Talking to Myself about Worship...

Why change? Or, actually, not change back to the 11:00 service? Well, I don't think worship is being done E.P.I.C. - ly enough.

Huh? E.P.I.C. worship means Experiential, Participatory, Image-rich, and Connective worship.

Is that really the reason? Yes, worship, which involves the Word, Communion, and Baptism, is the center piece of what we do. It should be excellent. And ours isn't as excellent as it could be.

Why? Well, to me, this is because, particularly at the 11:00 service, we had two groups of people. I'll call them traditional Lutherans and families. And the world is so different today, that speaking or communicating to the traditionalists and the families is two different things. When our worship is only 'blended' it doesn't really speak to either of these groups.

So, what will we do? 8:30 is staying the same for now. At 10:00, 15-20 Sundays will be even more traditional than they are now. These will be the Church holy-days or festivals. 15-20 Sundays will be a lot like what we do now. 15-20 Sundays will be different - still Lutheran and liturgical, but different.

What will we call it? I am calling it Eclectic Worship.

Catchy; but how will I know which is which? St. Stephen will tell you ahead of time; although, this is only going to work if people still attend services as they normally would - even if it isn't their 'preferred' style.

Yeah, what's stopping me from only attending the 20-40 services I like and skipping the others? Nothing, except your love of St. Stephen, all its different people, your willingness to grow in the gospel and in grace, and your sheer desire to hear and visit Pastor John every. single. week.

Okay, let's switch it up. What does this mean for Sunday School and choir? Good question.

Is that your answer? Because, if so, it's not a very good one. No, my answer is that choir is moving their practice. Sunday School will still meet, but as 'Pathfinders'. It will overlap with and run concurrent to the 10:00 service; it will end in time for families to Commune together. In this format, we'll call it Pathfinders. The Adult Forum is probably the most effected – but St. Stephen is bolstering its Thursday night lineup to include more educational activities – including bible study sessions called Table Talks, brewery nights, and book and theology and film nights. We are also going to utilize the 11:00 – 12:00 time slot as a Participation hour, which will offer things of interest to different people at different times like God's Work Our Hands Outings, kids and youth activities, and occasional worship services, service opportunities, and fellowship events.

Huh? Somewhere in there, did you say concurrent? Yes, but the point here is about making Christian Education as accessible to as many people as possible, helping families enjoy what best fits their situation, AND E.P.I.C. worship.

All that's really happening time wise is that the old 'late' service is flip-flopping with the old 'Sunday School' hour, and both things – worship and Christian Education and Participation will be done better and better.

The evening studies for adults have been well received in recent years and sitting in worship with kids – although still possible – need not be so anxiety inducing. I also said Participation hour. This way, families and kids will have options.

What else? I am removing weekly children's sermons from both services and will be doing these at Pathfinders or Participate instead.

Oh no - that's my favorite part! Well, they're still going to happen from time to time; but, it's also going to mean more scripture, more verses of songs, better participation, and seasonally appropriate prayers and connectivity.

So, bottom line, what does this mean for St. Stephen? St. Stephen is unique. God has formed us and molded us in a unique way. But, at the same time, St. Stephen has always been about its mission – about its being grounded in the Word and its calling in the world. And all of this has to do with continuing to be molded and called, but also in the world as it currently looks. Stow, Ohio needs the gospel and this is our way to proclaim it E.P.I.C.-ly!

My Absolute Darling—Tallent

(.5 out of 5 Stars)

Oh my word, this book was not at all what I thought it was. My normal, in-depth vetting process let one through! Several scenes in this book are disturbing and the all-too-quick-I've-gotten-over-it ending makes them even worse. I cannot recommend this book.

Manhattan Beach—Egan

(2.5 out of 5 Stars)

Egan has a book called A Visit from the Goon Squad that is creative, original, and enjoyable; so I thought I'd try to read her again. Manhattan Beach isn't bad – it is a period novel that takes place in the U.S. during WWII – but it is never quite the crime noir it bills itself as, and it is not Goon Squad. It deals with womanhood in this era and is a fairly quick and reasonably engrossing read.

The Truth about the Harry Quebert Affair—Dicker

(3.5 out of 5 Stars)

So meta! Written by a European and set on the East Coast of the U.S., with so many twists and turns and some intertwining asides it ends up being deeper than its story. Although it went one twist too far for me, it's very readable. Think French author writing an American *Girl with the Dragon Tattoo*-type story about a writer in the process of his master piece while having the narrator comment on writing and getting published.

Before Mars—Newman

(3.5 out of 5 Stars)

I consistently tell people that I do not like science fiction; but then I read a book like this and discover that is either untrue or that maybe truly great science fiction is okay? The story and the mystery of this book are okay. The science fiction elements are fairly subtle. But the philosophy, or the message about existence – that lies behind the narrative and the genre tricks – are great.

Benediction—Haruf

(4 out of 5 Stars)

Haruf has a whole series of books set in the fictional town of Holt, Colorado. Each of them are good. This is the finale in the *Plainsong/Eventide* trilogy. The writing mirrors the setting. The stories are simple but powerful. If you want a book that takes you to a place, gives you pretty real stories, and somehow elegantly speaks to you through simple means, this series is for you. I mean, who would think such simple dialog and subdued story lines could be so affecting?

Winter's Bone—Woodall

(2.5 out of 5 Stars)

Set in the Ozarks, Winter's Bone – through both dialog and content – will truly take you there. I couldn't quite get into it; but, again, this is fairly simple read, it has a who-dunnit-type plot (although I felt like I always knew who-dunnit and I am almost never capable of this), and it really, really captures a place and a time.

The Browns Blues—Pluto

(3 out of 5 Stars)

Training camp is here! This is our year! Pluto writes another Indians/Cavs/Browns book and I keep reading them all. Pluto is a newspaper man and this book is a kind-of a compendium of his articles over the years, so it's not a hard read. In the end, I liked *Things I Learned from Watching the Browns* and *False Start* better (this book rehashes a lot of the content of these two books, meshing those two ideas into one); but I read a book by Pluto at least once every year and I never regret it. (Thanks J.H.!)

Patrimony—Roth

(3.5 out of 5 Stars)

I am a moderate Philip Roth fan. I am not much of an autobiography reader. Thus, I thought this would be less enjoyable than it was. *Patrimony* is probably my favorite Roth book. It is about the last couple years of his father's life after being diagnosed with a weird, benign brain tumor. It's poignant and funny. If you've ever gone through the death process with a loved one, it may hit too close to home. Like all of Roth, it is strongly Jewish in content; but, for me, unlike other Roth books, this book transcends that and is universal.

How Soccer Explains the World—Foer

(2 out of 5 Stars)

If I read a Browns book every year before training camp, I also read a soccer book every year just as the season gets under way. This book tried to explain globalization by telling soccer stories. Having read them elsewhere, I had heard all of the stories before. The link to globalization and its ramifications was never all too direct. Maybe Foer is on to something, maybe not. But, hey, I'm talking about a book about soccer – so that's something!

Business:

The council has tried to become more efficient in our regular council meeting, so there are things that come out during the month that need to be address electronically. Below is one of those times. Michelle Amato made the motion to accept these requests and Gary Reynolds seconded. Motion carried.

- I. Connie Wilson has asked about a fundraiser for the Bell Choir:
- 2. As most of you may know, we had an issue with water entering into the church just outside the sanctuary. We had a 40lb raccoon decide to make a nice home for himself in our building. Unfortunately he had left behind some damaged drywall and it also affected the newly painted ceiling. We are in the process of getting estimates for the drywall repair and repainting the portions that need it.
- 3. Pastor had met with a local AA Chapter recently. They have been meeting at a Church in Silver Lake for over 30 years and are looking for a new location. They currently pay \$600 a year and would pay us the same amount. The meetings are on Saturday evenings and can be done in such a way so as to keep them separate from other events that take place
- 4. As we are now in the summer months, the flower beds are flourishing with weeds. We seem to have this same issue come up during the nicer months of the year. I had a thought of bringing this to our congregation. I was thinking of having members "adopt-a-spot". They can adopt a spot for the next year and they can maintain and plant what they would like to see in their own spot. Taking on a small area seems to be more doable and easier on people instead of looking at the entire flower beds surrounding our church. They can make it a family event of their own and do this at on their own time and not one set date and time that we deem. We aren't asking for money, just some time to at least maintain their spot. If they want to plant flowers great, if not great (some sections don't need any more plants in certain areas), just maintain their own section.

Opening:

Gary Reynolds opened with prayer.

Minutes:

Gary Reynolds made the motion to approve the May Council minutes. Tim Johnson seconded. Motion carried.

Old Business:

The scholarship fund was again discussed and no decision to set up until further information on the correct way to proceed.

The raccoon is still a problem and has caused damage in the narthex, an estimate of \$1,800 for repairs.

This estimate does not include painting only drywall work. The trap has been reset and hopefully the problem will be solved. Gary Reynolds will talk to Brian Clark and get at least two estimated to repair the walls.

Parking lot entrance into the back of the church has had only one estimate of \$880.00, and Gary will proceed with getting two more estimates.

A motion has been made to change the worship time changes to 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. throughout the year. After much discussion and Pastor explaining how this will help our congregation, Ed Holland made the motion to accept the change and Michelle Amato seconded. Motion carried. (Dan Camburn voted yes electronically.)

New Business:

Ed Holland has worked with Jane Hecht and Bill Choler to help change and clarify the financial reports that are given to council. Banker's report to be streamlined, and Endowment reporting needs to be updated with the Endowment committee. Ed went over the Banker's report and Treasurer's report line by line.

Ed Holland made a motion to authorize Gary Reynolds a limit of \$900.00 for the repair of the parking lot entrance. Sherry Petrosky seconded and motion carried.

The goal for this coming year budget is to have a draft by the Oct. council meeting. Ed asked the council members to talk with their ministries and to see their needs for the coming year. Stewardship was discussed in length and the need is to promote online giving.

Financials:

May and June financials were reviewed and Gary Reynolds made the motion to approve and Tim Johnson seconded, motion carried.

Sherry Petrosky made the motion to close the meeting, seconded by Ed Holland. Motion carried.

Pastor closed with prayer.
