FINDING OUR WAY TO JESUS

The Israelites had finally returned to their holy city from years in exile, only to find a ruined Jerusalem and a deso-



late Judah. But Isaiah realized that the Lord was with them and was determined to convince others that the Lord's glory would shine on them, shine around them, shine through them. One by one, or in pairs, or in

whole families, sons and daughters, young and old: they all returned to their homeland. But that was not it, for light has no end. Foreigners from Midian, Ephah, and Sheba— Abraham's descendants who had separated from the Chosen People centuries before—streamed into the glorious city. Even though they had not shared in their trials and suffering, they were welcomed into the shining radiance of the holy land.

The magi relied on both science and faith to guide them to the Lord. They observed the night sky and studied the movement of the stars and planets, drawing conclusions from the travels of these heavenly bodies. Without knowing what this remarkable star was, they realized its importance and journeyed all the way to Jerusalem. But, still a few miles form their destination, they needed guidance from the chief priests and the scribes (who quoted Micah's words) to direct them to Bethlehem. By science or faith alone, they did not know enough; together they found the Lord.

Isaiah mentions gold and frankincense, gifts befitting a king. But the magi also bring myrrh—used to anoint a body after death—because this king is also victim, called to suffer, like Isaiah's suffering servant, for the sins of all.

ST. ELIZABETH ANN SETON FEAST DAY JANUARY 4

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

(August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the

United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life."

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"

That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. It is God that makes our ordinary lives extraordinary.

In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others.
