

Food And Volunteers Are Needed

Letter carriers in Lee County are gearing up for the 26th annual national letter carrier food drive. The nation's largest single-day food drive, "Stamp Out Hunger," will be held on Saturday, May 12. This is the one day when letter carriers collect nonperishable food that has been left by mailboxes. The



United Way is a partner agency with the letter carriers and the food drive.

Most food collected in Lee County will be distributed by the Harry Chapin Food Bank through their participating agencies in the county. All food collected in food drives are distributed to participating agencies at no cost. Virtually any kind of food may be donated in unopened, nonbreakable containers. Items especially in need are peanut butter, tuna, rice, beans, and canned meats, fruits, vegetables, and soups.

Those who will not be able to leave food on May 12 can drop off their contributions at any post office.

Volunteers are needed to both help letter carriers collect the food and to help sort the food once it has been collected. Volunteers wishing to assist letter carriers with their preliminary food sorting should contact Tanya Phillips at Harry

Catch The Action

May Fishing

May is a month that ranks high on the list for best months for fishing the waters of Southwest Florida. One could argue it's the best month for chasing big fish.

Tarpon season is at its peak, if you want to hook into a big tarpon, this is the time to do it. Large schools will gather off the beaches, as well as in Charlotte Harbor, Pine Island Sound, San Carlos Bay, and other inshore waters. Tarpon, aka the Silver King, will also be hanging around the Sanibel Causeway, Big Carlos Bridge and the Gulf passes with Boca Grande getting the most attention. It's common to see a hundred boats or better on any given day tarpon fishing Boca Grande Pass, if you are going to fish there do your homework first.

Sharks of all sizes invade our waters anywhere from the shallow inshore flats to offshore. Many of the larger females including bull, lemon, and blacktip move into our inshore waters to give birth to their babies. Sharks are a very underrated game fish. When caught on moderate tackle they are an absolute blast, especially high-flying blacktip and spinners. Be very careful when handling them, or better yet leave them in the water at boat side. If you cannot easily remove the hook, cut the leader as close to the hook as possible.

It's time for big snook to head for the Gulf passes and nearby areas for their upcoming summer spawning session. Snook season is closed through the summer, if you catch one please handle it with extra care for a safe release. Never hang a large fish from its lips or mouth; this has proven to do irreversible damage to the heavier fish, likely leading to its death, plus it's illegal. It's best to not remove a big fish from the water at all, not just snook, but any big fish to be released.

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Hooking a redfish should get more consistent heading into the month. Calm mornings give sight fishermen on the skinny flats some great opportunities at stalking tailing fish. Look for good fishing under the shade of the mangroves on the midday high tides. Redfish may run from sub legal of



less than 18 inches up to 30 inches or better.

Of all fish, mangrove snapper is my favorite on the table. They aren't the biggest fish around, but they fight incredibly hard for their size and offer excellent table fare. As we move closer to summer expect good numbers of snapper throughout the inshore waters, the Gulf passes, and nearshore reefs.

This is a month to be prepared for anything; you never know what you might run into. I like to always keep a large rig handy, just in case. If you are targeting tarpon or sharks you will already have the heavy arsenal out, but if you are just having fun on the flats with trout you never know when that once in a lifetime cobia or school of tarpon might show up. Preparation and awareness is the key. Have a rod that will handle the job rigged and ready and pay attention or that trophy fish might just swim right by without you even knowing it. Weather should be good and fishing even better. Get out there and take advantage of it!

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Now Hear This

Hearing Loss Need Not Be A Struggle For All Involved

Robert Seidler, a seasoned filmmaker, ruptured both eardrums while filming in an experimental aircraft. As an avid bicyclist, Seidler had always found that riding created a "Zen-like" environment where he could talk about important issues with those he loved. However, as his hearing worsened, this special environment fell silent. He became increasingly depressed and withdrawn, describing the loss as "profound as a death."

Seidler's family and friends shared how his hearing loss affected them during an interview for an online docuseries, *It's Your Choice*. Seidler's daughter said, "Whenever I try to talk to him, I have to repeat everything at least once. Conversation loses its momentum." Meanwhile, Seidler's wife expressed concern that while biking he might miss sounds alerting him to oncoming dangers. One of Seidler's closest friends shared the frustration that friends and family of a person with hearing loss will recognize: "Would you please get a hearing aid? Why won't you do this?"

Frustrations Associated With Hearing Loss

For the person with limited hearing, the negative emotions often include:

• Loneliness due to withdrawal from social situations because of inability to keep up with conversations

Embarrassment when misunderstanding what others say
Fear their disability will contribute to people thinking they're "old" or "infirm"

• Frustration at not being able to easily understand speech or audio from TV and movies

• Anxiety, stress and grief that can contribute to depression. But they're not the only ones affected. Friends feel hurt when their invitations to come over or go out on the town are always turned down. Family members run low on patience

having to repeat themselves constantly, shout to be heard, and live with the television volume so loud it's painful. **Confronting Hearing Loss**

Seidler finally met with a hearing care professional who diagnosed him as having a high-frequency loss and fitted him with a pair of hearing aids. During his first bike ride afterward, he discovered he could hold conversations with ease. "The last time I heard like today, I was in my 20s," Seidler said. "I'm 65 now. Pretty magical!" His family and friends think the change is "pretty magical," too.

Hearing aids do much more than help you hear. They transform the way wearers like Seidler interact with the world, relieving negative emotions and improving interpersonal relationships. If you have hearing loss but have been putting off doing something about it, consider how it affects your life – and everyone in it.



Eagle Ridge Kids Play At All Levels Of Little League Baseball

The South Fort Myers Little League (SFMLL) is the organization chartered by Little League Baseball in Williamsport, Pa., for the area encompassing Eagle Ridge. Eleven Eagle Ridge kids are represented among the 400 players on 36 teams in five divisions of the SFMLL.

Tee Ball is the first stage of the system where 4- and 5-yearolds hit off of a tee, run the bases and learn to field batted balls. **Brady Portu** is an Oriole.

Grapefruit (machine pitch) is where the 6- to 7-year-olds learn to hit a moving ball coming at a consistent speed. **Josslyn Downey** is on the Grapefruit Marlins.

Minors is the next step where kids learn how to hit live pitching and begin pitching. **Canon Trombetti** is on the Cubs, **Jackson and Jamison Downey** are Dodgers and **Christian Erwin** plays for the Twins. Majors is the flagship of Little League Baseball played by 10- to 12-year-olds. **Dylan Thomas** is a Dodger, **Garrett Jones** plays for the Marlins and **Jordan Downey** is a member of the White Sox.

Cool Blueberry Summer Salad For Two

2 cups baby spinach leaves, rinsed and drained 1/4 cup fresh blueberries, cleaned and drained (If you really like blueberries you can add a little more).

- 1 to 2 tablespoons crumbled blue cheese
- 1 to 2 tablespoons low-fat balsamic vinaigrette

Mailbox Maintenance And Repair

Mailbox doors have a closure spring that eventually breaks after thousands of openings. It is important to replace them as soon as they are discovered as they usually result in a broken door, which is a much more expensive repair. Call Dennis Shelley, (239) 887-1042. The cost of installing a new spring is \$34. If the door casting breaks, it costs an additional \$112 to repair the door. Dennis also has specially

manufactured flagpole holders to match the lampposts. They are available for \$89 installed. Your mailbox and lamppost can also be repainted for \$49, which will bring them back to their "like-new" appearance. Dennis also offers handyman services.



Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early.
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.
- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.



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
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
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
