## Amana Communal Life Continued: School Days

Perhaps the best description of the schools in communal Amana was given by Bertha Shambaugh in her book, "Amana That Was and Amana That Is."

The first volume. "Amana That Was" was published in 1908. In 1932, as events in Amana were unfolding to dismantle the communal way of life, Shambaugh was here and wrote a second book she called "Amana That Is." These were published together in one volume in December of 1932. This book has been kept in print by Penfield Press and can be purchased at the Amana Heritage Museum bookstore and the High Amana Store. It is packed with facts and is a must-read for anyone interested in Amana's story. She wrote a 24-page description of schooling in communal Amana that is a fascinating read.

As she notes, the belief that all children should be led to love the Lord and live a godly life is part of the Inspirationist ethos. In 1717 Johann Adam Gruber wrote a book of verse and prayers clearly setting forth these views called, "Kinder-Stimme" (Childrens Voices). This book was taught in Amana through the 1930s and prayers from this little book

Also, please remember to be a good neighbor cleaning up after your dog(s) if you take them for a walk, on a leash.



were taught in Amana Sunday Schools through the 1950s.

When settling in lowa, school teachers were sent from Eben-ezer to set up schools immediately. Samuel Scheuner, the first man buried in West Amana, was its first school teacher though he also helped build the first houses and barns, working long hours the first three years here.

All teachers were appointed by the Grosserbruderrat and it was considered a very important job. Often teachers were church Elders or became Elders. In Amana as they needed more teachers. talented boys were asked to start high school correspondence courses under the tutelage of the school teachers, then they were sent to high schools in nearby towns and college as they progressed. Once licensed they were assigned a school. Schools were operated in each village and they often required two or three teachers each with the eldest teacher in charge.

Amana's communal school system was public and every colony school was governed by all rules and policies set by the State of Iowa. When Iowa began requiring that teachers be certified (sometime after 1870) Amana teachers took the certification tests. They taught reading, writing, mathematics, geometry, botany, basic zoology, history and geography. Music and drawing were taught if the teacher had the inclination. Amana teachers instructed their pupils in beekeeping, tree grafting, gardening and basic farm practices if they could fit it in.

World War I laws made speaking German in public illegal, so Amana schools became "English." Hence Amana employed a handful of female teachers from the "outside" to instruct children to read and write English. They lived in the villages and took their meals in a communal kitchen. After the war the practice continued. One such young lady teacher lived in High Amana and was a friend to all the girls in High. Lina Leichsenring and her cousins, Susanna "Sanja" Wendler and Emilie Wendler

had tea with her regularly. They grew to cherish her friendship and corresponded with her for years after she left the Colonies.

After World War I Amana classes continued in English, but pupils were taught German grammar, reading and writing as well. Kids between the ages of 5 and 10 were taught to knit and crochet. These lessons were given at "Strickshule" (knitting school) held at 2 or 3 p.m. or so and taught by several older ladies in the village.

School children attended school 5 and one-half days each week, year-round. They attended church same as their parents so Wednesday mid-morning they broke for a church service. There was no summer vacation and only a few days off for holy days. Good Friday and the Monday after Easter were days off, so was Christmas Day, December 26 and New Year's Day.

Kids went to school basically 7:30 a.m. until 3 p.m. Yes, there was a "recess" for playtime each day and kids went home for lunch at 11:30 a.m. Kids attended school from age 5 to age 14. At 14 they were assigned a job in the community.

Kids ages 4 to 5 attended Kinderschule. One was located in each village where kids were looked after by several older ladies. This day care allowed for their moms to work at home, in the kitchens and gardens. Each Kinderschule had beds for napping, a play area, a sandbox, and little tables and chair for games and snacks.

In Iowa through about 1870 it was unusual for a girl to receive much of an education at all. Amana Schools bucked lowa trends by sending girls to school through age 14. By 1932 of course, the fact that both girls and boys stopped their schooling at age 14 was a sore point for Amana people and was one of the reasons folks voted for the "Great Change." After 1932 ended communal living, both colony girls and boys went to high schools in Oxford, Marengo and Williamsburg and within months they were planning to build a new high school in Middle Amana for all Amana teens.

She is preceded in death by her father David; sister, Megan Jeck in infancy; paternal grandparents, Howard "Buddy" Jeck and maternal grandparents Kenneth and Harriet Bierman.

A private memorial service will be held at Kloster Funeral Home, Marengo with Emilie Hoppe and Elly Hoehnle officiating. Burial will be at High Amana Cemetery.
