

Welcome STVU Dean! The Reverend Dr. **Corev D.B. Walker, PhD**

Effective July 1. The Reverend Dr. Corey D.B. Walker, PhD, a scholar, author and college dean, returned to Virginia Union University to lead the Samuel DeWitt Proctor School of Theology, of which he is a graduate. He is succeeding Dr. John W. Kinney as vice president and Dean of STVU effective July 1, 2017.

Until starting at VUU, Dr. Walker was dean of the College of Arts, Sciences, Business and Education at Winston-Salem State University in North Carolina, where he managed 19 academic

departments that enroll more than 3,500 students and employed more than 200 full-time faculty members.

Dr. Walker earned his undergraduate degree from Norfolk State University; Master's degrees from Harvard and Brown Universities; Master of Divinity degree from VUU; and, PhD in American Studies from the College of William & Mary.

Dr. Walker has published widely on African-American religion, philosophy and culture and lectured before academic audiences in the United States, the Caribbean, South America, Europe and Africa.

His first book, "A Noble Fight: African American Freemasonry and the Struggle for Democracy in America," was published in 2008 and remains among the few to focus on Prince Hall Masons. He has since completed the manuscript for his next book, "Between Transcendence and History: An Essay on Religion and the Future of Democracy in America."

He has been involved in editing a special issue of the journal Political Theology on "Theology and Democratic Future"; served as associate editor of



the award-winning SAGE Encyclopedia of Identity; and, associate editor of The Journal of the American Academy of Religion.

In addition to writing and editing, he co-directed and co-produced the documentary film, "Fifeville,"

> about a black neighborhood in Charlottesville, with artist and filmmaker Kevin Jerome Everson.

> Dr. Walker is a former member and vice rector of the NSU Board of Visitors and served on the state Workforce 2000 Advocacy Council.

> In a 2016 interview for the African-American Intellectual History Society, he offered his views on the role administrators should play.

> He called himself "an idealist" who sought to end the divide between administrators and academics.

> He said he believed it was time for a

new era that "marks the end of the 'administrator' and a new beginning for critical intellectuals committed to activating new visions of transformation and possibility."

In his view, that's what universities need — "critical intellectuals - not administrators," who offer students and faculty "fresh opportunities to move beyond sterile regimes of thought and dogmatic institutional practices, instead framing and authorizing new practices that aid in righteous planetary possibilities."

Dr. Walker previously served as a professor and chairman of the Department of Africana Studies at Brown University, where he was involved in creating the department's first doctoral program.

Earlier, he was a member of the faculty of the Department of Religious Studies at the University of Virginia. He also served as director for three years of the U.Va. Center for the Study of Local Knowledge in the Construction of Race, Gender and Nation, a grant-funded program that was part of the university's Carter G. Woodson Institute for African and African-American Studies, of which he also was a faculty member.

Interim Executive Minister's Report

As I share this brief Annual Session report, it being the last as your Interim Executive Minister, I have a

few shout outs and expressions of gratitude I wish to share.

I will also briefly share my report on the state of the Convention.

Let me begin with my report on the state of the Convention.

The state of our Convention is realized in the state of it's churches. Many of



The Convention's churches are without pastors and too many of those with pastors are experiencing some type of conflict. The headquarters staff has found ourselves very busy in attempting to aid both. With the number of churches that are without pastors or in conflict we can easily loose sight on the greater majority of healthy, thriving churches that are growing spiritually and numerically. I have learned over these past few years that it seems that many if not most member churches define the Convention as a building located on 1214 West Graham Rd. In Richmond, VA. Nothing could be farther from the truth. The Baptist General Convention is found in nearly every city, town and hamlet in the state of Virginia. The Baptist General Convention is a living organism of over 1000 churches United for greater mission and ministry. It seems that the only problem with that definition is that it mirrors many of our churches. The number on the role is much larger than the number who give and work in the church. And so it is with the Convention, only a small percentage of the Convention's churches participate in it's work through their service and contributions. And like many of our churches, the staff at the headquarters building give just as much or more time and attention to those who don't contribute than to those who do. With this said, please note that none of that assistance is ever given grudgingly. Questions are answered, counsel is given, trips are made, often at expense to the Convention and staff. Many of our Convention constituents seem to be unaware that a policy was adopted years ago dealing with an honorarium for staff members when they are called on to preach, conduct workshops or moderate meetings. When staff members come to you to preach or do workshops, please be prepared to give them a fair honorarium for their service.

I hope that you have come prepared to give generously tonight but as you leave this place this week, remember 1214 West Graham Rd. and the serious work that goes on there everyday by a committed staff. It is an awful feeling and responsibility when the Executive Minister and the Accountant sit down to decide how bills and salaries are going to be paid and mission objectives (Virginia Union, Lott Carey, Children's Home) without the needed monetary resources. Thank you to all those churches and individuals who regularly support the work of your Convention and thank you to all those persons, pastors, officers and members who give of your time and resources for the sake of the Convention. So much more could be said here but I promised a brief report.

Next let me spend a few minutes on the Convention's upcoming Youth Retreat.

Many of our churches are under the impression that the present Eagle Eyrie Retreat is a BGC sponsored event. It is not.

As the Convention emerged from the deep financial hole some 5 years ago. The decision was made by the leadership of the Convention to not continue going to Eagle Eyrie because of what was perceived to be a the lack of a demonstration of grace during this dark period by those who owned the Eagle Eyrie retreat property. It was time to channel our resources to our own community. Please note that the retreat was never the Eagle Eyrie Retreat but the Baptist General Convention Youth Retreat held at Eagle Eyrie. Over the years it began to be referred to as the Eagle Eyrie Retreat. In 2014 our Convention, after a couple of years without a retreat, renewed our Youth Retreat by holding it at Virginia State University and the Children's Home. During 2015 & 2016 it was held at Virginia State. This year's retreat will be held on July 28-30, on the campus of Virginia Union University. As good Baptist folk we would not dare attempt to tell you who are what to support for the faith formation of your youth. We only ask that you know you can rest assured that your youth will receive an awesome experience at the BGC youth retreat. There should be registration forms in your bags. If not go by the registration desk for information on how to get one.

BGC Ministries: Scholarships to the Samuel D. Proctor School of Theology, Virginia Union University will for the second straight year be given BGCVA's Women and Men Ministries. The Women are giving the Margaret Rose Johnson Scholarship, two in the amount of \$1200.00 each and representing the Men there is the James Cary Scholarship, two in the amount of \$500.00 each. That is a total of \$3400.00 in scholarships for students who are attending the School of Theology.

As I close this part of my report let me admonish us, in light of this nation's present President and Congress, our state General Assembly, and a new Governor being elected this year, as a Convention let us be proactive. The most active of our nine Commissions these past 2 years has been the Commission on Social Justice. Dr. Elisha Burke the Convention's staff person who guides this commission is constantly sending out information and calls to action on a number of topics that affect our communities. Every one needs to vote! No, there is no Barack Obama to vote for but if you look at what is going on in Washington you realize that we need to vote to not only affect the present and the future but to preserve the gains of the past.

Now allow me to thank a few people who have been instrumental in this present journey. Dr. Darrell White, was the Convention President at the time I started my stint as Interim Executive Minister. He had steered the Convention through the period that is commonly now referred to as that Dark and Stormy Night. Thank you Dr. White for trusting who you know me to be and ask me to hold the reigns of the Convention for two 6 month stints. By the end of 2014 Dr. Steven Blunt had been elected to lead the Convention as it emerged from what was arguably the most trying time in the history of the Convention. Thank you for trusting me enough to walk with you these past three years.

I want to thank the staff, this includes the Rev. Curtis Ballard who served as the Convention's Youth and Young Adult Minister. The joy of a job where everyone worked hard to work together, thus, creating a stress free work environment has been the delight of these 31/2 years for me. As I stated last year, they get it. They get that it is not about us but about the service we are able render for the advancement of God's Kingdom.

I want to thank my wife Beverly for always being so faithful and gracious as a minister's spouse. Only minister's spouses know the sacrifice and burden they carry as they walk with their husband or wife in the service of the Lord. Four and a half years ago when we thought the relocating was all over and we could settle down, after a year of retirement, I asked my wife to relocate once again.

This September will mark 44 yrs. of that journey.

Thank you for three wonderful children and for being the sweet, gentle, humble, nonjudgmental holy Saint that you are Beverly Chapman.

I thank God for God's call to serve in God's Kingdom in the various capacities and places that I have been privileged to serve. And those who serve will agree when I tell you that none of it is as glamorous or prestigious as folk might think.

I thank God for helping me realize a long time ago that wherever in His Kingdom I have been called to serve is a gift, not something I deserved or earned but a gift to be treasured and treated like the valuable piece of the Kingdom it is.

To all of you wonderful, committed BGCers; Don't take your Convention for granted. A church is no greater than the people of which it consist. A Convention is no greater than the churches of which it consist.

Now with a new president standing a few moments away from being elected and the hiring of the New Executive Minister, the Convention is poised to make new and greater strides forward. Reclaiming what is worthy to continue on the journey, abandoning what has become obsolete and hopefully daring to tread into new territory that will surely aid to further reclaim the Baptist General Convention's place as a relevant and valued servant in the Kingdom of God.



Baptist General Convention in Roanoke Highlights

Despite attendance numbers that continue to decrease nationwide, the Black church has been the spiritual backbone of African Americans for centuries. Regardless of the denomination, of Protestant persuasion, classic ministers of various levels stand front and center– leading the timeless and tireless efforts to lift followers through the gospel.

No group takes this lofty mission more seriously than the Baptist General Convention of Virginia (BGCVA) and its Congress of Christian Education.

The 118th Annual Session and Congress of Christian Education, was held June 25–28 at Hotel Roanoke and Conference Center, Roanoke, VA. It featured a comprehensive lineup of activities, vendors, exhibitors, service providers and, most of all, Faith Formation in almost every aspect of church ministry.

This year's theme, *Reflecting the Light of the Cross in the Community*, was most appropriate considering how today's communities are suffering in so many ways.

"We at (BGC) didn't know what was going to happen next," said Reverend David L. Chapman, referring to what course the organization should take in such troubled times for both the organization and society in general.

"Roanoke helped us find our footing when the organization last held its convention in Roanoke in 2013," he added. In praise of the organization, Reverend Chapman briefly spoke about components that set BGC apart: "BGC is mainly about equipping saints for service," he said.

The Chester, VA resident, who has been BGCVA interim executive minister for over 3 years, is also the interim pastor of Mount Carmel Baptist Church in Richmond. As a former pastor of Roanoke's High Street Baptist Church he oversaw several significant changes and upgrades the church experienced throughout his 6-year stint that lasted from 2006 until he retired from his pastoral responsibilities in 2012.



One of the more momentous events at the conference was the signing of a contract that passed the reigns of Executive Minister to Dr. Leo Whitaker of this multidimensional Christian organization.

Whitaker's term

officially begins January 1, 2018. He comes to the Executive Minister position with an impressive list of credentials which includes bioethics research-the study of ethical issues emerging from advances in biology and medicine.

"Having someone of Dr. Whitaker's caliber to come in as executive minister not only speaks to the affirmation of that position but it also provides a great opportunity for our convention to celebrate his uniqueness and to really give us the stability we need as we move forward," commented BGCVA president Steven Blunt (2014 - 17).



The auspicious ceremony was conducted before a sizable gathering of BGCVA officials who were joined by a host of pastors and other concerned individuals. Many speakers, praise teams and choirs, some from area churches, graced the confer-

ence through their respective mediums. Among those was Minister Kaiya Jennings, BGCVA Director of Youth and Young Adults, who gave a fiery sermon that posed the question "Whose side are you on?" Her sermon was based on 1 John 1:5–10 that states, (in part) "If we claim to have fellowship with him (God) and yet walk in darkness, we lie and do not live out the truth. Are you on God's side or are you playing with the devil," she said launching her sermon from the passage.

"Today we are faced with raunchy rhetoric and misguided theology coupled with a devilish and divergent understanding about how we should conduct ourselves here on earth," she chided boldly- referring to the present plague of modern-day conditions that potentially encourage believers to stray from their faith in God. Her sermon was well received and met all the necessary standards of traditional 'fire and brimstone' discourse.

BGCVA, like many organizations of this type, has a strong history of youth guidance programs and initiatives. Considering that, Jennings announced the organization's Annual Youth Retreat for middle and high school students to be held July 28-30 at Virginia Union University in Richmond, VA and spoke of various programs and opportunities that will be offered to participating youth.

A by-product of such conferences includes the amazing talents showcased whether through ministers with impactful sermons or presentations of other types.

Such was the case as Reverend Ayo Morton delivered an extremely powerful spoken word performance entitled "I Am."

Through her powerful and rhythmic delivery, Reverend Morton charged the crowd with her skillfully executed message of strength and faith.

One just had to be there to fully appreciate Morton's presentation and the abundance of dynamic performances at this multidimensional conference that serves as a vibrant model for others to follow.

VUU Names New President

Virginia Union University has announced Dr. Hakim J. Lucas, the Florida University chief fundraiser, as its 13th president, effective September 1, 2017.



Following a 14-month search to replace former

President Claude G. Perkins, who stepped down in June 2016, first taking a sabbatical and then retiring.

"Throughout the search process, Dr. Lucas impressed the committee with his clear vision for liberal arts education and for creating an enhanced student experience," stated Dr. Richardson, a VUU alumnus who is the pastor of Grace Baptist Church in Mount Vernon, N.Y. and, chairs the National Action Network and the Conference of National Black Churches.

Dr. Lucas said he was "honored to have this opportunity" to serve as president at a "distinguished university with a rich history of academic excellence. I look forward to joining the dedicated administrators, faculty and staff as we continue to make a difference in the academic life of students."

According to VUU, Dr. Lucas has nearly two decades of experience in higher education in the areas of fundraising, strategic planning and the engagement and retention of students at historically black colleges and universities.

For the last five years, he has served as Bethune -Cookman University's vice president for institutional advancement. Since 2012, Dr. Lucas was responsible for Bethune-Cookman's advancement portfolio. Dr. Lucas reportedly boosted giving to the school by 30 percent and increased the endowment by 53 percent. And, enabled the school to receive millions of dollars in state funding for new academic programs, including its Center for Entrepreneurship and Economic Development.

Additionally, Dr. Lucas was also involved in helping the university receive \$45 million in research grants.

Prior to Bethune-Cookman, Dr. Lucas held similar fundraising posts at the State University of New York-Old Westbury and at Medgar Evers College in Brooklyn, N.Y. He also previously served as a tenured lecturer and deputy chair of Medgar Evers College's Philosophy and Religion Department.

Dr. Lucas earned his undergraduate degree from Morehouse College in Atlanta, and later earned a master's degree in education from Tufts University in Massachusetts and a doctorate in education from Fordham University in New York. He also holds the Master of Divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary in New York.






BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF VA EXPENDITURES JAN-DECEMBER 2016

Health & Wellness, Men's Ministry, Social Justice Ministry @ the Annual Session

Greetings! First, I need to say "Thank You" to every person involved in planning, implementing, praying for and attending our Annual Session in Roanoke. In my view our time in Roanoke was true to the theme – "Reflecting the Light of the Cross in the Community."

The Health & Wellness Plenary on

Monday, June 26th was titled: *Caring for the* Caregiver: Caring for Those Who Cared for You. This session included presentations by a panel of professionals followed by their responses to questions posed audience members. The panelists were Dr. JoAnne B. Blanchard, PhD (author of the book: Caring for Those Who Cared for You); Dr. Sheila L. Snoddy, PhD (Community Action Director, The Coalition to Transform Advanced Care C-TAC); and Genea Luck (Associate State Director Multicultural Outreach AARP Virginia State Office). Author Charlotte B. Wood (author, Remembering for Both of Us: A Child Learns about Alzheimer's) also shared her experiences and perspective as a caregiver. I am thankful to each of them for their sharing and spending time with us to share information beyond the session.

In addition to BGCVA members' generous donations, 50+ persons gave of their time onsite at the Rescue Mission. We are proud that our youth also contributed to this effort as they were volunteered to

Plenary: Faith, Redemption and Reintegration, June 28th

The focus of this Social Justice plenary session was on the role of the church in helping returning citizens as they return to our communities after incarceration. The panel presenters were professionals from the Virginia Department of Corrections Probation and Parole. The primary presenters were Mr. Douglas Morrison, Chief Parole Officer (Danville) and Mr. Jermiah Fitz, Chief Parole Officer (Statewide). Chief Morrison introduced presentations from Rev. Duane Massenburg, (Senior Offender Workforce Development Specialist, Green Rock Correctional Center, Chatham) and Mr. Barry Mayo, (Pittsylvania County Community Action Re-Entry Case Manager). Another featured presenter was Mr. William Washington, Jr. founder of The Bridge Ministry, (Buckingham). Mr. Washington provided free copies of this two books titled - His Grace is Sufficient (and autobiography) and People, Places & Things (a guide to overcoming additive behavior).

All of the presenters participated with a very beneficial Q&A session following the presentations. They offered facts and figures on the status of incarceration and made clear that a great need exists for more churches to become places of healing and hope as thousands return to various communities each year. All of them continue to be available to us as we move forward in assisting BGCVA churches to continue existing re-entry ministry or start new ministry using the Healing Communities Faith-based model for re-entry. We are working with the nation office of Healing Communities as we prepare to involve our churches in becoming "Stations of Hope" for returning citizens. James H. Cary Christian Education Scholarship

- f) All information must be submitted to the Director of Christian Education at BGCVA NO LATER THAN MAY 15th of each year.

3. Other Information

- a) Recipient(s) will be awarded the scholarship only once during a given school year.
- b) Amount of scholarship will be determined by need and availability of funds.
- c) Scholarship will be awarded on Wednesday during Annual Session and Congress of Christian Education of BGCVA held in June of each year. A check in the amount of the

Scholarship will be sent directly to the School of Theology in the name of the recipient.

d) The Director of Christian Education, Director of Men, Commission on Christian Education Chair, President of the Ministry of Men and Executive Minister will determine the recipient(s).

as well as socially, by having heartfelt daily devotions followed by giving back to the local rescue mission's program. Also this year we held our Annual Youth Re-



treat on the campus of Virginia Union University, where over 200 persons engaged in a weekend filled with worship, panel discussions, ministry building sessions and more. From Friday night until Sunday morning, our young people built lifelong relationships with each other and most importantly solidified their connection with their God. Also the Virginia Union, granted us a plot of land on the campus which now holds our "BGC Tree". Our tree is located near Henderson Hall, and is a sign for our young people that each place they go, to make sure they leave something that will provide growth for another.

Coming up later this year, we have several other events for our youth and young adults, one in particular being a mental health training and preparedness course. We are excited so



about how God is revitalizing and renewing our ministry here at Baptist General and in order for us to do even greater things for the kingdom, we are in need of your support because this is the place where ministry indeed matters. For we are convinced, that eyes have not seen nor ears have heard about the great things that God will prepare for us!!

STREAM Youth Theology Institute (STREAMYTI) @ VUU

Hey, young people, have you heard the "good news" that occurred on the campus of Virginia Union University this summer? It's called the STREAM Youth Theology Institute (STREAMYTI)!

STREAMYTI is an intense 9 days of conversation, discovery, exploration – plus food, faith, and fun – on the campus of Virginia Union University. Participants can see their world through fresh lenses as a place in which their gifts and faith perspectives contribute to transforming the world for good. It's an opportunity for young people to become a community. They create a safe space to be genuine while exploring real questions. Together youth create covenants that guide ways they relate to each other and become aware of the sacred worth of each child of God. As youth gather, their task is to listen for God, and to be God's hands and feet for each other and the world.



Youth were able to have honest, complicated, and energizing engagement. They dealt with academic exploration, vocational discernment, cultural engagement, and community-building. Youth dialogued and

explored topics like:

- Policy, Politics, and Prophesy
- Speaking Truth to Power
- Righteousness of Rebellion (with a Black Lives Matter leader)
- Money, Materialism, and Social Entrepreneurism (explored how money works)
- History and Hope
- Diversity (learned about other people and how to engage honestly and respectfully with people whose experiences, commitments, and perspectives are different)

During evening sessions, youth gathered for expressions of their giftedness through inspiring worship and exploring what it means to be called by god and begin to live into that reality.

Dr. John W. Kinney Retires As Dean of VUU's School of Theology

After 27 years, Dr. John W. Kinney officially

retired as Senior Vice President and Dean of the Samuel DeWitt Proctor School of Theology at Virginia Union University on June 30 (2 months after his 70th birthday).



He said his "head

and his heart" have told him this is the right time for him to give up the leadership post at the seminary. He also had the example of his wife, Quentina, who retired a few years ago as a city schoolteacher. The Kinney's have seven children and 12 grandchildren.

Dr. Kinney will remain on the faculty as a Professor of Theology. As well, he will continue to serve as pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church, Beaverdam, where he has served for 38 years.

During his tenure as Dean, the Samuel DeWitt Proctor School of Theology at VUU (STVU) has increased from 100 to over 400 students a year from across the country; and, has expanded its offerings to include the Master of Arts degree in Christian Education and Doctorate of ministry.

Additionally, STVU has worked with the Baptist Theological Seminary and Union Presbyterian Seminary to develop the Richmond Theological Consortium which allows students at each school to register for electives at the other campuses.

Dr. Kinney has also been involved with Virginia Commonwealth University on a unique graduate program that provides a dual Master of Arts in Social Work and Ministry. The program involves studies at VCU and at STVU or the Baptist Theological Seminary in order to equip students for ministries in which clinical and administrative skills in social work are considered critical.

Under his watch, the Samuel DeWitt Proctor School of Theology at VUU has expanded its continuing education program to provide creative ways to accommodate students who cannot be full-time students. Some of these students come to campus to study in weeklong blocks that better suit their schedules. Others are able to take courses at a pace that accommodates their lives and families.

According to Dr. Kinney, STVU has remained strong while others have struggled has been the stress placed on practical theology, meaning the seminary seeks to train ministers to make a difference in people's lives.

"We seek to help our students understand faith and worship as it affects everyday life," Dr. Kinney said.

During his tenure, Dr. Kinney has helped bring national recognition to the seminary with his affiliations and service outside the school, including serving as a consultant to the American Baptist Convention, the Progressive National Baptist Convention, the Baptist General Convention of Virginia and the U.S. Navy and Army Chaplain Corps.

While the private, Baptist-affiliated VUU has been training people for the ministry since its inception in 1865, the graduate school dates to 1942 as the school began separating its undergraduate programs from its ministerial training. Later named for a former Dean and VUU president, the Samuel DeWitt Proctor School of Theology at Virginia Union University has been accredited by the Association of Theological Schools since 1971.

The Margaret Rose **Johnson Scholarship**

Named for the first women's ministry president (1900), the Women's Ministry of the Baptist General Convention is pleased to announce our first two Margaret Rose Johnson scholarship in several years in the amount of \$1200 each, totally \$2400. The scholarship recognizes the need for competent, informed, and prepared leadership. We believe those chosen to work in Christian Service should not only become living examples of God's Word, but also be able to understand and articulate it as well. Further, we recognize there may be those who desire to follow God's calling to a seminary education but may lack the necessary financial means. Therefore, to promote education in the face of hardship, The Margaret Rose Johnson Scholarship Fund was es-


