A video of the GPAA gold show taped at King Tut was shown and the second half will be shown at a later meeting. It will also be available in the club library.



McCaw School Opens New Section

The McCaw School of Mines started as a paper-mache model of a mine tunnel built into the corner of a classroom. Teachers Janet Bremer and Rick Rogers were instructing a course on Nevada mining and felt the model would give fourth-grade students a glimpse of what it might be like to really be in a mine. The Gordon McCaw Elementary School staff met, discussed the idea and then decided to "think big." As a result of this enthusiasm, within three years stands the McCaw School in Henderson. The school is named after the late Gordon McCaw, born and raised on a sheep station in South Wales, Australia. His father was killed and his mother and family of six moved to Sydney. Unfortunately, it was there that his mother lost a leg in a streetcar accident and McCaw and his oldest brother left school to help support the family. Some of his mother's family had moved to the United States (Nevada to be exact) and the uncle for whom McCaw was named brought McCaw to the United States while in his early 20s. He completed high school in Battle Mountain with Dorothy Kinneberg who was a teacher there. McCaw became interested in mining because of her husband, Andrew Kinneberg who operated gold, silver and copper mines in Nevada. McCaw attended the University of Nevada, Reno, where he obtained his teaching degree. McCaw eventually came to Henderson when the BMI plant was first built. McCaw was proud of his Kinneberg cousins in the mining industry as well as their sons; so the legacy continues with education and mining at Henderson's McCaw School of Mines. Thousands of students have visited the McCaw School of Mines and volunteers help with five field trips a week.

DRYWASHING FOR GOLD

Drywashing is a dry process method for recovering gold. It is a mechanical method used to separate gold from dry dirt or gravel. This method of gold recovery was first introduced to the prospecting community around the early 1920's. Today, drywashing for gold is particularly popular in desert regions where water sources are scarce or non-existent.

TYPES OF DRYWASHERS

Two basic drywasher design concepts have been developed through the years. Although many varieties of drywashers exist, most drywashers fall into one of the two following categories:

The bellows type drywasher and the vibrostatic, or blower type drywasher.

Bellows type drywashers are most commonly operated by hand (using a crank or lever) or are driven with an electric motor. Vibrostatic drywashers are powered, almost exclusively, by a blower assembly attached to a gasoline engine.

BASIC ANATOMY OF A DRY-WASHER

Before understanding how a drywasher works, one should become familiar with the basic anatomy of a drywasher. There are four basic components to all drywashers:

- 1. The hopper;
- 2. The riffle tray;
- 3 A method for compressing or blowing air;
- 4. The frame.

THE HOPPER

The top portion of a drywasher is known as a hopper. The hopper

usually consists of a box covered with a wire mesh or extruded metal screen. This screen is commonly referred to as a "grizzly".

THE RIFFLE TRAY

The mid section of all drywashers consists of a riffle tray assembly. The riffle tray is a frame that houses a series of riffles and often looks similar to a sluice box. The underneath side of the riffle tray consists of a piece of stretched cloth or other pourous material; allowing air to pass-through the bottom of the riffle tray.

A METHOD FOR COMPRESS-ING OR BLOWING AIR

How the lower portion of a drywasher is designed can very depending on the type of drywasher in question. On a bellows type drywasher, the lower assembly usually consists of a bellow. The bellow can be operated manually (with a lever or hand crank) or with the aid of an electric motor or gasoline engine. On a vibrostatic or blower type drywasher, the lower portion of the machine usually consists of a box into which compressed air is forced. Typically, a blower assembly driven by a gasoline engine is used as a source of compressed air for vibrostatic blower type drywashers.

THE FRAME

On almost all drywashers, the hopper and riffle tray are supported by a free-standing frame.

HOW A DRYWASHER WORKS

Dry, gold-bearing material is fed onto the grizzly screen, usually with the aid of a shovel or bucket. The thinner material, such as dirt and small gravel, falls-through the griz(Continued on page 8)

The Properties of Gold

Gold is a very heavy yellow metal. It has a specific gravity of 19.3 which means a quart of gold would weigh 19.3 times as much as a quart of water. As a comparison, lead has a specific gravity of about 11 so gold is almost twice as heavy as lead.

Gold is resistant to most naturally occurring chemicals so it doesn't tarnish and it is never destroyed.

Gold is very malleable and ductile. It can be hammered so thin that 250,000 sheets would make a stack one inch high.

One ounce can be drawn into a wire thirty five miles long.

Gold is never found pure in nature. It is usually alloyed with copper, silver and/or platinum.

So how do I know if the stuff in my pan is gold?

By its weight - If your panning technique is correct, the gold will be found at the bottom of the pan. When you gently swirl water around in your pan, gold acts differently than the other material. It won't move as easily as the other stuff.

By its appearance - Be-

cause gold doesn't have much of a crystalline structure, it doesn't really sparkle or glitter - it shines. It looks the same in the sunlight or in the shade.

If in doubt, whack it with a hammer. If it flattens, it is probably gold. If it shatters, it isn't.

This is not recommended. You can drop a specimen into some nitric acid. If it doesn't react, it is probably gold. If it does. it isn't. Nitric acid is dangerous if it gets on you or you breath the fumes. Be sure you know proper handling procedures.

Once you actually see gold in your pan a couple times, you won't have any trouble identifying it again.

One other thing to keep in mind. Due to past mining

operations, some or all of the gold in certain streams may be coated with mercury. If you see some material in your pan that "acts" like gold but is a bright silver color, it is probably mercury coated gold.

Do not mix mercury coated gold with your other gold because the mercury will rub off and contaminate your clean gold. The easiest way to get rid of the mercury is to heat it on a camp stove outside and downwind from any humans, animals or structures. Heat in a metal cup that you will never, ever use for any thing else. Mercury is dangerous if it gets in you, on you or you breath the fumes.

zly screen and into the hopper. Larger material, such as rocks and sticks, rolls-off the grizzly and back onto the ground.

Material from the hopper is then fed by gravity into the riffle tray, through an opening in the bottom of the hopper. The rate of flow from the hopper to the riffle tray is usually regulated by an adjustable door or shutter on the bottom of the hopper.

As the material flows across the riffles, air is blown through the bottom of the riffle tray. Lighter material is kept in a state of suspension; riding on a cushion of air until the material eventually leaves the riffle tray. Heavier material (such as gold) is not lifted by the air and gets trapped by the riffles.

DRYWASHING ADVANTAGES

Drywashing is one of the fastest methods for recovering gold from dry material. Operating a drywasher can be a good form of physical exercise. Drywashers can be "homebuilt" very economically; reducing initial capital investment while increasing the enjoyment gained from recreational gold prospecting.

DRYWASHING DISADVANTAGES

Weather conditions such as wind or rain can greatly effect the operation of a drywasher. They can be used effectively only if the ground is almost completely dry. In some cases, drywashers can be "bulky" and difficult to transport. Operating a drywasher can be a "dirty job"; as most drywashers generate a great deal of airborne dust and dirt when in use. Gasoline powered drywashers may be quite loud. They also require a certain amount of maintenance and are prone to frequent mechanical failures.

Our Club is open for your







There were reports of several members with metal detectors and dry-washers locating good size pickers in the early hours of the morning.




