WW II TRIVIA FOR NOVEMBER 2021

- In the US national election of November1932 the American public elected Franklin Roosevelt by a landslide.
- In the German national election of the same month the German people elected Adolf Hitler by a landslide. On January 30, 1933 Hitler became chancellor of Germany. That day was Franklin Roosevelt's birthday.
- German submarines arrived off the US East Coast in January 1942 and began sinking Allied shipping. It was not until March 1, that US armed forces sank the first German submarine, U-656, off Newfoundland. By that time, 14 German submarines were falsely reported to have been sunk off the East Coast.
- As the war ended in Europe US forces captured enough V-2 missile components to make some 100 missiles. The Soviets knew this.
- Soon after coming to power in Italy Mussolini banned beauty contests and dancing claiming that they were immoral.
- In Germany on April 16, 1941 14 year old Joseph Ratzinger joined the Hitler Youth by law. In 2005 Ratzinger became Pope Benedict XVI.
- President Truman's advisers told him that the US could expect between 300,000 to 3 million casualties if we were forced to invade Japan. Truman and his aides used the figure 1 million in their planning.
- During the German occupation of France the Germans used the Maginot Line facilities as warehouse space and stored a wide variety of items there. Many of the items were still there by 1970 so the French government sold them at auction.
- When he was captured by Allied forces in 1945, Hermann Goering had become so fat that he couldn't put on his own boots. When he was jailed at Nuremberg he was put on a forced died and lost weight.



58th Bomb Wing of 568th Bomb Group

Although two Bombardment Wings were allocated to Twentieth Bomber Command, only the 58th Bombardment Wing entered service in the China, India and Burma Theater. The wing arrived in India in March 1944 and was based at Kharagpur. A forward staging base had been created at Kwanghan, China. The 58th Bombardment Wing carried out 72 missions from these two bases. Later, the bombing campaign from China finally came to an end when the 58th Bombardment Wing closed down its operations on 29 March 1945. It was then transferred to Tinian in the Marianas Islands.









As the Imperial Japanese Army swept across China and South Asia at World War II's outset, closing all of China's seaports, more than 200,000 Chinese laborers embarked on a seemingly impossible task: to cut a 700-mile overland route -- the Burma Road -- from the southwest Chinese city of Kunming to Lashio, Burma. But when Burma fell in 1942, the Burma Road was severed. As the first step of the Allied offensive toward Japan, American general Joseph Stilwell reopened it, while, at the same time, keeping China supplied by air-lift from India and simultaneously driving the Japanese out of Burma.

From the breathtaking adventures of the American "Hump" pilots who flew hair-raising missions over the Himalayas to make food-drops in China to the true story of the mission that inspired the famous film *The Bridge on the River Kwai*, to the grueling jungle operations of Merrill's Marauders and the British Chindit Brigades, *The Burma Road* vividly re-creates the sprawling, sometimes hilarious, often harrowing, and still largely unknown stories of one of the greatest chapters of World War II.

"Time Runs Out in CBI" Carrying the narrative from General Wedemeyer's assumption of command to the end of the war, this volume concludes with Americans still working to improve the Chinese Army while attempting to fly in sufficient supplies from India and Burma. WWII Round Table Member James McDowell — our "Jimmy Mack", a Living Legend!



James McDowell (Jimmy Mack) of Indianapolis, peacefully passed away at age 99 October 13, 2021. (Thank you, Jill Fewell, for posting his part of his story on FaceBook)

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231st Station Hosnital

Jimmy was born June 30, 1922 to John and Bura McDowell in Lincoln, NE. He had 2 brothers and one sister. He was a graduate of Lincoln High School in Lincoln, NE. He was the Senior class president as well as a singer with several school choral groups. Jimmy joined the Army in 1942. He was stationed at Camp Atterbury in Columbus, IN. During that time he would take a bus from Columbus to Indianapolis to shop for sheet music and records. That is where he met a very special lady who worked for Pearson's Music Co. in downtown Indianapolis. Once he saw her, he was "smitten"! After he returned to Pearson's Music Store, several times, the salesgirl invited him to her radio broadcasting class at The Jordan Conservatory of Music, at Butler University, where she attended. After he went to the broadcasting class, he was hooked! He knew right then that after the war was over he would pursue a career in radio broadcasting. That special gal's name was Peggy Million. They fell in love and got engaged in 1944. Jimmy was sent overseas to work in admissions at the 231st Station Hospital at Morley Hall, Norfolk, United Kingdom. It was a military hospital to support 15 Heavy Bomber bases. The patients were casualties from highaltitude missions flying over enemy territory. While stationed at the hospital, the commanding officer, Colonel Linwood Gable, decided he needed to incorporate music for the morale of the service personnel and patients. Jimmy became the singer with the "Gable Gators Orchestra".

England ~ 1944

The Hospital band played a number of concerts and dances for British War Charities, the British Ministry of Information and the English-Speaking Union offered speakers and entertainers, prominent military and civilian leaders gave speeches and discussions. The 231st SH participated in the "Stars and Stripes War Orphan Fund", raising £111-17s-5d for the support of a British war orphan by voluntary contributions. A special Christmas Party for children of Wymondham and Attleborough (Norfolk) was given on 23 December 1944; Tec 5 Jerome Schwartz was Father Christmas.

Jimmy was thrilled when Major Glenn Miller came through the 231st Station Hospital to visit the service personnel during his tour of England with his Army Air Force Band on August 18,

1944. They signed this bill! (Little did he know that Miller would be killed four months later when a plane he was on crashed into the English Channel)



Jimmy Mack's WW2 Story

On May 7, 1945 The Gable Gators were given an opportunity to record a song at the Broadcasting House in London. It was sent through the airwaves over the Armed Forces Network. After an overnight stay in London, the band members were awakened to the news that the war was over! They rushed to Piccadilly Circus in London to celebrate with thousands! That was May 8, 1945. VE Day!

After the war Jimmy and Peggy were married in Indianapolis September 1, 1946. They moved to Chicago where he enrolled in Chicago's Columbia College of Radio. After graduating, they moved to Benton Harbor, MI where he became a radio broadcaster for WHFB radio. He along with Peggy, became producers of two programs called "Lullabye Parade" and "Melody Mack 'N Peg". In 1953 Jimmy got an offer to work at WOOD-TV in Grand Rapids, MI. In 1957 the CBS affiliate of WOOD, WISH in Indianapolis, offered him a position in radio and TV. Jimmy and Peggy made the move with their three children to Indianapolis. In 1958 they produced a radio show called "Teens & Tunes" and a TV teen dance show called "Teen Twirl".

Jimmy was a choir member of Union Chapel United Methodist Church for 50 years. His singing voice was a special gift from God. He and Peggy taught Sunday School and produced several variety shows at the church. The "Mack Family" were active members of Footlite Musicals. He starred in several productions, but was best know for his portrayal of Harold Hill in "The Music Man". At WISH Jimmy was also a disc jockey playing the weekly hits from the Billboard top 100. Jimmy moved onto three radio stations where he was also an on-air personality. He stayed with WIRE, WXLW, and WBRI radio stations until he made the move to WLWI-Channel 13. He had a popular teen dance show from 1965 to 1969 called "Bandstand 13". He retired from television in 1973.

In 2003, **Jimmy Mack was interviewed for the Library of Congress Veteran History Project** at Park Tudor School. Four freshmen students were enthralled with his story and he even sang samples of popular wartime tunes for the group. 
REMINDERS: Updated Lecture Series: "Okinawa"

The plan after I finish Okinawa is to return to the battle of Guadalcanal and make a slideshow/lecture on the naval battles of Guadalcanal."

I am currently well into Part 3, but the way things are going, I think it will be five parts and that does not include the planned lectures on the use of the kamikaze and the last mission of the IJN Yamato.

They should put you in good stead if you plan to go with me to Guadalcanal or Okinawa in the future. I am now going to make one on the battle of Okinawa. When that is complete I will make one on the naval battles of Guadalcanal. As always, all critical comments are welcome. I want to get the history right.
