Wisdom From Afar....

The festival of *Shavuot* occurs on the sixth day of the Hebrew month of *Sivan*, which here is a two-day festival that begins at sundown on Saturday, 4 June 2022 and ends at nightfall on Monday, 6 June 2022. *Shavuot*, the plural of a word

meaning "week" or "seven," alludes to the fact that this festival happens exactly seven weeks (i.e., "a week of weeks") after Passover. The holiday is one of the *Shalash Regolim*, the three Biblical pilgrimage festivals. It also marks the conclusion of the Counting of the Omer.

By custom, *Shavuot* marks the giving of the *Torah* on Mount Sinai. The Ten Commandments are read in synagogues, just as they were in the desert on Mount Sinai over 3,300 years ago. *Shavuot* is not explicitly named in the Bible as the day on which the *Torah* was

revealed by God to the Israelite nation at Mount Sinai, although this is commonly considered to be its main significance.

What is textually connected in the Bible to the Feast of *Shavuot* is the season of the grain harvest, specifically of the wheat, in the Land of Israel. In ancient times, the grain harvest lasted seven weeks and was a season of gladness. It began with the harvesting of the barley during Passover and ended with the harvesting of the wheat at *Shavuot*. *Shavuot* was thus the concluding festival of the grain harvest, just as the eighth day of *Sukkot* was the concluding festival of the fruit harvest.

Other names for the holiday in the Bible include "Festival of Reaping" (*Chag HaKatzir*) and "Day of the First Fruits" (*Yom HaBikkurim*). *Shavuot* was the first day on which individuals could bring the *Bikkurim* (first fruits) to the Temple in Jerusalem. The *Bikkurim* were brought from the Seven Species for which the Land of [continued on p. 3 – *Shavuot*]

SHAVUOT

Israel is praised: wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates.

In ancient Israel, Jewish farmers would tie a reed around the first ripening fruits from each of these species in their fields. At the time of harvest, the fruits identified by the reed would be cut and placed in baskets woven of gold and silver. The baskets would then be loaded on oxen whose horns were gilded and laced with garlands of flowers and who were led in a grand procession to Jerusalem. As the farmer and his entourage passed through cities and towns, they would be accompanied by music and parades.

Today, in the post-Temple era, Shavuot is the only biblically ordained holiday that has no specific laws

attached to it other than usual festival requirements of abstaining from creative work. The rabbinic observances for the holiday include reciting additional prayers, making kiddush, partaking of meals, and being in a state of joy. Other observances include Torah study, reciting the Book of Ruth, and eating at least one dairy meal (blintzes and cheesecake, anyone?). And, of course, the Ten Commandments are still recited at synagogue services. In many congregations, members who are Jewish-by-choice will be invited to the bima to participate in the reading. Choosing to remember Shavuot is a way to reconnect with our history and heritage and to appreciate the gifts of life.

Those Lesser Known Holidays

While Sue Cohen's article ("Wisdom from Afar") gave us plenty of insight into *Shavuot* (5/6 June; 6/7 *Sivan*), there are holidays in May (*Iyar*) that often go unnoticed.

Yom Ha'Zikaron – Israel Memorial Day (4 May/3 *Iyar*). Yom Ha'Zikaron is the national remembrance day observed in Israel for all Israeli military personnel who lost their lives in the struggle that led to the establishment of the State of Israel and for those who have been killed subsequently while on active duty in Israel's armed forces. As of last year, that was 23,928 military personnel.

Yom Ha'Atzmaut – Israel Independence Day (4-5 May/3-4 *Iyar*). Yom Ha'Atzmaut is the national day of Israel, commemorating the Israeli Declaration of Independence in 1948. The day is marked by official and unofficial ceremonies and observances.

Lag B'Omer – 33rd Day of the Omer (19 May/18 Iyar). *Lag B'Omer* literally means the 33rd day of the Omer. The Omer is counted for 49 days between the second evening of Passover and the holiday of *Shavuot* (derived from the practice of counting the days from the barley offering at the Temple to the day of the wheat offering on *Shavuot*, in the *Torah*.

Yom Yerushalayim – Jerusalem Day (29 May/28 *Iyar*). Jerusalem Day is an Israeli national holiday commemorating the reunification of Jerusalem and the establishment of Israeli control over the Old City in the aftermath of the June 1967 Six-Day War. The day is officially marked by state ceremonies and memorial services.

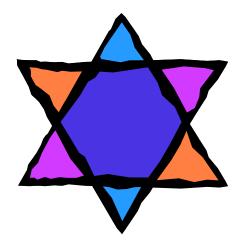
New Memorial Plagues
