"Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good," declares the first line of Psalm 136. Goodness is fundamental to all God is and does. "We know God is love (see 1st John 4 verses 8 & 16)," writes commentator David Gruzik, "and that love is an expression of His goodness." Psalm 136 proclaims this by repeating the same words in the second half of all its 26 verses, "for His steadfast loves endures forever." A corporate praise psalm, a priest or worship leader would call out the reason to give God thanks, the first half of each of Psalm 136's verses, and then the congregation would respond with the second half, "for His steadfast love endures forever." With Palm Sunday and Easter Day only a few weeks away – I thought I would attempt a humble comparison to inspired Scripture, imitation of Psalm 136. After reading each verse, please repeat the words in bold print down the side, FOR HIS STEADFAST LOVE ENDURES FOREVER.

- ¹ Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good all the time,
- ² And all the time He is good, for that is His nature,
- ³ Give thanks to the Lord for He is the Creator of all,
- 4 to Him for the natural beauty that surrounds us,
- ⁵ Mt. Washington and the Whites; fifty-two with a view and the 4,000 footers all forty-eight,
- ⁶ Franconia Notch and the Old Man, I can still see him there looking majestically to the South,
- ⁷ the lakes and streams; the Pemi and Flume, Campton Falls,
- 8 to Him who formed this congregation on June 1st, 1774,
- ⁹ meeting in various homes and adopting a creed and covenant in 1807.
- ¹⁰ to Him who sustained it through the many pastors and controversies,
- ¹¹ and brought it through difficult times and challenges, taking a stand against slavery in 1839,
- ¹² providing a place to meet for worship, moved to the current site from across the river in 1858,
- ¹³ for sustaining Campton Congregational these two hundred and fifty years, plus one,
- ¹⁴ to Him for His provision today,
- ¹⁵ for strong and secure financials, and a treasurer when we needed one,
- ¹⁶ and when we needed a musician to lead us and choir, a retired music teacher,
- ¹⁷ for a new church administrator,
- 18 the kitchen crew; for coffee hour every Sunday, summer cookouts and potlucks,
- ¹⁹ the Ladies' Guild; for friendship and fellowship, the Christmas fairs too.
- ²⁰ for detailed meeting minutes, and meeting moderation, dedicated deacons,
- ²¹ those who go beyond the call of duty, even venturing into the dark, dusty crawl spaces,
- ²² those who serve behind the scenes; prayer warriors, ride givers, note writers and call makers,
- ²³ for those who serve in mission, in the community and throughout the world,
- ²⁴ It is He who never leaves us nor forsakes us,
- ²⁵ He who unites and binds us together,
- ²⁶ Give thanks to the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; three in one, one in three, blessed Trinity,

As I give thanks for you all, every one; for your support and encouragement. I hope you are planning to join us for Palm Sunday, Sunrise on Ellsworth Hill, and Easter Day worship. Bring your neighbors and friends. Let's praise and worship! May the Lord bless you and keep you, and be gracious to you, *for His steadfast love endures forever*.

Easter, Did you know...

Easter is rich with traditions, symbolism, and fascinating history. Here are some lesser-known and interesting Easter tidbits:

- 1. The Name "Easter": The word "Easter" is believed to have derived from Eostre, an Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring and fertility. However, in many languages, the name for Easter comes from "Pascha," which is related to Passover.
- 2. Eggs as Symbols: The Easter egg tradition predates Christianity and was originally a symbol of fertility and new life in various ancient cultures. Early Christians adapted this tradition, with eggs symbolizing Jesus' resurrection and the promise of eternal life.
- 3. Easter in Different Dates: Eastern Orthodox and Western Christian churches often celebrate Easter on different dates due to variations in their liturgical calendars. The date for Easter is calculated as the first Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinox.
- 4. Hot Cross Buns: These sweet, spiced buns with a cross on top have roots in ancient pagan traditions and were later Christianized to represent the crucifixion. In the 16th century, Queen Elizabeth I limited their sale to specific occasions, like Good Friday.
- 5. World's Largest Easter Egg: The world's largest Easter egg is in Vegreville, Canada. It's over 31 feet tall and was created to honor the town's Ukrainian heritage.
- 6. Easter Lilies: The white Easter lily symbolizes purity and resurrection, making it a popular decoration during Easter services. Its trumpet-like shape is thought to represent the trumpets heralding Jesus' resurrection.
