

the"OFFICIAL VIEW"

I had "hounded" Jim Voyles (Ava Ranger District) to give <u>us</u> some information for, or about, Chadwick. This is his first contribution and I think it's most appropriate, that he talks about,...how Chadwick came to be. He promises to "talk more" in following issues, and we'll definatly support that. If you like hearing about Chadwick...drop him a line and let him know. I'll include his address at the end of this.

Thought I'd start with a little history and information about the area itself.

Chadwick is part of the Mark Twain National Forest, administered by the Forest Service, U.S. Department of The Mark Twain National Forest was created during the 1930's by buying lands from people who wanted to leave the area or who had starved out from the droughts and depression during this period. The area looked much different then it does today. Few trees were evident as most had been cut as famalies tried to scratch a living from the steep rocky soils. This led to erosion and the deposition of much of the gravel we find in the streams today. With proper management, however, the area recovered. In the late 50's or early 60's motorcyclists began riding in the area, creating trails and utilizing the old roads throughout the area. Use increased until around 1974 the Forest Service realized something had to be done to regulate use in the area. Trail designation began and many poor trails were closed. The two campgrounds, Camp Ridge, and Cobb Ridge, were constructed during the 70"s also. Over the years, trails have been closed due to poor location and erosion, and new trails designated and constructed. Today the area consists of about 7083 acres with approximately 100 miles or so of designated trails.

Next time I'll try to give some information on problems we have, and some of the projects planned for the future.

Would like to welcome SURDYKE YAMAHA MARIONVILLE and STEVE UNDERWOOD as our first dealer to advertise in this letter. Steve is one of the first "dirt bike people" I met after moving here. He always impressed me as "giving a fair deal" when I visited his shop, and always had what I needed. I guess I'm unlike other people in that I don't expect dealers (in general) to give me anything. Maybe it's the understanding that they're trying to make a living at what they do. (And my understanding that I'm too old, too fat, and too slow to be awarded a factory contract,...and get free stuff!.) Steve is a genuine off-road enthusiest and it shows in the way he runs the dealership. It's with a good deal of confidence that I tell you that you can expect at the very least, a fair deal. Now let's see,............38 potted ferns, 3 fake tree's, 19 large rocks, about 10 yards of green indoor/outdoor carpet, a bucket full of gravel......we can put that down the center isle of the new store and have a 15 second enduro special test section. Well 15 seconds for me,.....that means for the fast guy's....it'll take 8 seconds,......hmmmwe'll make them go 4 loops AND check them before they start (they'll burn the start check.) The sad part is,....they'll still beat me! If you get down that way, you owe it to yourself to stop in and see the place.

CANNON CREEK ENDURO

A note from Max & Coy; Thanks for all the help! This Enduro couldn't have happened without the help and support given by so many! See you at Chadwick! (Think they'll do one next year?)

All I can say is; IT'S A GOOD THING THAT ENDURO WASN'T ROCKY! I don't need to tell you that's one rocky trail,....but fun! Now that the trail's blowed in, it'll be some good riding this fall. How hot was it?...Actually it wasn't, in fact it was as close to fall weather as you're going to get in Missouri, in August. The temperature was about 83 degrees, a nice breeze, and key time at 7:00 AM insured cool riding. A half an inch of rain Friday and Saturday morning's provided a soil content that was perfect. Call it blind luck, but it would be impossible to duplicate the conditions for an August event.

The first section out to 3 miles (and Ck # 1) was tight causing all but the very best riders to drop at least 1 point getting there. From there they traveled over the "moon rocks" to a reset before and after the grass track/spectator area. Following this section was a cruise into the emergency gas, and another reset. That ended the resets for the next 10-11 miles as the speed changed to 15 mph through sections that varied in difficulty until around the 21.5 mile mark where, after a particularly rocky, tight woods section, they literaly fell into a tie-breaker Check manned by Steve Underwoods crew, and Rusty Reynaud. Again only very good riders zeroed on minutes and seconds. Leaving there meant another reset. After leaving that reset, they went into a Check in just .26 miles catching some "gamblers" early and setting the start of a test section that would last 3 miles and end at a tie-breaker check at 30.0 miles captained by BJEC treasurer Kenny Williams. Most people dropped points there including several AA riders, proving it was a worthy test section. From there the course got very rocky as the speeds slowed and many of the C-riders went into "survival mode" negotiating the trials area of the course. A reset followed that as a rest stop before going 24 mph into the finish of the short course in a section that was considered impossible to maintain the speed. While I'm sure the novice riders agreed with this, many A, and AA riders zeroed it including Steve Leivan......with no back brake!

A long reset at the gas (26 minutes) allowed the long course riders a break before they went out on the same start section at 24 mph. This time the section went for 6.3 miles until right before the emergency gas where the Check crew made up of BJEC Chairman Mike Shown, and Vice Chairman Vincent Davis, assisted by AA rider Steve Travis and a couple of very pretty girls took points from everyone! After the emergency gas the speeds dropped to 18 mph and became an endurance test with only two more checks in that 22 miles of rocks.

While short for BJEC standards at 57 miles actual,....every rider I talked to.....said they had enough! Scoring went very quickly as Robyn Beindorf headed a team of scorers who rapidly organized the cards as Max and Coy gave out over 50 contingency door prizes donated by area dealers. With everyone scored and trophy's (provided by Jerry Sharp) given out by 1:30 in the afternoon......all were reasonably happy as they hit the road for home.

Worth talking about is Steve Leivan. Relatively new to the circuit, he "smoked" the AA class with a 1 point drop on the entire course after bending a brake rotor on the back of his YZ and changing the complete wheel assembly at the gas stop! A known fast guy (4th or 5th in the National Hare Scramble Series) he also proved he can keep time with the best. The most amazing thing to me when I talked to him at the gas stop (in the middle of the wheel change) was how genuinely nice he and his entire family was. As an accomplished whiner, I would have been in high gear. Steve calmly changed out the wheel with the help of his family, took a drink, and disappeared into the tree's. He ultimately tied with George Waller Jr. with one point drop each, with Steve winning on emergency points. A phenominal ride,...rewarded with a win.

My final thought is to Max and Coy who spent countless hours, and dollars all winter and summer cutting new trails and getting the course ready. It was probably a good team mix as it seemed Max did 65% of the work, and Coy did 65% of the worrying! Actually I bet it was closer to 50/50. A very good effort in promoting their first enduro with the help of the Hardwood Enduro crew, and countless hours by friends and local riders. A special mention for "Stanley" from Lebonan Suzuki/Kawasaki as he appeared to be everywhere and ready to do anything. His individual efforts went a long way toward making this event go!
