A Message From Fr. Brian Johnson

January 31, 2021

Mark 1:21-28

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

Last week, I mentioned Jesus 'divine' teaching method! Today's gospel shows how it was received, and what people had to say about Jesus' teaching style. Mark 1:22 says "The people were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes." If 'astonished' shows up on a Comment or Critique card, that is a pretty good report! But I like their report mostly because like any good and substantive report, it is both specific and comparative. First, their praise is specific by them describing His teaching as 'authoritative', or 'convincing and passionate' (delivered with 'credible feeling'). Secondly, they offer a compare/contrast assessment on Jesus's style by saying that He taught differently from the status-quo and 'unlike the scribes'. Well, do you wonder like me, "How did the scribes teach?" Simply put, 'scribes' were the writers-secretaries-notaries whose job was to command the written word. They were the note-takers and filers of documents, copying and recopying the important texts in society. The Book of Ezra of the Old Testament 7:6, defines a scribe as a person 'well-versed in the law of Moses'. In Matthew 5:20, Jesus will say that to enter the kingdom of heaven, a person's righteousness must 'surpass that of the scribes'. The scribes could quote the law verbatim and recite it to anyone, but obviously they weren't perceived as projecting any authority about their work. Why not? Either, 1) they didn't apply the law of Moses to themselves or 2) they rewrote parts of the law to favor their selves or only their own group. For example, 1) Jesus calls out their poor example of not living what they teach in Matthew 23:3 when he says, "do and observe all things they tell you, but do not follow their example. For they preach but they do not practice.' And 2) Jesus calls out their rewriting the law to enrich themselves, dealing themselves a corrupt hand, as when He tells them in Mark 7:13 that "You nullify the word of God in favor of your tradition you have handed on". Today, we would say that the 'scribes' were good at finding 'exploits' or 'loopholes' in the law, mostly because they either wrote it themselves, or offered the majority interpretations that most favored their class. Sound familiar? They created and perpetuated their own work! Like committee boards that set their own salaries and create problems to justify themselves further, the scribes used, or confused, the law to benefit themselves. The scribes' defense may be that they felt their job was dangerous, because of the occupational hazards of 'drowning in their own sea of papers' or 'suffering from wrist strain'!

I like how Jesus confronts their hypocrisy and self-dealing, in Matthew23:4m, when he says "They tie up heavy burdens hard to carry and lay them on people's shoulders, but they will not lift a finger to move them." That sounds much like how any normal good office worker feels after receiving one more 'out of touch' memo from headquarters. Yet, sometimes Jesus even directly challenges the scribes' own knowledge of their scriptures (He knows them better). In Matthew 22:29, through a dispute over interpreting a passage about resurrection to Sadducees Jesus tells them, "You are misled because you do not know the scriptures or the power of God." Also, in Mark 2:25, Jesus reminds them of what is in their own supposedly memorized scriptures when He says "Have you never read what David did...." (Referring to 1 Sm 21:2–7)or in John's gospel when Jesus said, "Is it not written in your law, 'I said, "You are gods" (John 10:34). Or more subtly, to expose their incompetence, He told them to 'Search your scriptures' (John 5:39).

But what about this 'astonishing' authority of Jesus? One striking place we witness it fully on display is in the Sermon on the Mount. Multiple times, Jesus teaches about the commandments of moral living and he uses the statement "You have heard.... But I say to you..." (Matt 5:21, 27, 31, 33, 38, 43). How can Jesus say that? Because He Knows! What is an authority, but a person who knows. This one can not only quote the policy but has worked the policy most effectively because they wrote it (knowing its purpose, need and most fruitful application). The person with authority has 'authored' something. That person has 'written the book on it'. Who can interpret the Bible? In a scripture dispute, who are you going to go with, the Pharisees or Jesus? Jesus, as God, wrote the Book! Better yet even, Jesus is the 'Word (of God) made flesh'-John 1:14. So, I imagine that when people heard Jesus speak about the Father, people felt it in their bones that this teacher knew what He was talking about! I think Jesus taught and empowered His apostles with such authority, too. We may overlook such real and living authority every day. For example, if you are in a new building or new town, who do you trust to get you around? The CEO or Mayor. No way, I am going with the janitor or taxicab driver every time-they know it through and through. I think this is why Jesus picks at least half of his apostles as fishermen. They know the land (okay the sea), can tread water and manage a market to make a living on what earth/sea provides! That is some living 'authority' in action. Thinking of the apostles always makes me think of the Cajun Navy down in Louisiana I learned about a couple of years ago after the national attention following a hurricane. They were the good and hardworking fishermen and women who quickly transformed their equipment (boatssupplies) into lifesaving means for the rescue of people out of the dangerous rising flood around them after a hurricane. That is some true 'authority'!

Another Saint in Time of Plague

Mar Charbel Makhlouf, O.L.M. (Born 5-8-1828 – Died 12-24-1898) Mar Charbel Makhlouf, was a Maronite monk and priest from Lebanon. 'Mar' is a Syriac honorary title like the western title 'Monsignor'. One of the most popular saints of the Middle East, and known among Lebanese Christians as the "Miracle Monk of Lebanon." His followers say they call him this because of the miraculous healings they receive in answer to prayers asking his intercession. His birth name was Youssef Antoun Makhlouf, and he was born one of five children born to Antoun Zaarour Makhlouf and Brigitta Chidiac. They lived in the village of Bekaa Kafra, possibly the highest in the Lebanese mountains. His father died when Yousseff was only three as he returned for serving in the Turkish Army. His widowed mother married another man who went on to be ordained a parish priest in their village. Yousseff was raised in a devout home and frequently read volumes of the lives of Saints. He had two uncles who became religious hermits. Youssef shepherded the family's small flock of sheep and goats and he often prayed in a grotto built into a hill and installed an icon of the Blessed Mother. He spent most of his days in prayer at the grotto. When he was 23, he left his family and entered the Lebanese Maronite Order at the Monastery of Our Lady in Mayfoug. He later transferred to the Monastery of St. Maron in Annaya. near Beirut. Taking the religious name of Charbel after a 2nd century martyr, he made final vows in 1853. He began studies for the priesthood at the Monastery of Saints Cyprian & Justina in Kfifan, and was ordained a priest July 23, 1859. He then returned to St. Maron Monastery, and took up his life of strict asceticism, work and constant prayer. In 1860, he witnessed the appalling massacre of over 20,000 Christians by radical Muslim members of the Druse sect. Entire families of Christians were murdered in the political unrest without mercy and many Christian churches were ransacked. Hundreds of hungry or wounded refugees sought shelter in the monastery of Annaya. Father Charbel rendered aid & assistance to the refugees, all the while praying and fasting, begging for God's mercy on the persecutors and persecuted alike.

Charbel performed many healing miracles during his days in the monastery for visitors or when he would venture out under obedience to help someone. One such case, happened in 1873 when his superior sent him to the palace of Prince Rachid Beik Al-Khoury, to pray for his sick son Nagibem dying of typhus. Doctors held out little hope. Father Charbel administered the Sacrament of the Sick to the boy, praying with him. Just a little while after their prayers, the boy recovered. Nagibem went onto study medicine himself and became of the most famous physicians in Lebanon. Fr Charbel calmed and comforted many visitors who were troubled in spirit or actually suffered mental illness seeking healing from him. Later, in 1875, Charbel was given permission to live as a hermit for the remaining 23 years of his life at the Hermitage of Saints Peter and Paul, which was a chapel under the care of the monastery.

In his hermitage, he united himself to Christ, through prayer, manual labor, and even stricter acts of self-denial. His simple cell was only about 18 feet square. He always wore a hair-shirt under his habit and slept only a few hours every day. He ate very meager meals without meat, only once a day. He died on Christmas Eve 1898. He could not be laid out for viewing that day because of a snowstorm, but the next day as his body was being prepared for burial, there was a radiant light that circled his body. Many thought the light even emanated from his body. Many miracles are reported to have happened surrounding Charbel's tomb. Often in the months following his death, an inexplicable light was reported to have illuminated the entire area around his grave site. On one of the occasions, the resident bishop had the tomb opened and Charbel's body was found to be incorrupt. Multiple exhumations have occurred over the years (even as late as 1950) and each time, his body has been found incorrupt. One miraculous recorded healing involved a Sister Mary Abel Kamary of the Two Sacred Hearts Nuns in 1936 who had a cancer growth attaching to her pancreas, gall bladder and liver. It caused debilitating nausea and constant vomiting. Surgery was ruled out as too dangerous to survive. She prayed fervently for St Charbel's intercession, and had a dream of him blessing her with the sign of the cross. She made a pilgrimage to his grave, and praying there, she saw his name appear carved into a ground tile below his monument, with wet drops of some substance. She wiped it with her hand and she felt a current in her body and afterward was examined by doctors was declared free of tumors. On October 9, 1977, Pope Paul VI canonized of St Charbel. At the time Maronite Bishop Francis Zayek, described him as "A New Star of the East and a second St. Anthony of the Desert.....like a Cedar of Lebanon standing in eternal prayer, on top of a mountain." St Charbel Makhlouf, pray for us!
