





150 Years Ago Today

June 5, 1866: In Atlanta – From the “The Intelligencer”: *“Will do to Marry—There is a woman residing out west who can plow, fish, nurse, and sing all at once. She yokes the oxen to her plow; then stowing her twin babies in a corn basket, suspends it to a tree; attaches the cow bell to the end of her fishing rod, which is forced into the ground at the water’s edge; she then drives her team, and every time she comes opposite her babes the serial cradle receives a send, which keeps it vibrating until she performs another circuit round her ‘land’ practicing in the meantime various pieces of sacred music; and I a thoughtless fish swallows her baited hook the obedient bell informs her, when she runs across the field and straightway hauls the victim ashore. The value of the heroine of this story, compared to sickly sentimentals who can’t snuff the fresh air without being ‘very apprehensive of a violent cold’ is incalculable. We’ll pay a premium for her life.”* (I think the article describes 16th GA women

June 16, 1866: In Atlanta, The “Intelligencer” publishes a letter from E.J. Christy, publisher of the “Watchman” of Athens, GA: *“For the first time since the war, we visited this thriving town (Atlanta) the other day. From Greensboro to the city, all along the line of the Georgia Railroad—at every village and every station—and even between the stations—every step of the way is crowded with evidence of the desolations of war. The ruins of the burnt villages and railroad depots, the wrecks of locomotive engines and railway cars, the remains of saw-mills and workshops, the bent iron rails which are strewn along the whole length of the track. Reaching the city, the eye familiar with its former exuberant prosperity, recognizes among the ruins a few of the landmarks of former days, such as the Medical College, the Exchange Hotel, most of the Churches, and a considerable number of houses on Marietta and other streets—some of them scarred by shot and shell, but still in good condition. Notwithstanding vast numbers of new edifices have been erected, the chimneys and portions of walls still standing like grim sentinels watching over the ruins of former prosperity, fill the mind of the beholder with melancholy thoughts and vain regrets.”*

THE AMERICAN SOLDIER



The United States of America has enjoyed a season of peace for only 21 years since it was founded. There have been no peacetime presidents. 93% of the time, this Nation has been at War since 1776.

There has always been a great need for the American soldier. Although they have worn many different uniforms, most have been volunteers from middle-class America. They were farmers, merchants, brick layers, mechanics, doctors, athletes, plumbers, clerks, bankers, students, carpenters, lawyers from the very wealthy to the most indigent. They sprung from every ethnic group; fathers, sons, uncles, cousins and, even daughters, sisters and mothers. They were the wide-eyed young, the older and the middle-aged, who held all the tender feelings of domestic life as well as the natural courage to withstand shocking scenes of war.

The enemy soldiers they faced said they were reckless and brave, honorable, a good example to other troops, steadfast, compassionate, respectful, easy-going,

religious, good-natured, kind-hearted, reliable, fearless, impressive warriors, obedient, organized, dedicated, dependable, and disciplined.

The American soldier has remained largely unchanged from the Revolutionary War to the present day, reflecting who we are as a nation - our character, our strength, and of course our resolve. The U.S. soldier is immediately recognized anywhere as the champion of freedom and democracy, prepared to bleed and sometimes die on foreign soil for an ideal or national goal. Just ordinary people, thrust into extraordinary events.

We may not be able to perfectly describe the American soldier, but one thing is certain. We are forever in the debt of these gallant men and women.

ABOUT THE PICTURES: Compatriot Bruce Whitehead shared these magnificent photographs of his dad, John Thomas Whitehead (Grandfather of Joel, Charles and Matthew Whitehead). The top picture was taken when he was in England before D Day . He was a combat engineer with the 358th . Their unit went over to Normandy and construct The Mulberry Harbor which enabled the landing supplies for the combat units - one of the greatest engineering feats of World War II . 

A FEW DETAILS

The Kentucky Department of Parks is hosting the event. Military organizations responsible to the Kentucky Department of Parks are the Western Federal Blues, and the Southern Division. They successfully planned and executed the 150th Anniversary Event. Your money will go for preservation. The H.P. Bottoms Farm will be used during 2016. This ground has not been used since the original battle You will be on the ground upon which the armies of North and South engaged to determine the destiny of Kentucky. The event will take place on October 7-9, 2016. There will be an all day unscripted tactical on Friday, a sunrise battle and "The Cornfield" on Saturday. The "Fight for the Bottom's Farm" occurs on Sunday afternoon. There will be camping areas for campaigners, fixed military camps, and an authentic civilian area. There will be a mixed camp for civilians and military camping together. There is no modern camping on the park. Every effort will be made to maintain historic authenticity throughout the event. Due to the nature of the event we cannot permit walk-ons. All participants will need to sign a waiver when arriving at Perryville Battlefield. Parents will sign waivers for participants under 18 years of age. Waivers cannot be submitted online - since an actual signature is needed and must be **SIGNED IN PERSON**. The waiver is available online and can be printed out to be submitted in person at the event. Having your waiver already filled out will help streamline the onsite registration process - **but you must SIGN THE WAIVER in the presence of registration staff.**

In addition to this, I believe the North is about to wage a brutal and unholy war on a people who have done them no wrong, in violation of the Constitution and the fundamental principles of the government...We propose no invasion of the North, no attack on them, and only ask to be let alone." - Patrick R. Cleburne / May 1861

"General, if you put every [Union soldier] now on the other side of the Potomac on that field to approach me over the same line, I will kill them all before they reach my line." General James Longstreet made this vow to Robert E. Lee as countless Federal assaults were beaten back by Longstreet's men at the Battle of Fredericksburg

"If you bring these leaders to trial it will condemn the North, for by the Constitution secession is not rebellion." - Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court privately delivered this opinion on charging captured Confederate officers with treason

"General, unless he offers us honorable terms, come back and let us fight it out!" James Longstreet said this to Robert E. Lee as he rode off to discuss terms for surrender with General Grant at Appomattox.

Victims of the Confederate Fury



“The Federal fatalities during the entire war were 359,528 men. Of this number, 110,070 were killed in battle or died of wounds; 249,458 died of disease or accident . . . Over 250,000 men were discharged for disabilities arising from wounds or disease rendering them unfit for service. Losses in the main battles of the Civil War ran high.

A comparison of the casualties at Gettysburg with those sustained in some of the European conflicts might prove illuminating. The Third Westphalia Regiment lost at Marc La Tour 49.4 per cent killed and wounded; the Garde-Schutze Regiment lost at Metz 46.1 per cent; the Light Brigade lost at Balaklava 36.7 per cent.

These battles probably recorded the greatest losses in single engagements up to the time of the Civil War; yet it has been asserted “without fear of contradiction” that in the Union army at least 63 regiments lost more than 50 per cent in killed and wounded in single engagements.


At least 23 regiments lost more than one half in killed and wounded in the three bloody days of Gettysburg. Native regiments made splendid records there — and paid for it, the Iron Brigade losing almost exactly 50 per cent of its number — but so did units of foreign-born, notably some Pennsylvania regiments.

The Fifth New York, Duryee’s Zouaves, in which there were many foreigners, lost in the Second Battle of Bull Run [Manassas] over 60 per cent in killed and wounded, with none missing; the regiments went into battle with 490 men, but in less than ten minutes nearly 150 lay dead or mortally wounded. Though almost annihilated, it retired slowly, carrying off with it the flags and some wounded.

The ultimate of sacrifice was probably sustained by the Irish Brigade when it was hurled by General Pope against Marye’s Heights in December 1862, in a useless massacre. It may be said that the Brigade virtually ceased to exist, with an average loss in casualties per regiment of almost 41 per cent. Seven thousand men in all were entered on the rolls of the Brigade; less than 1,000 returned to New York.”


Nathan Bedford Forrest and African-Americans: Yankee Myth, Confederate Fact






Washington (CNN) An Iowa congressman has proposed legislation that would block Harriet Tubman from replacing President Andrew Jackson on the \$20 bill. Republican Rep. Steve King introduced an amendment to bar the Treasury Department from spending any funds to redesign paper money or coin currency. If the amendment is enacted, it would nullify the Treasury Department's plans to replace the current image of Jackson on the \$20 bill with a portrait of Tubman, one of the most prominent abolitionists for her work in the Underground Railroad during the Civil War. She would become the first black woman ever to appear on a U.S. banknote. King's reason for introducing the amendment was not immediately clear, and his office did not immediately respond to a CNN request for comment. Harriet Tubman will be face of the \$20. According to The Huffington Post, which first reported the story, the Iowa Republican is hoping to attach his legislation to another bill that will authorize the Treasury Department's funding. The Treasury Dept. announced in April that it would switch Jackson for Tubman on the \$20.

CONGRESS REMOVES CONFEDERATE FLAG BAN - A measure to bar confederate flags from cemeteries run by the Department of Veterans Affairs was removed from legislation passed by the House early Thursday. The flag ban was added to the VA funding bill in May by a vote of 265-159, with most Republicans voting against the ban. But Speaker Paul Ryan (R-Wis.) and Majority Leader Kevin McCarthy (R-Calif.) both supported the measure. Ryan was commended for allowing a vote on the controversial measure, but has since limited what amendments can be offered on the floor. Dixie Heritage/Chaplain Ed

WHAT'S NEXT FOR THE UK? - Scotland will likely seek independence for a second time this decade after the historic vote for the United Kingdom to leave the European Union, Scotland is one of four countries that make up the United Kingdom. England, Wales and Northern Ireland are the others. Scottish voters overwhelmingly backed remaining in the EU, 62% in favor of staying to 38% who want to leave. The government will begin preparing legislation for a new referendum that could be held before the UK formally leaves the EU -- two years from when the government formally notifies the bloc of its intent to drop out.

THE LOST COLONY




Four centuries after the colony of Roanoke vanished, archaeologists say they have unearthed what they believe to be the remnants of the New World's first English settlement. Two small pieces of blue-and-brown pottery, believed to be from an apothecary jar used in the 16th century, were recently uncovered during a dig at North Carolina's Roanoke Island, archaeologists announced. "This is really exciting," Eric Deetz, an

archaeologist with the First Colony Foundation who said he personally identified the pieces, told The Huffington Post Wednesday. "It's very small and very fragile," he said of the rare find. To archaeologists, "a single piece is as good as a whole pot." These pottery fragments were recently unearthed during a dig in Roanoke, North Carolina. Deetz hopes the pottery will shed a little more light on the colonists who vanished in the late 1580s, sparking one of the greatest American mysteries. The colonists had only been residing in the area for a short time when its governor, John White, went back to England for supplies only to find his settlement completely deserted when he returned. About 100 years passed before any other Europeans moved onto the same land. Because of the pottery's style and location, he said it's relatively easy to pinpoint the find to the lost colony.


The Sun Also Rises
