


Photo Contest



Men's Clinic in December

Although a cold night, we had an interesting topic on the schedule that brought out a nice amount of our members, our Ladies Clinic took an excursion to the 50's diner for a cookie exchange and a sampling of some of the menu items there. In recent years the mixture of gasoline has changed as a result of government legislation and technology changes in operating internal combustion engines. Many of us had questions we asked of Mr. Hoon Ge a highly educated man working in the petroleum industry for most of his life. The alcohol that is now present in our fuels in ever greater percentages creates certain problems that can be dealt with. Modern cars deal very well with it because they are engineered to use it. Our older cars and consumer small engines made before the popularization of ethanol contained fuel can also be made to tolerate it with some of the tips we received this night. The unbelievable amount of fuel that our world uses everyday was pointed out to us and we learned that crude oil produces many different products from a single barrel of oil as the result of the science of "cracking" those gallons of oil. Refineries are masters of extracting all of the different products from those gallons and doing it based on the economic costs associated with the demand for which components of that single barrel are most desired by the market place on any given day. We were given a lesson on the economy and how the costs of crude oil influences economic growth and that developed countries economies are extremely sensitive to crude oil pricing and expected supplies. This was a very well presented topic and was appreciated by all in attendance.

We had the opportunity to award a member who has been a tireless worker for the club and has been extremely giving of his time and also of various gifts to the club. Ken Huber was awarded a "Spark Plug award and also the high honor of becoming a Life Time Member.

We had a new face in the audience this night, well not really new but he was sitting facing the front instead of being in the front. Jerry Schilling has long served the clinic as a Clinic Coordinator for many years and now is transitioning to the audience side to enjoy the clinics. From a December Aoogah Newsletter from a number of years ago, The handy work of current members Rog Anderson and Lynne Groven. Good work always holds up.

IT ROLLED OFF THE LINE APRIL 14, 193 THE MODEL WHEELBASE IS 103 INCHES AND THE ROAD CLEARANCE IS 9%" AT THE DIFFERENTIAL

DID YOU ALSO KNOW? The first closed five passenger, coach type body in which two doors gave access to all four seats was offered by Ford in 1905? That the minute a mile record was almost achieved by an Olds way back in 1903 at Daytona Beach, Florida? The Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) in 1904 established a school for auto mechanics? In 1903 American automoblie production was over 10,000 cars? That as early as 1907 there was a National Association of Retail Auto Dealers? First known reference of the name "Auto-Mobile" appeared in a story in Youth's Companion in 1896? Car radios and dual tail lights were available in 1929? That was the year Cord offered a front-wheel drive. Steam cars were thirsty? The 1901 White Steamer had a 20 gallon water tank. The first automobile parts and supply house began in America in 1899? They had a 32 page catalog with 50 illustrations in 1900. One horsepower is the equivalent of energy required to lift 33,000 pounds, one foot in one minute. Building automobiles was profitable ... even way back then. In 1907 Ford reported over one million dollars in profit. Safety glass made it's first appearance in the automotive kingdom around 1927? That in 1896 automobiles in one mile races were doing 26.8 miles per hour? That the grand old Model T Ford was the ninth model in the Ford line? It made it's debut in 1908. In 1900 fifty four (54) NEW makes of cars came onto the market with a production that year of 4000 units? Today that number of cars can be produced in just a few hours.
