More than 80 communities in the United States — and nearly 50 more around the world — are redefining what is possible in the movement to end homelessness.

Built for Zero is a methodology, a movement, and proof of what is possible. Anchored in a commitment to driving to zero, cities and counties have changed how local homeless response systems work and the impact they can achieve.

By harnessing the power of real-time, person-specific data and problem-solving skills from other sectors, more than half of those cities and counties have achieved reductions in the number of people experiencing chronic and veteran homelessness. Eleven of those communities have ended homelessness for a population by reaching a standard called Functional Zero.

Together, they are proving that moral courage, datadriven thinking, and a systemwide approach can build a future where homelessness is rare overall and brief when it

Communities are proving it does not have to be this way.

Cities and counties across the United States are reducing and ending homelessness one population at a time.

Eleven communities have driven those numbers down all the way to a milestone for ending homelessness known as Functional Zero — including the first county in the country to end chronic homelessness. By reaching this milestone, communities are building a future where

It was 30 stair steps from the door of the apartment to the street, and LaShawn Claiborne remembers counting each one, praying she wouldn't trip, carrying her 8-month-old daughter in a stroller. She'd come back to Seattle to try to make a life: She was raised by her father, relatives and foster families back east, but she needed a new start, and she thought she could do that if she came back to where she was born.

Claiborne's story is rife with many of the modern causes of family homelessness: wages that don't cover rent, conflict within families, and domestic violence. Things started out all right: She stayed with family in a Federal Way apartment and got a job at Walmart in less than two weeks. ut Claiborne felt as if her baby wasn't safe while she was at

Who Qualifies for HUD Housing?

How to Qualify

To qualify for public housing as an individual, you must either be elderly or have a disability, and you must also have low income. Families can qualify for HUD housing if their income falls below certain levels. All housing agencies use income limits published by HUD, and they must show preference to applicants with lower incomes. You may qualify for HUD

housing if your income is below 80 percent of the median income for your city or county, but housing agencies must provide at least 75 percent of their funding to applicants with incomes at or below 30 percent of the area's median income.

How to Apply

To apply for HUD housing, submit a written application to your local housing

agency. The application requires the name of everyone who will live in the home, your current contact information, your family circumstances, contact information for previous landlords and your estimated income for the next 12 months. After receiving the application, the agency may visit your current home to evaluate how well you care for it.

and she didn't get along with the relative she was staying with. She decided to leave after a fight with her relative. As she was getting ready to go, the relative hit her in the face, according to a police report. But Claiborne didn't want to stay at Walmart: She wanted to go back to school to study nursing, so Wellspring nominated her for a \$10,000 scholarship from the Wom-

en's University Club, which she won through a competitive application process, with help from Wellspring. "The first cycle I wanted to break was being a mother, because I didn't have that. I don't want to have a child and then have that child raised by somebody else," Claiborne said. "My second cycle I wanted to break was being homeless. ... I want to live my life without worry-

ing about evictions and bills and my child being out on the street." Claiborne is now studying pre-nursing online at a college in Florida, where she plans on moving to finish the degree

Word on The Street — Meridian City Council Approves New Panhandling

The first ordinance deals with private businesses and panhandling.

The new panhandling ordinance would allow private businesses to display a sign that clearly states no panhandling.

If panhandling occurs the panhandler will be arrested and charged with panhandling, begging or related

activities. Property owners will have certain guidelines on where a sign will need to be placed and what it needs to say.

The second ordinance passed makes it unlawful for anyone on the street to pass an item to a driver or a driver to pass an item to someone on the street.

According to state law, a

misdemeanor crime has to occur in front of a witness or officer for the officer to charge that person.

If someone takes a photo of someone panhandling and leaves before officers get there, the business owner would have to go to the police department and file charges.

The City hopes the public will appreciate these


THE STORY OF PASTOR JEREMIAH STEEPEK
