Nancy Ann (Orr) Elliott, 72, of Ubly, passed away peacefully on May 29, 2021 at her home under hospice care. She received her undergrad degree from Michigan State University and continued her education, earning a Masters at Central Michigan University. She was an active member of the Bad Axe First United Methodist Church and was involved with the church choir. Nancy was a board member for Ubly Community Schools and McLaren Thumb Region Hospital. She was also a member of both the Michigan Council of Teachers of English and the National Council of Teachers of English and received multiple awards for her teaching excellence.
