Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

It is such a blessing to be able to see many of you at worship again. I have missed your smiling faces and faithful worship. We are slowly recovering from the effects of the pandemic. We still have much to do as we return to "normal." I pray that this summer will provide some rest and renewal for you.

At Augustus, this summer will be filled with needed work on campus. We anticipate that re-paving the cemetery driveways will begin at the end of June or beginning of July. Earnings from the Cemetery Trust Fund, accumulated over nearly a decade, will pay for this improvement, expected to cost approximately \$70,000.

In July, we hope to replace the Brick Church roof. The start of this work depends on the availability of roofing shingles which match the remaining roofs on campus. The roof project will cost \$24,000. This was a completely unexpected expense, discovered after the Vestry sent out the special appeal letter for the Brick Church Repointing.

In August, we will remove the waterproof cement mortar on the sides and back of the Brick Church which has caused water damage, repair or replace any damaged exterior bricks, and re-point the bricks with the appropriate lime mortar. This re-pointing will cost \$130,000. We did not anticipate that this project would need to be done this year.

To complete these necessary projects and prevent further damage to our beloved Brick Church, we depend on the generosity of our members and friends. The total cost of the emergency Brick Church repairs (re-pointing and new roof) this year will total \$154,000. The Vestry will use the entire \$104,000 it has set aside over several decades to fund major emergency property projects. This action still leaves us with a deficit of \$50,000, which must be fully funded. If you have not already responded generously to the special Brick Church Re-pointing appeal from the Vestry and are in a financial position to do so, your Vestry will appreciate your help. Thank you.



Christian Parenting

Let the Children Come to Me

Since faith is first learned by experience and imitation, imagine all the lessons a child learns when he or she attends worship. A child sees people praising, thanking, confessing, receiving forgiveness, praying, and listening to God's word. Attending worship with your children may not always be pleasant. Yet children are more likely to attend church regularly as adults if they worship as children.

Help your child become a worship participant by preparing him or her at home. Teach him or her the Lord's Prayer and other repetitive parts of the service. Sing some of the familiar hymns. Encourage questions about what's happened in previous weeks.

During worship, let your child hold a bulletin and keep track of where you are in the service. Invite him or her to find readings and hymns in the worship book. If he or she is too young to sit through an entire service, invite you child to stay for a short time. By encouraging your children to become a worship participants, you're showing them that they belong to God's family.

Living a Stewardship Lifestyle

hen we discuss stewardship, we may immediately start to think of giving our time and money. Stewardship certainly involves giving and serving, but, even more, our stewardship is incorporated into a way of life. It does not consist of just isolated events. When God's word and love fill our hearts and minds, our stewardship becomes a lifestyle. As a lifestyle, it defines who we are and what we do. It is our vocation. With transformed hearts, we express our faith in the way we live our lives. Through faith, God provides motivation and power to live the Christian life in a growing awareness of redeeming grace.

In defining stewardship, W. H. Greever wrote, "Christian stewardship is the practice of the Christian religion. It is neither a department of life nor a sphere of activity. It is the Christian conception of life as a whole, manifested in attitudes and actions." Our faithful stewardship, as it reflects God's love, becomes our approach to life. It is more being than doing. Our deeds of stewardship such as using time wisely or helping the needy arise out of being stewards. Stewards are who we are. Stewardship is a whole life response to God out of gratitude and thanksgiving for all of his love, goodness, and mercy. T. A. Kantonen wrote, "The



life of stewardship is nothing less than 'total devotion' to the Christ who is known as a real, living personal presence in the hearts of believers, a genuine loyalty that is expressed not in mere opinion or sentiment but in character and conduct."

It does not take talented people to be faithful stewards, but it takes all there is of us. It takes our total commitment. Stewardship is our response to God's abundant grace in all aspects of life. This faithful stewardship is only possible when we acknowledge our sinfulness and our forgiveness through faith in Christ. God gives us faith so he can use us to carry out his plan, which is to save all people. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, we acknowledge God in all things and in all places. As faithful stewards, we know that all we have belongs to him so we can give generously of our time, talents, and money.

Mighty Miti Work

Matthew 28:18-20 Jesus commands us to tell others the good news. Many Papua New Guineans became Christians through the witness and evangelism of persons from neighboring tribes. Often, these tribes had formerly been enemy tribes. Evangelist families travel long distances and settle in totally unfamiliar areas to help spread the gospel there. This is known as "miti" work. The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Papua New Guinea (ELC/PNG) has sent missionaries to Australia and a number of pastors have served congregations in the United States.

Invite your family to consider how they could do "miti" work in their daily lives, such as: at school, at work, or on a sports team. (Suggestions include inviting someone to vacation Bible school, Sunday school, or youth group; sharing toys; taking turns, and so forth.) Join with your family to make a "Miti Cross" as a way to witness to others. Collect shells, stones, pine cones, or whatever forms of nature you find in your area. Glue these materials to a wooden cross. Give the cross to another family.

Exotic flowers such as frangipani and orchids flourish throughout Papua New Guinea. Glue silk flowers to a large piece of construction paper. Print: "Christians, listen together and hear the good news of Jesus." Display the poster, using this time as an opportunity to do "miti" work by telling about Jesus.

Puppets are a fun way to share the good news and tell Bible stories. Make "Proclamation Puppets" from dish washing or laundry detergent bottles that have handles. Rinse out the bottles. Place a paper towel tube over the pour spout of each bottle and fasten it with silver duct tape. Draw a face on the bottlom of the bottle with permanent markers and turn the bottle upside down so the handle is the nose. Glue felt, yarn, or buttons in place for other facial features and hair. Cut a 12" square of cloth. Cut an "X" in the center of it. Slide the tube through the "X" and tape the fabric around the tube. Choose a favorite Bible story and tell it using the puppet.

Pray for courage to tell others about Jesus' love and for guidance in how to best to do this. (Quieter family members might feel comfortable sharing prayers through the use of their puppets.)

Money Matters

Personal Financial Stewardship

Affording a House

Your house will probably be the biggest single investment vou'll make in your entire lifetime. Therefore, your mortgage is likely be the biggest single debt of your life! Scripture clearly points out the danger of getting into debt: "The borrower is servant to the lender" (Proverbs 22:7), and "Do not be a man who strikes hands in pledge or puts up security for debts; if you lack the means to pay, your very bed will snatched from under you" (Proverbs 22:26-27). Therefore, whenever you borrow money, you



should never enter into an agreement lightly or without careful thought, research, and planning.

The monthly payments you assume on a mortgage are likely to be the biggest single item in your budget. Because of its importance, you'll want to shop for the best rate and terms among all types of lenders. Whatever the source of the mortgage, you'll want to ask about variable or fixed interest rates, term of loan, fees, closing costs, points, and prepayment or late payment penalties.

Although most mortgage lenders in any given city are likely to charge about the same rates at any given time, you still may find a variation of ½ percent or slightly more at any given time. A small amount of difference in rates can mean a significant dollar amount of interest paid. For example if you borrowed \$100,000 at 7.5 percent for 30 years you would pay \$127,500 in interest over the life of the loan, whereas, if you paid 8.5 percent interest your total interest paid would be \$151,700!

Before you start shopping for a mortgage, you must decide how much mortgage or, in essence, how much house can you afford. A rule of thumb is that you can buy a house costing roughly two and one-half to three times your gross yearly income. For example, if your gross annual income is \$40,000, you can afford a house between \$100,000 to \$120,000. However, this average should be lower if you already have significant credit card or auto debt, if you have additional expenses of a large family, if you are buying an older house in need of repairs, if you have education costs, if your income is irregular, or if property and living costs are high in the area.

Another long standing rule of thumb is that you should not be spending more than 40 percent of your take-home pay for each month's total housing expenses including all the costs of owning and operating your home. This includes mortgage principal and interest, insurance, taxes, and utilities. For example, if your monthly take-home pay is \$2,500, you should be spending only \$1,000 a month on housing.








Congratulations to Dr Evelyine Mushi!
