






The obligation to attend Sunday Mass is going to be restored in our Diocese of Harrisburg on the weekend of August 15th (so all three Masses

that weekend are included), and this date is also the feast day of the Assumption! It is a great opportunity to reflect not only on the gift of the Eucharist but also on the beauty of the feast day we will celebrate! Normally, the Assumption is so important that even during the week, August 15th is always a Holy Day of obligation (this year is just happens to land on a Sunday). The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a beautiful Catholic teaching where we celebrate the fact that Mary was assumed by God's power both body and soul into heaven. Right now, when we pass away at the end of our lives (for every single human being except one) our soul separates from our physical body, and we come face to face with Jesus. However, for the Blessed Virgin Mary, she ended her earthly life, and then was taken up by God's power with her body and soul still united as one. We still believe that our physical bodies will be brought back and reunited with our souls at the end of time, which is what we call the Resurrection of the Body (a part of our Creed every Sunday). Overall, it is important and incredibly beautiful to reflect on the current state and experience of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Not only is her soul perfectly united with the Trinity in heaven, but in the midst of God's perfect, blazing trinitarian love, resides the whole person, her body and soul together. Therefore, whenever we experience the weakness of our flesh or the brokenness of our physical bodies, we can think about and reflect on the fact that God's hope and plan is to raise that up and infuse our entire being with His perfect love in heaven. Heaven will be the experience of receiving the fullness of God's love perfectly, and through that reception, we will be able with God's grace to love perfectly according to our own nature, since every part of our bodies and our souls are infused with God's strength and power. May we ask the Blessed Virgin Mary to pray for us from her current position in heaven, so that we will be filled with Hope, trusting that God will fulfill His promise to raise up our bodies and our souls both in this life and perfectly in the

This personal testimony of Fr. Walter Ciszek is one of my favorite books of all time! The narrative follows a Pennsylvania native from Shenandoah. through remarkable journey of training to become а missionary priest destined for Russia, his journey into Poland and then Russia during the beginning of World War II, and his eventual capture and imprisonment in Russia for over 20

years. This book is written partly as a narrative of the story but much more focused on Fr. Ciszek's spiritual reflections on his experience. His incredible passion and determination, honesty and authenticity about being broken down through this experience, and especially his deep spiritual insights into how God is always working for the good of our souls, will change how you view the world and bring you face-to-face with God's closeness, mercy, and transforming love. Because this book is a bit longer than others (about 200 pages...even though I think it may read faster than other books) and because of my own schedule (among other things), I've decided to give us two months to read and reflect on this book before our final meeting, which means we will meet towards the end of August 2021. I will be reaching out to maybe have a meeting with those interested towards the end of July, but I encourage everyone that can to read this book or even just come to this discussion because this story of suffering, hope, mercy, and faith is certain to help you on your journey. VOCATIONIST FATHERS & BROTHERS LETTER OF APPEAL 2021 TO THE DIOCESE OF HARRISBURG, PA

My name is Father Emeka Okwuosa. I am the mission coordinator for the **Vocationist Fathers and Brothers**. We are the Vocationist Fathers and Brothers. Our congregation was founded by Blessed Justin Russolillo in Naples, Italy in 1920. He founded the congregation because of his own personal experience and need, having almost lost his vocation due to poverty. Thanks to the generosity of God's people like you, he was able to become a priest. On the eve of his ordination, he renewed a promise he made to God as a teenager, to dedicate his whole life helping poor vocations if God could preserve his vocation.

We the Vocationist Fathers and Brothers work in 18 countries, namely Nigeria, India, Madagascar, Columbia, Ecuador, the Philippines, Vietnam, Indonesia, etc. In all these nations, we have the problem of poverty, which continues to be an obstacle to divine vocation. Today in the western world, people would say there is no vocation, but on the other side, there is.

A practical example is our mission in Nigeria, where in every year we have more than two thousand (2000) young men apply to become priests. Out of that number last year, do you know how many were accepted? Five (5)! Because that was all we could afford. How do you choose five out of 2000? How do you make that choice? What will the lives of those not chosen be called? What are they going to do with their lives?

A couple of years ago after the selection of the 5 candidates, a young man came to me and said, "Father, I wasn't chosen. What should I do now since God is calling me to be a priest? I said I had no clue what he ought to do. That hurt me and I went to the chapel and prayed, saying, "God please help this young man and help all of them." I came back to Philadelphia for a mission, and during the homily, I brought up how God calls and how poverty continues to be an obstacle. After mass, a lady came to me and said, "Father, I am not rich, but I think God may use me to save this young man's vocation." She asked me how much it cost to accept a candidate and I replied \$5 a day, which is about almost \$2000 per annum. She gave me a Cheque and persuaded me to accept this young man and tell him somebody in Philadelphia wants him to be a priest. Two days later, she called and said, "Father, I have good news. I convinced two of my friends to help." She admitted that she did not convince them, but actually threatened them with estrangement. "You know I am Italian, and I cook and bake. I told them that if they do not help (and I know they have the money), we are no longer friends. And it worked." So, I was curious and I asked her why she did that, considering that she did not know the young men. She replied, "Father, I am not helping you; I am helping myself. I know that I will not go to heaven straightaway, and I am going to spend a long time in purgatory. So I am just trying to invest to make sure that when I am in purgatory, I will have a priest here on earth to be praying for me."

Helping a young man become a priest is like adopting your own priest. Helping a young man become a priest is like having somebody who will celebrate mass for you everyday, even after you are gone. Helping a young man become a priest is to make sure that there will be a church open, thanks to you.

I am making this appeal to ask you to help us. \$1 is good, but if you can afford \$2, \$3 or \$5, even better. You can help us admit one candidate or two as nothing is too small or too big for God. Please help us to help these young men!

A few weeks ago, I was in our community in Nigeria with forty seminarians, I was shocked by what they were eating. They were not eating that poorly because of lent. It was Holy Thursday, a joyful day that they were supposed to celebrate the priesthood and the institution of the Eucharist, but they were eating practically nothing. It was a sorry sight to behold, and I wondered how I could convince them that God loved them and would want them to become priests. When we cannot even get them a decent meal, how can I tell them that being a priest is the best thing that could happen to them? When all they do is starve. Please help us to help these young men.
