
This year's class population runs from 4 to 30 students per class. With smaller classes, teachers find it much easier to expand themselves to individual students who need or want to improve their studies.

This is why MHS teachers and students have always had a good sense of communication; possibly now more than ever.








The Magdalena Varsity Volleyball team posted their best season in several years by ending the season 14-3 and placing second in district. They followed that act by placing third in regionals.








Magdalena shows perfect box-out form against the Hope Huskies.







## Shop




Friday the 26th the Juniors threw a party for the Freshmen. The party included food, drinks, and games. All in all, everyone had fun during Freshmen Initiation.




