COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

MORNING SESSIONS

BURN AND ASSOCIATED TRAUMA

This presentation will focus on the assessment and management priorities for burn patients with associated trauma. It will cover key aspects such as airway management, fluid resuscitation and temperature regulation. Emphasis will be placed on addressing concomitant injuries and preventing complications. The aim is to equip healthcare professionals with essential knowledge for effective care in emergency and critical settings.

PEDIATRIC TRAUMA

Pediatric Trauma: Not Just Little Adults: Eighty percent of children who need care nationwide are seen at a non-children's hospital. Data has shown that being prepared to care for children can lead to a 60% reduction in mortality. This presentation will discuss some of the differences in children to consider and areas where being prepared can help save a child's life.

TRAUMA TRIVIA

Trauma Trivia game we will play that will cover a variety of topics for the pre-hospital care of trauma patients in the rural setting. There will be questions about care for blunt vs penetrating trauma, pediatrics, geriatrics, spinal immobilization, the challenges faced by rural EMS providers, as well as some general trauma care knowledge.

MORNING SESSIONS

HUMAN FACTORS

Objectives: Understand the importance of non-technical skills in resuscitation. Learn better ways to lead, and interact with resuscitation team leaders. Understand the importance of clear, closed loop communication. Know ways to adjust, tolerate, and train for the stress responses experienced during resuscitations.

BACK- COUNTRY SKIING

Backcountry Skiing is skiing (or snowboarding) outside of a ski resort, or patrolled area, in a natural environment. It has become increasingly popular over the past 5 years, yet comes with risks. This presentation will cover an overview of the backcountry community in Nevada, risks involved, common traumatic injuries associated with the sport, and their treatments.

AFTERNOON SESSIONS

FIELD AMPUTATION

Being presented with a patient who is entrapped and requiring amputation of a limb(s) can be one of the most challenging and stressful calls any prehospital provider can come across. Knowing that a service and process is available to them can speed up the extraction and help reduce stress.

TWO MINUTES IN HELL

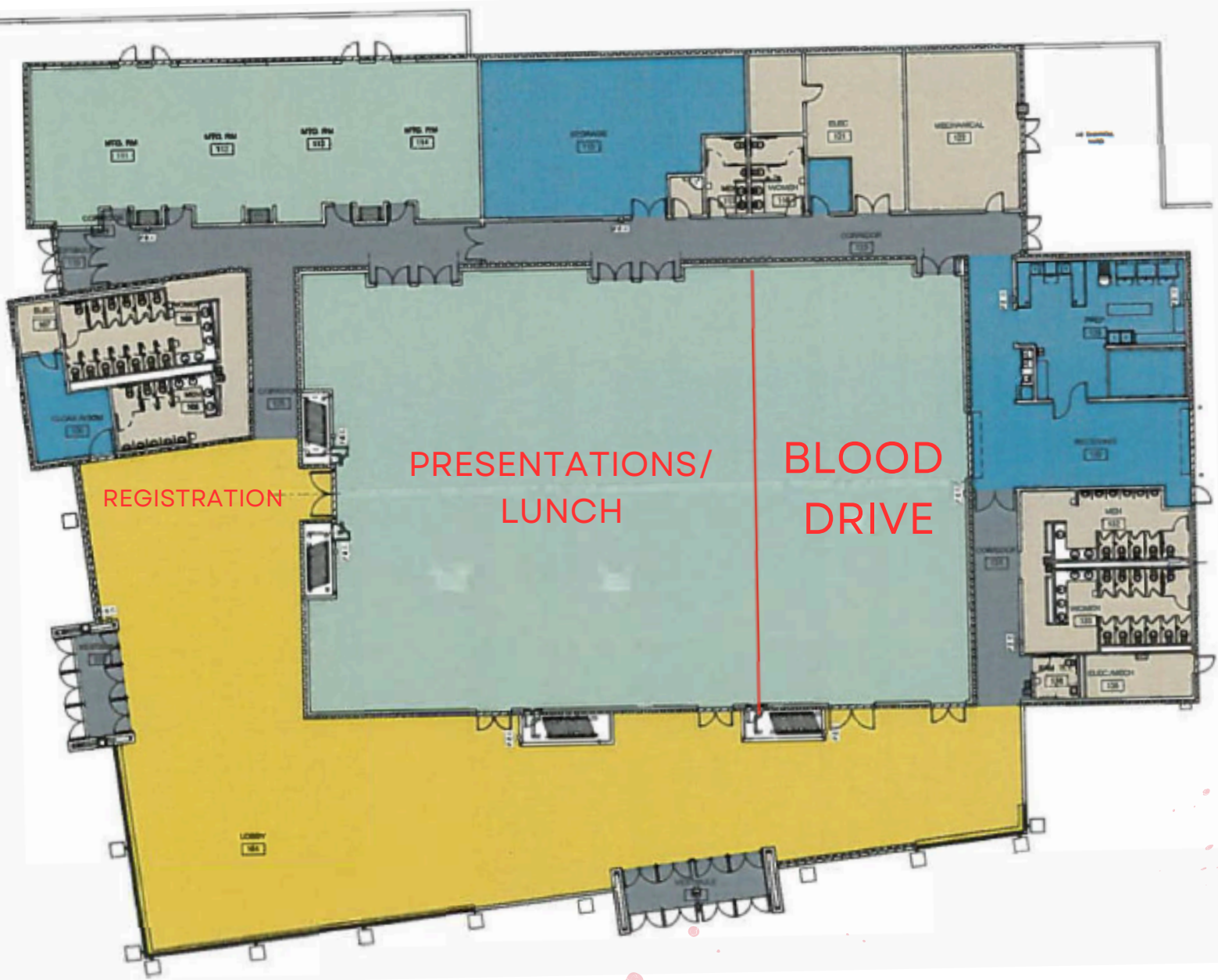
This session will provide all levels of EMS providers a pathway into the initial steps of the critically ill pediatric and adult trauma patients. We will focus our minds towards a pathway of “What can i fix right now” to reduce the demise of our patient. Learning objectives include early recognition of the deteriorating patient, immediate life threat treatment, airway management, treatment before CPR and the benefits of rapid transport to a higher level of care hospital.

MAGIC VALLEY RESCUE TEAM

(SORT) responds to low and high-angle rescues in Twin Falls County, and the surrounding Counties of the Magic Valley. Formed in 1996, the team currently operates with ten members, who are able to quickly and safely provide emergency medical care, medical stabilization and pain control to accident victims who may be trapped in situations and places that are not accessible by normal methods.

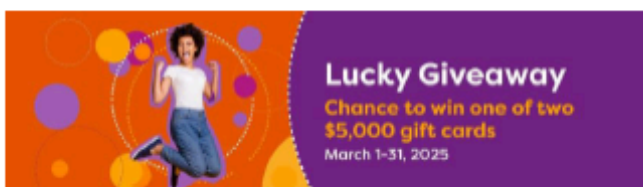

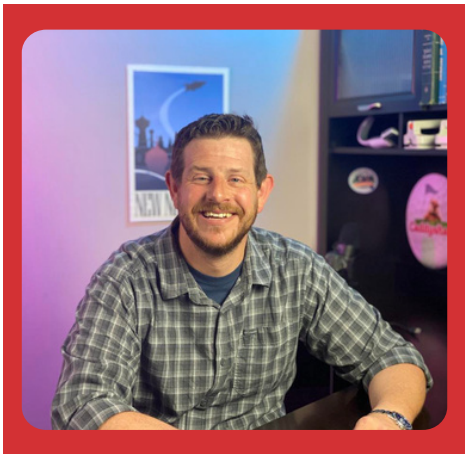


Vanessa Holzmann, BSN, CFRN, TCRN, CEN, EMT-P
