This course will discuss reasons for increasing violence in the healthcare workplace, security measures and pitfalls, legal reforms and legislative efforts as well as financial impacts, decreases in staff wellbeing and patient care. It reviews risk factors and teaches how to identify and de-escalate potentially violent situations.



Workplace Violence Against Healthcare Workers: Challenges and Progress

James Phillips, MD, FACEP is an Assistant Professor, Chief of Disaster and Operational Medicine and Director of the Disaster and Operational Medicine Fellowship program in the Department of Emergency Medicine, George Washington University in Washington, DC. He is also Chief Medical Officer for SOS International and Medical Director at the Camp Taji military base in Iraq and a Senior Fellow at the Center for Cyber and Homeland Security at Auburn University. Dr. Phillips is an expert on workplace violence against healthcare workers. He also has expertise in training hospital workers nationwide on active shooter response and has served as a Tactical Physician for the Massachusetts State Police SWAT Team. He is a graduate of the Counter Narcotics and Terrorism Operational Medical Support program and is a nationally registered EMT-Tactical.



Violence in Healthcare: Protecting the Healthcare Workforce

Michael J. Peterson, MD, PhD, DFAPA, FACL P is an Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health. He is Director of Hospital Psychiatric Services at University Hospital in Madison with oversight of the inpatient, emergency, telepsychiatry, electroconvulsive therapy (ECT), and consultation-liaison services. Dr. Peterson earned his medical and graduate degrees in the Medical Scientist Training Program at the Medical College of Wisconsin in Milwaukee. He is a distinguished fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and a fellow of the Academy of Consultation and Liaison Psychiatry. He understands violent behavior that is frequently experienced in hospitals, nursing homes and psychiatric institutions.
