DAI LOY GAMBLING HOUSE MUSEUM



The Museum was specially opened the weekend of November 5 and 6 to coordinate with the Christmas opening at the River Road Art Gallery. However, the Museum will be closed in December and shall remain so until the spring, except for specially prearranged group visits which are handled by Clarence Pratt.

Steve Simmons, photograper for the book *Delta Country*, was the speaker for the October membership meeting held in Clarksburg. He presented a very entertaining and informative program on his photographic techniques and equipment and showed a series of slides taken for the book. Steve has donated 100 postcards featuring pictures of Locke to be sold at the museum; this was in the way of saying "thank you" to the SRDHS for the help of its members in completing the book.

Bill Zion of Lafayette, who keeps a boat at the Meadows, has donated to the SRDHS the Southern Pacific Railroad sign designating Locke. It formerly stood beside the tracks at the edge of town.

The Board of Directors is exploring marketing the Walnut Grove and the Sacramento River Delta booklets at several "downtown" Walnut Grove locations at the request of some of the merchants. Additionally, postcards to be sold at the Museum have been discussed, and a calendar featuring 12 photos with identifying captions taken from the Society's slide collection is being considered for sale beginning in July, 1985. The calendar would be for 1986. Board members felt that a calendar would be an easy, low-key project requiring little time or effort by the membership; once initially setup, the printing could continue for many years. This would supply some additional revenue to tide the Society over from time to time. It would, as well, expose and present the Delta area through photos to a larger group which might appreciate an inexpensive keepsake or unique gift item.

SACRAMENTO HISTORY CENTER

The Sacramento History Center has announced a campaign goal of \$300,000 which will help achieve completion of the Center. Georg The directors are confident that this goal can be reached. Major financing has come through the City Council and the County Board of Supervisors. The History Center will feature 5 galleries with differing emphasis. The Community Gallery, for example, will feature permanent exhibits, computer banks, and a 2½ hour film chronic1ing the development and impact of Sacramento's ethnic and regional communities. The aim of the museum and its galleries is to provide a cohesive vision of Sacramento city and county history through both conventional museum techniques and the lastest computer technology. The other galleries are Topomophology (impact of people on land), Technology (agricultural machinery and the people who used it), Human Dialogue (communications), and the Eleanor McClatchy Gallery of Fine Printing. Recently the Center was the recipient of 26 boxes containing 60 volumes of material from the Sacramento Typographical Union #46. The material dates to the 1850's. The Union's records are the primary papers contained within, and the Center considers the gift a priceless acquisition. Only the Sacramento Union and Sacramento Bee, established in 1851 and 1857 respectively, still publish among a clutch of journals once printed in "Sacramento City."

A computerized survey of the estimated 20,000 photo prints and negatives in the Benning collection is nearing completion at the History Center. Prints from this collection will be for sale to the public shortly. Thirty boxes of material have been examined. The pictures cover a span of time from the 1930's to 50's in the Sacramento area. There is an emphasis on school pictures such as photos of Sacramento High School football teams, the orchestra, ROTC, swimming and track teams. Many pictures are anonymous: e.g. Mexican Family, Ma and Pa, Mom with Baby. One of the first classes of the Grant Union High School is included. Officers of Masonic lodges, celebration queens and many prominent Sacramentans can be identified. A sale announcement will be made before year's end. The proceeds will go to the History Center to help cover a project budget deficit.

BOOKS

Work on the Society's own book of antique houses is still underway. The releases for "the Book" and the historical material to accompany each drawing are to be gathered by December 1. Persons appointed will

then proceed towards writing, editing and publishing. Editor of this edition is Kathie Graham, who also compiled the material for this newsletter.

McClellan Airforce Base: In 1839 the site of McClellan Air Force Base north of Sacramento was little more than grazing land for antelope, deer, elk and jackrabbits. Later the area was known as the Rancho del Paso, and in the early 1930's the Army Air Corps began picking up options from owners of 1,097 acres of land from \$35 to \$450 per acre. Finally ground-breaking occurred September 8, 1936, and McClellan Field, as it was then known, was "on the map." The participants at the groundbreaking included Brigadier General Delos Emmons, Commander of March Field; Congressman Frank H. Buck of Sacramento's 3rd District; Governor Frank F. Merriam; Arthur S. Dudley, Manager of the Sacramento County Chamber of Commerce and major lobbyist for the field in Washington, D.C.; Major General George S. Simonds, and Brigadier General Henry (Hap) Arnold, then Assistant Chief of the Army Air Corps. The Governor pushed the plunger setting off an explosion sending dirt and underbrush flying. McCellean Air Force Base, the major west coast supply and maintenance facility of the US Air Force has an assigned strength of 3,595 military personnel and 13,448 civilian workers.
