



















## Field crickets

Field crickets seem to be popping up in large numbers in Central Texas lately and the big question I receive is WHY? Adults are out and about in the fall because it's mating season and they need to mate and lay eggs before they die from



old age or cold winter temperatures. Crickets overwinter as eggs in the soil.

Field crickets are about 1" long when fully grown and dark brown to black in color with large hind legs used for jumping. They also have two cerci, or appendages that come off the tip

of the abdomen. Female crickets have a large sword-like structure, the ovipositor, protruding from the tip of the abdomen (see image below). The ovipositor is used to deposit eggs into soil.

Crickets feed on plant material as well as other insects. They can cause damage to seedlings and sometimes large populations can be destructive. Large masses of dead crickets around doorways or other areas can be distasteful to view and cause a foul odor.

Field crickets are primarily outdoor insects but may occasionally venture indoors. When crickets do come indoors, they may bother residents with their chirping. Males chirp to attract a mate creating the sound by rubbing their forewings together.

Cricket management is more easily accomplished in the summer when nymphs, who cannot fly, are present. Unfortunately, this usually isn't when large populations of crickets are discovered.

Before turning to pesticides to manage your cricket problems, try these ideas:

- Turn off outside lights at night or use bulbs that are less attractive to insects.
- Seal cracks and crevices where insects can enter structures with sealant.
- Remove debris stacked near the structure.
- Keep lawn and surrounding areas mowed.
- Stuff weep holes with copper mesh.

Fortunately, "cricket season" usually lasts around 4-6 weeks so they won't be here forever...until next year.

## The perfect flower

When I see a dandelion in my yard or flower bed, I do what most of us do. I either pull it out or give it a good spray of weed killer. It seems many of us want that lush, green, weed-free lawn and will spend a lot of money on pesticides to achieve it. But recently I read an interesting article on dandelions and now I have a whole new respect for them.

Dandelions are actually good for your lawn. They help loosen hard-packed soil because of their wide-spreading roots. They aerate the soil and help reduce erosion. They have a long taproot that takes nutrients from deep in the soil and makes them available to other plants.

The name Dandelion comes from the Latin *Dens Leoni*. The French translation of that is *dent de lion* which means lion's teeth, which is believed to describe the plant's tooth-like leaves. The English changed it to dandelion.

The dandelion arrived in America at the time of the Mayflower. Before the 1800's, the dandelion was planted and protected. Beginning in the 1800's, people cleared their yards and land of grass and left the dandelions and other weeds they considered useful. They knew of all of the useful properties of the plant.

The dandelion's yellow flower is quite interesting and pretty. What we call the flower is actually not just one single flower but is 50 or more individual



blooms. It opens in the morning and closes later in the day.

The seeds and foliage are eaten by at least 33 species of wildlife. Bees and other pollinators love dandelions. Not only good for wildlife, every part of the dandelion is safe for us to eat; the roots, stems, leaves and flowers. They are part of the sunflower family and are related to lettuce, endive and chicory. They are very nutritious and provide calcium, magnesium, iron and vitamins A, C and K. They're also found in traditional medicines, supplements and herbal teas where they're used to support blood sugar levels and boost skin, liver and heart health. The Chinese and Indians

have grown dandelions for centuries to treat liver and digestive disorders.

The leaves are often used in salads but you can also sauté, steam or boil them, or add chopped leaves to your dips. The buds can be eaten fresh but are better


when cooked or pickled. The roots are best after drying them out and are often used to make tea and coffee. Use the flowers in salads or pull them apart and use as a garnish. Steep them in boiling water for about ten minutes and you'll have dandelion tea.

I Googled dandelion recipes and was surprised to find several websites. I found recipes for dandelion wine, tea, cookies, cakes, syrups and many others. Rather than make something myself, I'm going to order some dandelion jelly which I found on the website Etsy. I'm no Martha Stewart so it's much easier for me to order something.

Not that I plan on eating dandelions on a regular basis or maybe ever, but I just might stop with the weed killer and let them grow. They really are, in my opinion, the perfect flower.


