




Fun At School . . .

What? A Bad Day? Not Again...


Let's face it. Everybody seems to have one of these, you know, a bad day.






These situations can brighten up a day or just change the everyday routine of life. So remember the next time something extra-ordinary happens just take it in a stride.







Some will be moving on to college, others to jobs, or maybe family making.


As for those of us who will be going on to college, we have gotten a lot of help through scholarships and grants. To these people who have helped us, we say thank you, and that we appreciate it very much.

To the Senior Class of 1992, we wish you the best of luck, and hope your year will be just as great or better than ours has been.







To those who are Seniors though, it may mean one last chance to do what you haven't yet accomplished, or you may count the days until graduation.


Some accomplishments among many this year were: Making it to the State Volleyball Tournament again, or having the best Girls Basketball record in years. Some of the dis-



Meanwhile John Maes, Frank Abeyta and Ruben Baca took over starting roles and gained valuable experience throughout the year. Adrian Garcia, a transfer from Quemado, stepped in and played quarterback in his first year at MHS.

After Almost beating the eventual state-champion Mountainair Mustangs in the season-opener, the steers rolled to three consecutive wins and were looking for another district championship. But a combination of bad luck, bad weather and inexperience hurt the Steers. A playoff loss to Roy on a frigid, and rainy night ended the Steers championship hopes.


"The loss of last years seniors really hurt us during the last part of this season. We did gain experience, and that will help next years returning players." said coach Randy Valles.





Another Trip To State After A Winning Season

Many exciting games were played this season. Although some of these games were not in favor of the Steers, much experience was gained and will be helpful in seasons to come.






"As far as I know this is the best girls team Magdalena has had," said coach William Gordon. This year the team had a great season, averaging 66.5 points a game, one of the highest averages ever, and ended the season with the best record a Magdalena girls basketball team has seen; 16-4.

This year for the first time, a girls BVC tournament was held. Magdalena played the Alamo Cougars in the first game and won. Next they faced the Mountainair Mustangs and came out with an easy victory. The championship game was up next for the Lady Steers. They went up against the Estancia Bears and came out on top to become the first ever girls BVC champs.


Hopefully next years team will look back and want to continue the positive example of teamwork and dedication that this team has set. We can only look forward to them wanting to better what has already been done.

Now, the beginning of our second semester, the students and new teachers are finally settled in and are on the right track. All hoping for a more prosperous and promising semester.




