The Reverend's Ruminations - November 2024

As I sit down to "ruminate" on yet another unseasonably warm late-October day amid crystal-blue skies and with many colorful leaves still filling area trees, it doesn't seem possible that I'm writing for the November newsletter. I'm still wearing a short-sleeved shirt and sandals when I'd ordinarily be wearing at least a flannel shirt and starting the day with a vest or jacket!?! Unfortunately, we can be certain that the "other boot" will drop soon enough, and it really will be a rude adjustment after such an incredible month. Though they may seem early amid such a mild autumn, we do already have a sign-up list out for the Christmas poinsettias that will grace our sanctuary with their beautiful winter colors in a little over a month. *If you intend to purchase one in honor or memory of a loved one, please note that the sign-up deadline is November 10. See the sheet on the narthex table or contact Marilyn Forstrom or the church office.*

November is filled with several special events, not the least of which is of course Thanksgiving. Turkey day falls late in the month this year, so please note by the included church calendar that it will push both the Free Community Meal and our monthly Bible study a week earlier than normal. If eating is your favorite part of Thanksgiving, then you're in luck this month! We'll be having a "Family Reunion" Stewardship Ingathering & Potluck after church on the 17th, the Free Community Meal on the 20th, and a soup supper fundraiser before/during Fairmont's annual Glows Parade on the evening of the 22nd. Those involved in the annual budget process will also have a light meal at their meeting on the 25th!

As if you could have missed it, there is also a big event on November 5th known as Election Day. It is a civic duty that some would have you believe is of such grave importance that our nation may somehow cease to exist if one or another candidate or party is elected. Are free and fair elections essential to the existence of our country? Absolutely, so please get out and VOTE. Now, could some policies undergo changes that you and a neighbor or family member might disagree on? Very likely. But will either party destroy what makes America a beacon of freedom, peace, and prosperity to the rest of the world? NO.

Two years ago in this very space I included a quote from Rev. Dr. John Dorhauer, the General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ from 2015-2023. Sadly, similar anxieties are still being experienced by many during this election cycle, so I invite you to ruminate on his sage words again:

"We are a people divided, a country split on too many issues to name. And many are the powers that thrive on keeping us divided, pitting one person or group against another.

But you are different. You are part of the United Church of Christ. You are about loving God and neighbor. You are about building bigger tables. You are about giving everyone a voice. You are about uniting across our divisions to join with the Holy Spirit in working toward a just world for all.

You are about upholding the democratic principles of social equity and the equal power of each person made in God's image...

... Together we are stronger than the divisions. Together our churches are stronger in witness to Christ's love for all people. Together we offer extravagant welcome and radical hospitality to a world seeking lives of deeper meaning and greater value."

It bears repeating also that as Christians — and United Church of Christ members in particular — we are called to a deeper understanding of world events, institutional policies, community struggles, and individual relationships. Rather than allow ourselves to be pulled into the chasms of fear, hate, or division so prominent in our country (and accentuated by scheming election ads), we are called to rise above the politicism of seemingly every detail of public life. We are called instead to model Christ's grace, love, and care for those around us.

In a much less contested "election" of sorts, we will soon be looking for new board and council members to serve our congregation. Would you prayerfully consider how you might serve a more active role at First Congregational United Church of Christ? None of these positions take more than a few hours a month, and are a great way to get acquainted with other members of our church family. Of course, there are opportunities for short-term help in the way of kitchen workers, singers, Christmas decorators, ushers, greeters, or scripture readers as well. Volunteers, no matter the duration of the task, help make the many and varied ministries of First Congregational UCC possible.

The Council met in Heritage Hall at 5:45 PM. Moderator Kay Campe called the meeting to order, and Pastor Cory led prayer. We celebrated generosity in the church with the Stewardship campaign "Family Reunion" theme, choir, and those stepping up to lead our upcoming fundraisers.

Motion to approve the minutes from the meeting on Sept 18, 2024, was M/S/C. (Abigail Anderson/Marcia Musser)

Treasurer's Report Catherine Johnson submitted a report stating we will start including, once a month in the bulletin, the past months Giving Report. At the end of September, we received 66% of pledged giving. Each Board/Committee/Office needs to submit their projected budget by November 21st. A motion to receive the treasurer's report was M/S/C. Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory has given out a few funds from the Star Fish fund this month. The funds are starting to run low. He's been able to get together with the UCC Clergy cluster and Ecumenical Partners, meeting with area pastors. Some community involvement with being in the Legion Honor guard this past month along with some home visits.

BOARD REPORTS:

Christian Education: Discussed the first Funday, went well. Trunk or Treat happening on Downtown Plaza 10/31 from 4-5 pm. Anyone is invited to set up a Trunk or Treat site in front of our building- facing the sidewalk. Discussed selling Congo Kids Store goods at different events to raise money for camp.


NEW BUSINESS:



Hy-Vee & Fareway Report as of Report as of 20 October 2024

During the last 4 weeks, \$18,821.75 (9.41%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 46 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$176,049.77 (88.02%) toward the 17th goal which is now \$200,000.

During the same time, \$5,869.9 (3.91%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 81 weeks, Fareway is at \$91,460.19 (60.97%) toward our 5^{th} \$150,000 goal.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used (a number from May 2011 through July 2012 were turned in during this time). Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Fast & Fresh (Gas), Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Delivery slips/sheets can also be used. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house.

"For you always have the poor with you, and you can show kindness to them whenever you wish; but you will not always have me." (Mark 14:7, NRSV)

In the setting of this famous quote, Jesus was defending a woman who had extravagantly anointed him with an entire jar of costly ointment. But his statement on those less fortunate in our society was nothing new. Deuteronomy very similarly proclaims, "Since there will never cease to be some in need on the earth, I therefore command you, 'Open your hand to the poor and needy neighbor in your land" (15:11, NRSV). Similar commands are repeated throughout both the Old and New Testaments, challenging churches and individuals to carry on God's redeeming work in our broken and hurting world.

Our venerable Starfish Fund is one important way that First Congregational UCC offers care in the Fairmont and Martin County area. It has been generously supported for many years, including a nearly \$2,700 anonymous donation in October of 2018. As its name suggests, our fund continually regrows itself (not unlike the healing of a starfish) through your gifts. The Starfish Fund has seen fairly steady requests for assistance during 2024, but would now benefit from "regrowth" in the form of a boost in donations to continue serving those who need it most. I will continue to administer it judiciously on behalf of our congregation, so that it has the broadest effect in our community.



These are combined for the Total Offering. Money received for Capital (building projects and maintenance) and Missions (Blessing box offerings, other projects, and Starfish) are separate from the Total Offering and are not included in the Budget.




As the weather gets colder and the nights get longer, instead of mindlessly watching sitcoms or drama re-runs until bedtime, how about gathering together as a family to dig a little deeper into your faith? One of the most intriguing — if not troubling — books of our Bible is *Revelation*. But don't be intimidated by it; explore the impact that it has for us in the here and now. Matt Chandler, the senior pastor of Village Church, based in Flower Mound, TX and the executive director of the board of the Acts 29 Network, offers great insight in a new study called **The Overcomers**. Here's a brief synopsis of his 8-sessions:

Are you ready to live fully prepared and fully equipped to handle anything life throws at you? As Christians, we can be courageous and confident, knowing that God has placed us in human history for his purposes, and he will empower us regardless of our circumstances. In this eight-session series, pastor and author Matt Chandler will walk us through the book of Revelation to remind us of God's fierce, conquering, commanding authority over all the earth.

During October and November, we are continuing to hear epistle readings each Sunday from the book of *Hebrews*. Chock full of teachings and encouragements for our daily living, this important New Testament book is one I've touched on in sermons during previous years, but could easily be a source of study for many months. So why not explore it with short highlights from each chapter in 14 quick sessions? It's called *Hebrews—Timeless Truths*:

Westcliffe and Joshua Duffy present the entire book of Hebrews. Each episode of this series both explains and provides practical application of each chapter of Hebrews. Shot in various locations to further connect our current context to the timeless relevance of God's Word to our day to day lives. Perfect for personal devotional or small group settings, this series, when paired with the group discussion questions, equips us to understand more deeply the heart, will, intent and design of our Heavenly Father, the life, ministry and teachings of Jesus, and the powerful work of the Holy Spirit in our world today.

New Neighbor Casserole

(6 servings)





What to Use:

1 pound ground beef Large saucepan with lid

1 medium onion, chopped Knife

1/4 tsp. pepper Pancake turner

2 Tbsp. parsley, chopped Cutting board

1 clove garlic, crushed Can opener

2 10.5 oz. cans tomato soup Mixing spoon

1 soup can of water Measuring cups

1.5 cups elbow macaroni Measuring spoons

8 oz. shredded cheddar cheese 2 qt. casserole dish
Non-stick cooking spray

What to Do:

- 1. Cook ground beef and onion in the large pan, breaking the beef apart with a pancake turner, until the beef loses its red color. Drain off fat.
- 2. Add pepper, parsley, garlic, soup, water, and uncooked macaroni. Stir to mix well.
- 3. Over medium heat, bring the mixture to a boil. Stir. Cover and turn heat down to low. Simmer for 20 minutes.
- 4. Spray casserole dish with non-stick cooking spray.
- 5. Pour ground beef and macaroni mixture into the casserole.
- 6. Sprinkle cheese on top. Keep your covered casserole in the oven on warm (200 degrees) until serving time.
