June may try to be warm but dry

The name Dave Jensch might ring a few bells for TV watching old timers. They may recall a reporter by that name back in the 70's and they may remember Michelle Lee's co-anchor from the early 90's. Apart from those two on air stints, Mr. Jensch spent a lot more time working behind the scenes - 40 plus years in fact. This June, he is retiring.

One of his greatest ideas in TV news around here was to shift the weather department to all degree holding meteorologists back in 1993. Prior to that, sometimes TV weather people had meteorology training like Jack McKenna or Heatwave Berler but more often than not, the main requirement to go on air was the ability to string more than two words together and stand up for three minutes without falling down.

Now, every TV station in our market has degreed meteorologists on staff. All of us are anxiously working on forecasts for June to see how the second half of 2021 is going to play out.

There are indications that June 1st to 11th will be a roller coaster for temperatures running hot one day and cold the next while being punctuated in between by a few thunderstorms. June 12th to 16th should be sunny, dry and warm. The 17th to 25th should be cool with scattered bouts of rain. The 26th to 30th should be sunny and warm.

In general, the monthly mean temperature should run two degrees above normal. Rain totals threaten to run from normal to an inch below normal.

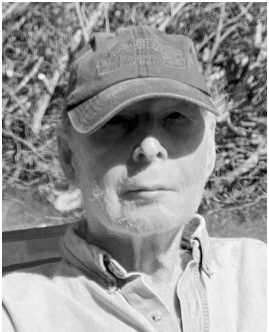
Summer itself looks to be warmer and drier than normal. The upcoming autumn will change this up, though, and turn to below normal temperatures and precipitation.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

A few months ago, I wrote a letter clarifying the planned pause on the Line 3 pipeline project and how it was important to protect our roads and environment as we transition from spring to summer. Now, as construction is about to start back up, I wanted to clear up another misconception being spread by pipeline opponents.

These protesters, many who are from out of state, continue to spout off about how the Line 3 pipeline is bad for our environment and that the new pipeline will be responsible for a massive amount of carbon emissions.

Both of these lines are flat out false.

First, under the Obama and Biden Administration, replacing the pipeline that was built more than 60 years ago was deemed necessary because of the risks it poses to our environment if not addressed. The replacement is actually to increase environmental protections across Northern Minnesota.

If we did nothing, as pipeline opponents suggest, that would mean that the pipeline would inevitably crumble at some point. And would mean oil that could be transported by pipeline would instead require use of thousands of trucks and rail cars - both which put off far greater carbon emissions than a pipeline.

Regardless of what pipeline protesters try to say, they are simply ignoring the facts that the Line 3 pipeline project is actually important to protect our environment.
