




Hotel Floor Plan

SURGICAL MANAGEMENT OF ADVANCED RECTAL POLYPS: TAMIS & BEYOND


Dr. Shady Ashamalla is a minimally invasive surgical oncologist and Head of General Surgery at Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre in Toronto. Having completed fellowship training in both Minimally Invasive Surgery and General Surgical Oncology at the University of Toronto, Dr. Ashamalla married the two in order to exclusively dedicate his clinical practice to the surgical management of colon and rectal cancers at all stages. Dr. Ashamalla has been a leader in colorectal cancer innovation and management and has not only successfully implemented new technology into his own practice but has been a driving force behind advancing the field safely and effectively in Canada.

He was appointed assistant professor at the University of Toronto with an academic focus in knowledge translation, surgical simulation and education and has utilized his academic expertise in these areas to develop novel methodology for improving the minimally invasive management of colorectal cancer in Canada. Dr. Ashamalla has published many scientific peer reviewed journals in this field and most recently hosted hundreds of surgeons at the Canadian TaTME Congress, for the introduction of this new novel approach to rectal cancer. Dr. Ashamalla created and directed the Canadian TaTME Proctorship Network in an effort to safely disseminate this technique nationally. Internationally, he has taught several courses and given lectures on adopting minimally invasive surgery as a philosophy of care and has received multiple awards for these efforts.

OVERVIEW:

This session will introduce the new surgical technology being utilized in the management of endoscopically unresectable rectal lesions and early rectal cancers. We will review the evidence behind trans anal minimally invasive surgery (TAMIS) and the indications for its implementation as well as the patient results associated with its usage. We will also introduce trans anal total mesorectal excisions (TaTME) for advanced rectal cancer and surgical interventions being utilized for definitive treatment of rectal cancers.

Dr. Haber joined the faculty of NYU Langone Medical Center as Chief of Endoscopy and Director of Dr. Advanced Therapeutics and Innovation in the Division of Gastroenterology, Department of Medicine.

After receiving his medical degree from the University of Toronto, Dr. Haber completed his training in internal medicine and gastroenterology. He subsequently received a grant from the Medical Research Council of Canada to do post-graduate research in bile acid metabolism at the Bristol Royal Infirmary in Bristol, England. He returned to the University of Toronto as a consultant gastroenterologist where he practiced and trained numerous gastroenterology fellows. In 2004, he was recruited to serve as Director of Gastroenterology and Director of the Center for Advance Therapeutic Endoscopy at Lenox Hill Hospital, New York.


Dr. Haber has contributed over 100 scientific publications to the literature, and has given more than 400 presentations at educational seminars and national and international conferences. He organizes and serves as a course director and featured presenter for the live endoscopy demonstrations and teleconferences provided at the New York Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy annual course. In 2010, he was the recipient of the Master of Endoscopy Award, presented annually by the American Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy.






DEBATE: Fit Positive Colonoscopies Should Not Be Performed In Out-Of-Hospital Facilities

Dr. Alaa Rostom is the Chair of the Division of Gastroenterology at the Ottawa Hospital / University of Ottawa and the endoscopy and colorectal Cancer Screening lead for the Champlain Region.


Dr. Rostom returned to Ottawa from the University of Calgary where he spent 7 years planning and implementing the Calgary zone colorectal cancer screening program. He was the Education Chair of the Canadian Association of Gastroenterology, and Chief Examiner for Gastroenterology for the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada. Dr. Rostom is highly involved in endoscopy skills training and Endoscopy Quality. He currently co-chairstheCanadianAssociationofGastroenterology'sSkills enhancement in Endoscopy Program. Dr. Rostom's research interests include research and clinical trial methodology, systematic reviews, patient reported outcomes, and knowledge dissemination. He has conducted extensive research in the areas of GI toxicity of NSAIDs, COX-2 Inhibitors, Celiac Disease, and colonoscopy preparation. Dr. Rostom has participated in and conducted consensus conferences on Celiac Disease, NSAID/COX-2 Inhibitors, and GI bleeding.

CON: Dr. Andrew Bellin

Dr. Andrew Bellini obtained his medical degree and did his post graduate training in Gastroenterology at the University of Toronto. He has been in community practice in Brampton since 1997. His current roles include Medical Director of the Scope Clinic, President of the Ontario Association of Clinic Endoscopists, Chair of the OMA Medical Interest Group of Clinic Endoscopists, and Regional Director for Endoscopy for Mississauga Halton Central West.

Colon Cancer Check plans to implement FIT testing in Ontario in 2018. There will be implications to colonoscopy. Previous experience predicts increased patient and primary care preference and increase participation compared with FOBT. Increased colonoscopy demand is anticipated. FIT positive cases have higher chance of cancer, adenoma, and especially advanced adenoma compared with FOBT or Average Risk colonoscopy. No increase in colonoscopy capacity is available and FIT+ cases may replace average risk screening volumes. Advanced polypectomy will more often be required for these cases and increased case time, case cost, and endoscopist expertise is anticipated. Which endoscopists and which facilities should be performing FIT+ cases? This debate reviews some of these issues and focuses on whether FIT+ cases should be performed in hospitals only or should be performed in OHPs as well.



PROVIDER REPORTING FOR COLONOSCOPY: Lessons Learned From Ontario's Randomized Controlled Trial & Next Steps


Dr. Jill Tinmouth is a Gastroenterologist and a Clinical Epidemiologist. She attended New York University School of Medicine (1995) and completed her fellowships in Internal Medicine (1999) and Gastroenterology (2000) at the University of Toronto. Subsequently, she pursued further study in Clinical Epidemiology, receiving her PhD in 2004 from the University of Toronto. She is currently appointed as a Staff Physician at Sunnybrook Health Sciences Center, as Scientist at the Sunnybrook Research Institute., as an Adjunct Scientist at the Institute for Clinical Evaluative Sciences, as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto and is cross-appointed to the Department of Health Policy Management and Evaluation. She was appointed as the Lead Scientist for Ontario's colorectal cancer screening program, ColonCancerCheck, in May 2011.

She is an expert in cancer screening and gastrointestinal disease. Her research focuses on screening for gastrointestinal cancers, including cancers of the colon, esophagus and anus, as well as on quality improvement and health service utilization of gastrointestinal services in Ontario. She has received funding from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, the Canadian Cancer Society Research Institute, Canadian Association of Gastroenterology, the Canadian HIV Trials Network, the Ontario Institute of Cancer Research and the Ontario HIV Treatment Network.

OVERVIEW:

The importance of high quality colonoscopy is increasingly recognized, leading to quality improvement initiatives, including the use of audit and feedback reports, in a variety of jurisdictions. Recent data on the quality of colonoscopy in Ontario will be presented. The principles and effectiveness of audit and feedback will be reviewed, with particular attention to colonoscopy. A randomized controlled trial of colonoscopy provider (audit and feedback) reports is currently being conducted in Ontario; the design of this trial and early findings will be presented. Possible next steps, including ongoing provider reporting through the Quality Management Partnership, will be discussed.




OVERVIEW:

OHP endoscopy in Ontario continues to contribute significantly to delivery of high quality endoscopy in large volumes. Sustainability of OHP endoscopy continues to be threatened by lack of funding for operational costs and ongoing reductions on physician professional fees. OHP endoscopy has been slower to develop in other provinces. In Quebec, this year, the majority of OHP clinics have closed due provincial government crackdown on Accessory Fees. Many of us who practice in OHP facilities, feel that expansion of appropriate endoscopy services to high quality, community specialty clinics (OHPs) represents the logical next step for Canada. Government and physician organizations are uninformed and sometimes suspicious of OHP endoscopy and it often exists in isolation from hospital based practice and mainstream connections to the GI and GS community. This panel discussion is a first step to create dialog and understanding within the Canadian Endoscopist community.


