

A Statement on Immigration from the ELCA Region 1 Bishops

As Lutherans, we are called to live out the teachings of Jesus Christ, who welcomed strangers and emphasized love, mercy, and justice for all people. We believe that every human being, regardless of their country of origin or legal status, is created in the image of God and has inherent dignity and worth. This foundational truth compels us to approach the issue of immigration with compassion and a commitment to the common good.

Scripture repeatedly instructs us to love our neighbor and show the stranger hospitality. God commands the people of Israel, "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your nativeborn. Love them as yourself" (Leviticus 19:34). Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) shows us that caring for people in need is central to who we are as Christians. The parable also challenges us to acknowledge the goodness in all people because the "foreigner" in the story is the one who acts in the most Christlike way. In light of these teachings, we advocate for an immigration policy that reflects Christ's love, recognizing that all people deserve respect and protection.

The Lutheran tradition emphasizes both mercy and justice. Justice requires everyone, including immigrants, to be treated fairly and equitably. While upholding the rule of law is important, it must not be done in ways that dehumanize or exploit vulnerable people. We are especially concerned about the possibility that places of worship, hospitals, and schools could be the target of deportation raids. A policy that allowed such raids would increase the suffering not only of undocumented people but also of many people who would fear being unjustly targeted and thus avoid those places. Denying people the opportunity to attend worship, be educated, or receive medical treatment violates individuals' fundamental rights. We urge those in government and law enforcement who are responsible for the detention or deportation of undocumented persons to consider how their actions might be seen in the eyes of God.

We are all members of the same human family. Therefore, we approach immigration not merely as a political or legal issue but as a matter of human solidarity. The health and prosperity of the United States are intertwined with the contributions and lives of immigrants. Immigrants bring diverse gifts and play an essential role in our communities and economies. Our immigration policies should reflect a commitment to the welfare of all, especially the most vulnerable.

As people who have received God's mercy and grace, we are called to extend that same mercy and grace to others. This means offering opportunities for new beginnings, particularly for those already present in the United States without legal documentation. A just immigration policy would provide pathways to citizenship for those who have lived in the U.S. for years, contributing to the country and integrating into our communities. It should also guarantee protection for those fleeing violence or persecution, ensure that immigrant families remain united, and make sure that children are not punished for their parents' actions.

We are called, as individuals and as a society, to remember that the immigrants among us are not intruders or enemies but bearers of the image of God, deserving of our care, respect, and advocacy.

Council approved using up to \$2000 of funds from the Longterm Building Fund. Jenn Lantrip, our office manager, and Chris Landtiser are redesigning Calvary's website. Annual Congregation Meeting highlights: Retiring council members Carol Dougall, Sophia Earl, Ross Patton, and I were celebrated. Calvary's 2025 Budget was passed. New council members (see below), a nominating committee (Ross Patton, Gary Clark and Dianne Pratt), and delegates to the Synod Assembly (Brent and Shari Young and Sophia Earl) were elected.

With the Annual Congregational Meeting behind us, Calvary will be moving forward with a new council. 

February's blockbuster debut novel is *Lessons in Chemistry* by Bonnie Garmus. It is the hilarious, idiosyncratic, and uplifting story of a female scientist whose career is constantly derailed by the idea that a woman's place is in the home. She ends up starring as the host of America's most beloved 1960's TV cooking show. Terri will lead our discussion. The public library has 71 books, 23 large print books, 18 eBooks, 10 audiobook CD sets, and 55 downloadable audiobooks. Apple TV released a miniseries based on the book in 2023.

Coming March 25: *Looking for Jane* by Heather Marshall, 2023


Emmi Bradley is a very spunky and outgoing five year old in Hillsboro, Oregon. Emmi's mother, Stephanie Bradley, describes her as, "the exact opposite of her big brother. She is loud and she may be shy at first, but when she gets comfortable she's really out there." Emmi loves to jump around, dance and do gymnastics. She loves to sing and come up with her own performances, and she absolutely loves Disney. To sum it up, Emmi is all about princesses and is a ray of sunshine.

In May of 2023, a seemingly benign discovery turned into a long journey that no one in Emmi's family was ready for. It all started when Stephanie noticed abnormal bruising on Emmi's legs and face. Knowing that it looked more serious than the normal bruises of a clumsy toddler, she took Emmi to see the pediatrician. They were quick to find out that Emmi's hemoglobin levels were extremely low as well as her platelet count. They sent her to the emergency room where further bloodwork showed she was low in neutrophils (the body's immune system) and she was admitted. A bone marrow biopsy discovered that she either had a form of leukemia or aplastic anemia. Further testing showed it was aplastic anemia.

Every two to three days Emmi was getting blood and platelet transfusions. She was reliant on those transfusions until September of 2023 when she got a match and had a bone marrow transplant. Stephanie recalls that before Emmi had her bone marrow transplant, "she was surviving on blood and platelet donations for an entire year of her life. From her initial appointment on May 12th, she spent 72 nights in the hospital, 37 appointments that weren't part of overnight stays, and 17 anesthesia procedures." If she got a fever she would have to be automatically admitted because the aplastic anemia shut down her immune system and she had no way of fighting colds on her own. With every small cold she caught, she would need to spend 48 hours in the hospital receiving IV antibiotics. The hospital stays got longer and longer and before her bone marrow transplant, her stay was 25 days. Since the start of this treacherous journey, Emmi spent 159 days in the hospital.

After going through the many long and tough days at the hospital, Stephanie says that blood and platelet donations, "saved our daughters life so if you can, you should donate. And it's not a onetime thing, Emmi had 40 transfusions and that was just one person." Emmi has inspired her family members to donate blood and platelets knowing the profound impact it can have on others. Now, they hope that Emmi's story inspires you as well. You can be the one to help save the lives of others like Emmi Bradley and it all starts with your blood donation.
