Biography

Melvin Arthur Nowiski, 99, of Bad Axe, passed away on Thursday, May 15, 2025 at the Huron County Medical Care Facility. He was born on March 20, 1926 in Harbor

Beach, to the late Theodore & Mary (Schubert) Nowiski. He married Mildred Vernita Zick on February 18, 1950. Melvin was a proud veteran of the Army and served with distinction during WWII. After separating from the Army with an honorable discharge, he returned to Bad Axe and started his career at Stan's Body Shop where he learned the art of bumping and painting automobiles. While working there he also learned how to build race cars not only for his customers but for himself. After leaving Stan's Body Shop he went to work at Thumb Oil & Gas where he drove a tanker truck to Detroit as well as ran the body shop. Melvin also worked for Jim Hinterman Ford/Mercury where he became a manager. Once Jim Hinterman sold his business to George Ordus Ford/Mercury, Melvin continued to run their body shop as manager. After working several years for Ordus, Melvin went out on his own and built Mel's Body Shop, where he worked until he retired and became a part-time snow bird with his wife in Florida.
