<u>The Members Survey</u> was the next project the Committee undertook to engage you the member, and it was pleasing to note there are 60 members from a membership base of 170 who deemed it worthwhile to have a say in the future of the AHCS, thank you for your participation. This survey assisted in the underpinning of the current project the Committee is working on which is developing a 5-year Strategy. Member Survey results.

Housekeeping matters

There is a niggly membership house-keeping matter that needs to be addressed.

You the member have an obligation to assist the AHCS Breed Registrar ABRI in keeping the herd book relevant and when you sell an animal there is a matter of filling in the paperwork to transfer and pay the administration fee for the transfer – no matter whether the new owner wants to have the animal registered or not.

Please ensure you follow this procedure your help maintains the financial stability of the Society. Transfer issues causes inaccuracies in the herd book. This in turn has caused many headaches not only for our Registrar at ABRI but also for the AHCS Committee and for the person who buys an animal that has not been transferred from the original owner. **So, in short, remember to transfer all animals that you sell.**

Also deceased animals need to have paperwork completed as well – please check out the website https://www.australianhighlandcattle.org/ for all your animal forms.

Tattooing

A friendly reminder that all calves born after the 01.01.2020 that you wish to register will need to be tattooed.

Tattooing is done in the left year and the NLIS tag is placed in the right ear.

Tattoo letters and year	2020 = K	2021 = L	2022 = M	2023 = N	2024 = P
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NB. I and O are not used as it creates confusion.

If you don't know how to do this or have the equipment please contact your State Representative for advice.

• By popular demand the fancy-dress class for any age highland and handler are back – so get your thinking caps on and think up a theme.


Friday night is a welcome dinner with guest speaker.

January 2020 Committee Updates

The Committee as part of its *Governance and Administrative review* looked at its current structure to ensure compliance with laws and legislations that govern a not-for-profit organisation. The review revealed the need to apply to the Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) to become a **Registered Australian Body**. On the 22.01.2020 the AHCS officially became a Registered Australian Body our **ABRN** is **638 624 601**.

Other Governance and Administrative matters for review:

- **The Constitution** a draft Constitution will be sent to all AHCS members for review and comment in March in preparation for a vote by members and proxy at the 2020 AGM
- The Herd book Rules and Regulations is being revised and a draft will be sent to members for review shortly
- Policies and Procedures are being written and will be uploaded onto the webpage as soon as possible
- **Committee Roles and Responsibilities** will be available to members who nominate for a Committee position.
- Secretariat Agreement between AHCS and ABRI is being discussed and finalised at the next Committee
 meeting
- Fact Sheets are in the process of being developed and will be up loaded to the webpage asap.

The Committee is committed to ensuring good corporate governance for the benefit of the members and the society, recognising it is essential to ensure matters do not remain in limbo but are recognised, debated and decisions made and implemented in a timely fashion.

One such matter is the **2016 Fully Imported Bloodlines Motion** which had been partially implemented, with a P(F) in the electronic database. The original intention was for an "F" prefix. The Committee sought legal opinion and this was tabled at the January 2020 Committee Meeting. The Committee had a robust discussion over 2 meetings before determining how to proceed. In February 2020 the Committee resolved by a majority vote to implement a separate prefix "F" denoting Fully Imported Bloodlines; in line with the 2016 motion.

ABRI will be informed and all Highland Cattle with the prefix P(F) will be changed to "F" and all newly registered Fully Imported Bloodline highland cattle will be denoted with the prefix "F".

November 2019 Committee meeting

Western Australia State Representative and AHCS Councillor Nathan Perry, bought to the attention of the Committee the WA Department of Agriculture's legislation with regards to importing cattle from inter-state as one of the criteria is all cattle need to a J-Bas score 8. This means that the WA members are unable to purchase any Highland cattle from east coast breeders. <u>The question asked was how do WA members grow their folds</u>? The discussion involved looking at various methods but the most expedient was to re-introduce the 'inspection of highland type' female cattle. This then was expanded to allow all AHCS members to have this opportunity.

Therefore, as of the **1**st **January 2020** female cattle of 'highland type 'with an assumed purebred breeding background will be eligible for inspection for possible registration into the Australian Highland Cattle Society Inc herd book as Grade C cattle.

Information for members and for the website, as well as the update to the Herd book Regulations is currently being prepared and will be available soon

Three agenda items are the 2020 AGM, the finalisation of the Draft Constitution for review before it goes to members for consultation and the Secretariat Agreement between AHCS and ABRI.

Finally, I would like to thank the AHCS volunteer Councillors. To be a Councillor takes time and commitment not only to the process of governance and administration but also to being available to attend shows, go to field days, contact members, develop and publish the Highland Fling, write newsletters, maintain the webpage and Facebook pages all while maintaining personal and family time and paid work.

To be engaged and committed to this position shows dedication to the breed and a belief in the future development of the Society. If you know a Councillor, thank them, if you don't then get to know them, they work for the betterment of the breed and Society.
