Friends,

This month your VCI team read a book titled, "Worship Ways for the People within Your Reach." This book helped us to understand the people in the Richmond community, and what type of worship is effective in keeping them engaged. The largest demographic in Richmond is known as, Family Union-Stockcars and State Parks. They make up 15.9% of the people in Richmond. The second largest segment is Thriving Boomers-Unspoiled Splendor. They make up 14.95% of the people. Suburban Style-Sports Utility Families make up 11.3%. Golden Year Guardians-Town Elders make up 10.12%. Other segents that we took into account were: Singles and Starters - Digital Dependents (4.8%), Promising Families-Families Matter Most (3.96%), MiddleClass Melting Pot-Destination Recreation (3.67%) and Significant Singles-Bohemian Groove (3.5%)

I encourage you to go online and Google these MOSAIC Segment. It is good to know who your neighbors are. It is good to know what motivates them and what constrains them, if you want to create a ministry that effectively reaches the people of your community. These demographic profiles are very in-depth and very specific. For the context of this month's Vital Church Initiative, we looked at what they like in a worship service.

The two most dominant types of worship preferred by our community are Inspirational and Caregiving. Unfortunately for us, these two are nearly impossible to blend together. I would love to have a worship planning team that would help create effective worship in which ever style they select to pursue.

Inspirational worship is considered effective with 32.53% of our community's population. It is described in the book as powerful but not necessarily apocalyptic. It leads to self-confidence and a better attitude. It reconnects people with their original idealism and hope. Christ is perceived as a promise keeper and ultimately there will be victory of goodness, beauty and truth. Nothing should interrupt the worship service. Announcements, offerings, introductions are comparable to commercials that interrupt the experience. There should never be dead air as people wait for a speaker to adjust a microphone or a choir or band to prepare to sing.

Caregiving worship is effective for 44.12% of our community. A caregiving congregation perceives itself as faithful remnants of a movement that was once much larger. Families may sit in the same seat for generations. It is most profound, effective and impactful when love for the stranger outperforms love among members. The image of Christ as the Good Shepherd appeals to caregiving worshippers. Informal visiting is often present before worship begins. Ushers and greeters must be smiling and attentive to children and babies. The congregation must be tolerant of children, crying infants, preschool antics and teenagers if they are to achieve the necessary 100 regular attenders. Coffee hour, special dinners and potlucks are integral. Worship is usually slow paced and marked with pauses and silences that allow for participants to collect their thoughts.

Do these sound familiar to you? They did to me!

As usual, the book we used for this month's VCI is available on the bookshelves in the back of the sanctuary. I hope you will take the time to check out the chapters on Inspirational worship and on Caregiving worship. I hope you will volunteer to help me plan worship that is relevant and impactful for the community outside the doors of the building, so that if anyone is willing to take a chance and enter our worship service, they will find it to be a blessing in their lives.


#### The Grass is GROWING!!

We have lots of "stuff" to sell which will help clean out the basement so we can make better use of the space.


