

# Dr. Mary Anne Larkin

MAKING A DIFFERENCE FROM GENERATION TO GENERATION

Pr. Mary Anne Larkin has spent her career making sensory connections—helping patients improve their hearing and reconnecting them to what they've been missing.

Practicing audiology since 1983, she founded Advanced Hearing Care on Johnnie Dodds Boulevard in Mount Pleasant in 1993.

"It is very rewarding to watch my patients become revitalized by the ability to hear more clearly." Larkin explains. "Enhanced hearing improves my patients' quality of life by giving them renewed energy and overall wellness."

Giving back to the community is paramount to Larkin. Providing free adult hearing screenings and serving as a speaker and expert on the subject of hearing loss and tinnitus in civic organizations, health institutions, senior community groups and public gatherings is only part of her professional wheelhouse.

In her spare time, Larkin is an active member of Hibben Methodist Church, supporter of East Cooper Meals on Wheels and a fierce competitor in the U.S. Tennis Association (UTSA) 4.0 league.

"My father was a physicist, a profession some call a 'rocket scientist," Larkin says, laughing. "He later became a university professor and fully committed to whatever he attempted. He instilled a very strong work ethic in me and I grew up with an intrinsic desire to learn and work diligently."

Larkin attended Purdue University, where she met her husband, Brian and while there, found her niche in the science of hearing.

"I was always interested in science and medicine. When I read about Purdue's audiology program and realized there was also a counseling component, I knew it was a perfect fit," she reveals.

Larkin obtained her master's degree in audiology and later, a doctorate degree from the University of Florida, one of the nation's leading audiology universities.

After college, she and Brian moved to Florence, South Carolina. "Our friends said we'd never find equally great jobs in our professions in the same city at the same time. But, Brian was hired the day he interviewed with a marketing firm, and I had an offer within the week." Larkin says.

After four years in Florence, the Larkins had an opportunity to expand their careers and moved to Mount Pleasant.

"We love the people of Mount Pleasant and knew it would be a great place to raise a family. Our daughters, Lindsay and Allie, were delivered by the same obstetrician, in the same hospital room at the exact same time of day!"


Now in their 20s, their daughters share the same spirit of academia; Lindsay as a Doctor of Optometry and recent graduate of the Southern College of Optometry in Memphis; and Allie, with degrees in biochemistry and math from the University of North Carolina Asheville, following impressive theatre accomplishments at the Charleston County School of Arts.

"Our daughters use their passions, academics and time to contribute to the community," Dr. Larkin says. "We're very proud of them."

**T**hen you think of a School Resource Officer you think of someone who's there to keep the school and students safe.

Officer Paula Wilson doesn't stop there. She walks the halls of Moultrie Middle School, clad in her uniform chatting with students on their way to class. There are over 800 children at the school and she knows many by name; it's clear her presence is a staple—to students and faculty.


Assistant Principal Ryan Giles is quick to sing Wilson's praises noting, "She's an amazing resource officer and it's obvious she cares about every student's success. We call on her expertise in a variety of situations."

Growing up, Wilson knew she wanted to help people. She majored in Criminal Justice, imagining herself in the FBI. After graduation, she visited a friend in Mount Pleasant and fell in love with the community. In 1997, she was hired by the Mount Pleasant Police Department and she hasn't looked back.

For the first two years of her career, Wilson served as a patrol officer followed by a three-year stint as a resource officer, and later as a detective for 13 years investigating crimes involving children, the elderly, and those with mental health issues.

"I always found myself gravitating toward those who can't advocate for themselves," Wilson says.

Eventually, Wilson's desire for a more reliable schedule led her back to the schools. Before that, Wilson and her husband, Bob



Police Department and a member of the Navy Reserves, were oftentimes both on call. Their schedules made home life challenging, to say the least, for them and their five and six-year old sons.

Now, the family has more opportunities to spend time together.

"We love being outside, going to the county parks and swimming. With two energetic boys, pretty much anything is active. We also have a black lab and go to Short Stay, the military campground," Wilson adds.

At work, all days are different.

"We work with youth on law-related education, getting them comfortable with law-enforcement presence and counseling for things like bullying prevention, while keeping the campus safe. Let's just say I get my steps in every day," Wilson says.

Outside of the school, Wilson serves on a critical incident response team where she's on call for negotiating with those in crisis situations.

She also serves alongside the Police Department, involved in community oriented programs; a summer safety camp for elementary students, a relationship-building camp for at-risk youth and a program where officers assist senior citizens with their yardwork and household duties.

"We want to have a positive presence in both schools and the community that make the youth and parents comfortable to interact with us," Wilson says.

Between her day job and community outreach, Wilson's contributions don't go unnoticed. She most certainly reflects the positivity she and her colleagues strive for, making an impact - every day.



# Farming and Community Merge at Boone Hall Farms

arming has been a part of Boone Hall Plantation for over three centuries. There aren't many farms left in this country that can make that claim. The agricultural arm of the plantation today is known as Boone Hall Farms. This small community farm is located on a part of Boone Hall that has some of the richest coastal farmland in the state. There's something about that black dirt combined with today's safe farming practices and a staff whose dedication is second to none...that comes together to produce some of the healthiest freshest produce available anywhere. Boone Hall Farms works closely with agents from the Clemson Extension Service to grow a wide variety of produce in the spring, summer, and fall that have become essential parts of family dinner tables all over the Lowcountry.

Much of the produce sold by local grocers is shipped in from far away places. The produce grown at this local farm in season is sold at Boone Hall Farms Market right across the street and also at their Roadside Produce Stand located right next to some of the farm fields. It doesn't get any fresher than that.

Additionally, Boone Hall Farms believes it is important to reach out to their neighbors in local communities to give opportunities to stay involved and engaged with the farm. Crop fields are open for U-picking of certain crops throughout the spring and summer. The Lowcountry Strawberry Festival in the spring and the Boone Hall Pumpkin Patch in the fall are two of the largest agritourism events presented in the state each year. All provide great family fun on the farm. The farm-to-table program provides produce for many of Charleston's finest restaurants and grocery stores. Shares for the Boone Hall Farms Community Supported Agriculture

for local residents.

It is also worth noting that for several years in a row, both the farm and the CSA program have been voted winners in their perspective categories by the readers of The City Paper in the annual Best Of Charleston awards. While ownership and staff are grateful for this type of recognition, more importantly, awards of this kind help to validate that farming and community involvement go hand in hand at Boone Hall Farms.



### STEPHANIE FAISON



#### TO BE FEARLESS

What is the secret to success? Most believe that passion is the key.

Stephanie Faison, Mount Pleasant resident and Air Traffic Manager of Charleston International Airport, challenges this idea and shares her personal journey of success.

In 1986, Faison worked as a flight data clerk in New York Center. Scraping by to pay the bills and living on a boat off the coast of Long Island, the Northeastern graduate knew that it was time to make a career move. But where?

When two friends approached her with an opportunity, Faison knew she had to say yes or as she recalls thinking, "It's probably better than what I'm doing now!" The



three formed a lifelong bond and it led to their becoming the only three female air traffic controllers (ATC) in New York Center at that time.

"We started together in 1987. In my area, we were the only three women out of two hundred and sixty," Faison recalls. "It was unusual--and difficult."

While Faison was growing up, her father worked as an ATC, but she hadn't planned to follow in his footsteps.

"I needed a job. I was living on a boat on Long Island and was working as a government clerk, getting paid very little. One of my friends said to me, 'We should take the [ATC] test!' I said back to her, 'Why not?'"

Faison says her secret to success has been and is networking. Her life-long friendships have taught her the importance of fearlessness, tenacity, and saying "yes" to opportunity when opportunity knocks.

"It helps when you surround yourself with people who are going through the same struggle as you are. My friendships are very important to me," she says.

Her hard work paid off. She leads a team of air traffic controllers and oversees the air traffic operations at the Charleston International Airport Tower and surrounding areas. As for Faison's favorite part of the job?

"The money," she says, laughing. "Beyond that, it's a very interesting job and a great career. It's very stimulating and I do a lot of problem solving. It's never the same. I solve a puzzle in a different way every time I sit down."


Faison's career and life path has enabled her to travel all over the globe, but she chose Mount Pleasant as home. She lives on two acres of land in the beautiful and tranquil Alston Point with a dozen chickens, as well as a few cats and dogs.

"I love Mount Pleasant and Alston Point," Faison admits, "Mount Pleasant is developing quickly, but here, where I am, it's very quiet."

Faison is the mother of two college-aged children. Her daughter is pursuing studies at the College of Charleston and her son is a student at the Maritime College in the Bronx, New York.

Faison's lives by the mantra of being fearless. She inspires everyone she meets to live fearlessly and to hold fast to friendships. Her story teaches the importance of seizing the day, and begs the question, *What will you say "yes" to today?*

## "I'm very strong-willed with very strong opinions. I love this community and the feel of it."



That love of community led her to town council in 2009, where she served for four years, then as Mayor in 2013. She refers to herself as part-time Mayor, part-time business owner.

A typical week for Page includes: morning meetings; serving on eight outside agency boards; attending various ribbon cuttings and chamber luncheons; afternoons running the business, and weekends spent serving as auctioneer and picker.

With so many commitments, it seems downtime would be impossible, but Page is quick to refute.

"I have great time-management skills, so I actually have free time as well. I have two grown kids and two dogs. I love cooking, gardening, going boating, going to the beach and reading," she says.

Page points to her vision board she's created for the year—career goals, exercise, reading and writing—all displayed to remind her of what she wants to achieve.

When asked about those Mayoral career goals she pauses, then answers, "To engage more people. The government is run by older people, but it's young people who change the world."

She mentions how a young council member in Florence, South Carolina changed things because of her relentless energy. She firmly believes that others, including the generation ahead can make change through dedication and energy. Her own has inspired an uptick in town meeting attendance. She's proud of the work they've done in terms of the community's social media presence and the new website they've built.

She believes there is still room for change. Mount Pleasant's population is approximately 83,000 with women being over 50 percent of it. She encourages women to be part of its government.

"It [Mount Pleasant] needs to be representative of those who live here. I think what a lot of women don't realize is that they're well-suited to politics because they're empathetic, nurturing, kind...good qualities for a politician," she says.

Page believes you don't wait for change to come. You help make the change.

"I'm normal," she says with a laugh. "I burn dinner, get runs in my stockings and am late sometimes. People can do this—community service. It's just regular 'stuff' and it's important."



### FREEDOM

The smell of pine as you enter the forest. The sound of the stream as it gently flows by. The morning dew as it reflects off the ancient oak trees. The sounds of the owls as they "hoo" through the night. These are just a few things that Mount Pleasant resident, Phyllis Sheffer, loves about hiking.

In March 2014, Sheffer began an expedition that carried her from the mountains of Georgia to the peaks of Maine. With nothing more than a backpack and over 2,100 plus miles to conquer, her journey across the Appalachian Trail proved to be the best, and most challenging time of her life.

She's explored Mt. Kilimanjaro in Africa and trekked through Nepal, Tibet, India and the majestic Long Trail from Massachusetts to Canada. There's little Sheffer hasn't seen. But, her favorite is the Appalachian Trail. Each year, hundreds attempt the hike of the Appalachian, but few make it to the end.

"I saw so many people leave the trail after a few weeks, but I never had the thought in my mind to quit," Sheffer recalls. "I realize how great this world really is and how wonderful people are, no matter where they live, how much, or how little they have."

Appalachian Trail challenged Sheffer both physically and emotionally. Most importantly, it gave her faith. Sheffer recommends, "If you ever lose your faith in people, you should spend some time hiking the Appalachian Trail."

She recounts some of her experiences. "I actually had total strangers offer a ride into town or a place to sleep. I realize how great this world really is and how wonderful people are, no matter where they live, how much, or how little they have."

Daughter of a World War II veteran, widow of a veteran, and mother of a marine, Sheffer comes from a strong military background. And, when she isn't celebrating her freedom by hiking her way around the world, she's serving her country through her commitment to the South Carolina State Guard (SCSG).

Sheffer serves as a member of SCSG's Third Brigade. Managed by the South Carolina Military Department, the Third Brigade is one of three in the SCSG serving the Lowcountry. The SCSG volunteers thousands of hours annually, preparing for and responding to natural and man-made disasters.

"The thing I love most about the State Guard is the opportunity to serve my country, my community, and to learn and grow as a person," Sheffer says.

Sheffer moved to Mount Pleasant eleven years ago to be closer to her son. She sold the family business in Knoxville, Tennessee, and once she crossed the Ravenel, she instantly fell in love.

"I love the people and the community. It feels like I'm living in a post card."

Sheffer's story teaches us the importance of patriotism and celebrating our freedoms through the lives that we lead each day.

"I am so lucky to have the freedom to do anything that I want. My heart is and has always been red, white, and blue."


