


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### **From Freedom to being Free to Live Again: The Journey of Six Mustangs**

Four years ago, a stallion and three mares were adopted from the Bureau of Land Management and found their way to southern Maryland. The owner had limited knowledge about horse care, and she put the horses together in a backyard field about two acres in size. Within a year, the horses were in another bad situation. Her lack of knowledge resulted in the birth of two mustang foals, one mare pregnant, and another mare dead from starvation.

Freedom Hill Horse Rescue stepped in on September 11, 2011, after receiving a phone call from a family member about the condition of the

horses and the death of one mare. It was too late for the mare, but the other five were brought to the rescue and given a chance for a new life. They were named El Dorado, Takoda, Liberty, Apple and Maverick. Takoda, at the time weighing 250 pounds less than her normal weight, was nursing both the foals, Apple and Maverick. The stallion, El Dorado, was gelded and it was a couple months later volunteers learned the second mare, Liberty, was expecting and later gave birth to a healthy colt, Freedom.

Today, all six mustangs are living full and happy lives, but it was a long journey with many moves and hardships along the way.

***New Homes, New Lives***

Mustangs have become an iconic symbol of the American West, yet their free-roaming lives have changed dramatically from decades ago. Today's mustangs, still known for their stamina, speed and grace, are loyal companions to people who love them.

Our adopters refer to their mustangs as smart, willing, spunky, loveable, observant, and friendly. All of which certainly capture the nature of a Mustang.

El Dorado, the foundation of this family tree, is absolutely stunning, smart, confident and easy going. His adopter, Donata, sensed he didn't want to be called "Ed," and now he travels the trails known as Apollo. He and Donata, who always wanted a mustang, love to explore Maryland's most beautiful trails and have participated in the Bill Mills Memorial Trail Ride at Fair Hill for the past two years. She takes him through stream crossings, fields, forests, overpasses, and covered bridges while riding in a bitless bridle. Of course, Apollo still exhibits youthful playfulness and looks for things to keep him busy. Apollo even decided to make his own renovations to his pasture. Donata told us, "Apollo is very adept at pulling the posts (that divide the pasture with electric polytape) out of the ground. He knows where to pull on them without getting zapped."

Liberty, also known as Libby, was adopted because of her calm disposition. No one can deny the fact that she is gorgeous too! Her new best friend and adopter, Gloria, says she fell in love with Libby because of her size, unique coloring, and natural

smooth trot. She is very comfortable to ride. Gloria shares, “One thing I find interesting about Libby is that wherever we go, every person and horse that she meets, falls head over heels for her. She can be very social in her own horsey way with people and other horses.” Libby is spending plenty of time on the trails, like Apollo, but is currently at Crandell’s Horse Works for some refresher training. In fact, Jason Crandell started both Apollo and Libby under saddle when they were brought to Freedom Hill. Jason, who says he’s never met a mustang he didn’t like, enjoyed working with both of them. When he heard that Libby was pregnant, he expressed interest in her unborn foal and the rest is history. Freedom was born at Freedom Hill in August 2012 and was at his new home in West River that October.

Like his sire, Freedom has also found a new name. “When you go in his field,” Jason says, “he shadows you.” With a horse that follows you everywhere, Shadow became the perfect name. Shadow is so much like Apollo and Libby: stunning, confident, playful, curious and smart. Jason has been working with him from the beginning and his training is progressing nicely. Shadow knows groundwork, drags barrels, walks on tarps, accepts a saddle and bridle, and has allowed Jason to sit on him; of course no riding until he’s a little older. This is the perfect home for Shadow, and Jason certainly knows how to keep his mind busy.

A few months Shadow’s senior is Maverick. When we asked Shelby why she decided to adopt Maverick, she explained, “Maverick and I just seemed to have an unspoken connection. The first time that I looked at him and he looked at me, it was as if he had chosen me. We are the best of friends and he is an amazing horse.” She also tells us that “even though he has training, (he still has) the spirit of a mustang. He is super playful and loves to antagonize his field-mates.” On frequent visits to the farm, Shelby and her sister often see Maverick “dancing around in the field.” We certainly agree with Shelby that the horses choose you, and the connection and bond is one of the most important factors in making an adoption a good fit.

### **Why Choose a Rescue Horse?**

These four mustangs have wonderful new homes, new jobs and new friends. Their owners may be very different, but they have one thing in common; they wanted to provide a loving home to a horse that deserves a second chance. At Freedom Hill Horse Rescue, we couldn’t agree more with Shelby, who shared why she chose a rescue, “these animals didn’t choose to be neglected, mistreated, abused, or ignored and that is a life that they didn’t deserve. By adopting a rescue, you give that horse a new chance at life.” She suggests, “if you are ever looking for a horse, check the rescues first, these animals deserve the love and compassion of a good family and they turn out to be the most wonderful companions.” Donata agrees, saying, “I think that it is wonderful the work and dedication that the rescue groups perform to give these horses a chance to better their lives and the lives of their new human partners.”

***It was a long journey for these mustangs and the road was not easy. But, this story has four happy endings with two yet to be written. Will you help create the next happy ending?***


## Spotlight on Education

The mission of Freedom Hill Horse Rescue includes educational programming to increase awareness of equine abuse and neglect, teach horsemanship and the proper care of horses, provide training for volunteers, and give youth the opportunity to learn about themselves and others through equine-assisted activities. In addition to hosting groups on-site, FHHR brought the barn to the community on Help a Horse Day and will be a featured farm in the Calvert County Farm Festival this October.

FHHR's Equine Connections program, an eight-week program for youth to learn about horsemanship and horse care, wrapped up last week. This program was started to connect kids in grades 1-8 to the wonderful world of horses. Students, in small groups, spend one hour each week at the rescue to get hands on experience with horses. They learn proper grooming, how to halter and lead a horse, safety around horses, horse characteristics and personalities, as well as why horses end up in rescues. The students love grooming and spending time with the horses. Kaleb Truax, age 7, said his favorite part of the program was, "giving Takoda a bath." One of the parents, whose daughter is only 6 and had never experienced horses before, was so pleased with her daughter Gillian's experience that she is signing her up for horseback riding lessons and hopes to attend the program again next year. She recently read about a study that shows "youth who are involved with horses have lower stress levels." This is just one more reason to join programs like Equine Connections. At FHHR, we love connecting young people to the world of horses and giving them an experience they will never forget.
