased, so that now \$1.5 billion is available for housing loans. Compare this with the inadequate \$100 million loaned previously.

Canada's ambitious home

building program has main-tained the stock of reason-ably priced houses for an expanding population and had provided employment for hundreds of thousands of Cana-

Honourable David J. Walker Minister of Public Works, laid down the Progressive Conser-

down the Progressive Conservative Government's policy in no uncertain terms. He stated categorically in the House of Commons that the "Government would not be reluctant to use Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation as a major lender when this does not interfere with the adoption of sound fiscal policy." The amount of loans made by approved lenders was in-

approved lenders was in-creased from \$4 to \$6 billion. Because these loans are in-sured by the Government of Canada, private lenders are willing to lend their funds at a much lower rate of interest than might otherwise be the case. HOUSING LOANS ARE AVAILABLE TO MORE CA-NADIANS THAN EVER BE-FORE.

WINTER PROGRAM The Hon. David Walker announced in October an ambi-

nounced in October an ambi-tious program designed to provide the maximum amount of winter employment. Effective October 11 and up to the end of 1960, all income limits have been removed from direct N.H.A. loans to home owners and builders.

"This means that any applicant, regardless of income, may now qualify for a federal mortgage loan if he is unable to obtain financing from an approved lender." "In addition, ALL CMHC LOANS WILL NOW CMHC LOANS WILL NOW BE REPAYABLE OVER 30 years . . . this should assist materially those families who may have been hesitant in building or buying a house because of monthly carryingcharges."

For the first time, home improvement loans are available to owners of rental properties, including apartment buildings. Prior to an announcement by the Minister of Public Works on October 11, 1960, improvement loans were real available only to individual P.M.

available only to individual dwellings.

Now these facilities have been extended to apartments and other rental properties for alterations, interior and exterior decoration, plumbing, heating, and electrical work

g, hearing, and electrical orck.

Loans will be made directly to builders for the construction of display homes. The Minister also announced on October 11, that the Government would make available immediately two direct loans per builder. These loans are intended to finance the construction of display homes which will aic builders' sales of pre-sold houses.

The interest rate on limited dividend loans for low rental apartments was lowered from 5-7/8% to 5-1/8%.

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### N.R.C. AWARDS **SCHOLARSHIPS** TO LOCAL MEN

The National Research Council of Canada has granted 588 scholarships for 1961-62, with a total value of \$1,270,000. Four local residents have benefitted from these scholarships; Anthony R. Philipotts, 4 Brunet Ave, Dorval, \$2,200 Special Scholarship; Marcel Banville, 330 George V Ave, Dorval, \$2,200 Studentship; R on ald Cavell 740 14th Ave, Lachine, \$2,200 Studentship; and Walter A. Studentship; and Walter A. Dutton, 650 17th Ave., Lachine, \$2,200 Studentship.

Five hundred and twenty-two of these scholarships are

two of these scholarships are for graduate work at Canadian universities. These include 186 bursaries worth \$1,800 each and 336 studentships worth \$2,200 each.

Awards for study abroad include 38 special scholarships worth \$2,200 each. Thirty-three of these are to be held in the United Kingdom, four in the United States and one in Belgium.

Twenty-eight postdoctorate overseas fellowships, valued at \$4,500 for married and \$3,500 for single fellows, have been granted for work in the following countries. been granted for work in the following countries: 19 in the United Kingdom; four in France; and one each in Bel-gium, Germany, Israel, Swe-den and the United States.





J. Alasdair Fraser of Beaconsfield, president of the hospital, said that the aim is to obtain full accreditation for Lakeshore General with the least nossible delay.



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
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
