# Maximum Effort Amazing Results

On September 4<sup>th</sup> 2017, the Suzy Fitzgerald Shelter provided shelter services to fourteen (14) guests. This, unusual for September and with warm weather, revealed homeless situations are still everpresent regardless of expectation. During high census times, the Shelter never declines services to any person. Maximum effort by our House Managers to adjust to unexpected high census circumstances ensures exceptional services are provided to every guest entering the shelter.

Case management is provided by our Case Worker who understands the immediate need of assisting guests in obtaining permanent housing. Our Case Worker works with guests to identify and help resolve any barriers preventing guests from obtaining permanent housing of their own. These barriers may include credit history, rental history, criminal history, financial limitations, mental health and/or substance use concerns, etc.

During September and October, our House Managers worked diligently to provide home-cooked meals, clean linens and bedding, laundry services, etc., to every guest and provide a safe environment for all. Our Case Worker also worked to assist the guests in obtaining permanent housing. Of the 14, a mother and her four children are now living in a safe and spacious apartment, another mother and her daughter are living in a modular unit close to town, and 5 single individuals were helped obtain permanent housing.

One of these clients specifically was an accomplishment, as she was chronically homeless and had received shelter services multiple times in an attempt to obtain housing, but the barriers for her were too great then. We were able to overcome the barriers with her dedication to changing her situation and she is now working full-time and living a mile from work. She has reinstated her driver's license and bought a vehicle. It takes effort in changing a situation and motivation is a focal point of case management, showing that things can change and the opportunity is there to do it.

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
