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

Pesach

Passover is our oldest holiday - it marks the anniversary of the birth of Israel as a people, and we can still learn today from its history. There are four names by which the holiday is known: 1) Chag Hamatzot - Holiday of the Unleavened Bread; 2) Chag Hapesach - Holiday of the Passover; 3) Zman Cheiruseinu - The Time of our Freedom; 4) Chag Ho'ovin - The Holiday of Spring.

<u>Chag Hamatzot</u> - We eat Matzohs instead of ordinary baked bread during the eight days of Passover. It is a replica of the bread that our ancestors ate after they hastily left Egypt. It reminds us that it is the will of G-d that no one serves another in the way of slavery imposed by Pharaoh: We serve only G-d the true ruler of the universe. The Torah states, "In the first month (Nisan) on the 14th day of the month in the evening you shall eat unleavened bread, until the 21st of the month in the evening (5HMOS 12:18). The first two and the last two days are called "Yom Tov"; the middle four are called "Chol Hamoed," concisely, 27 March 2021 until 3 April 2021 for the American calendar.

Chag Hapesach - Many of the Israelites adopted Egyptian customs during their time of slavery. G-d put our people to a test. The lamb was a sacred animal to the Egyptians and they worshiped it. In the evening of the 14th day of Nisan, the night of the last plaque the Israelites were told to sacrifice a lamb to G-d. The blood of this lamb was to be sprinkled upon their door posts as a sign that this Jewish home was not to be visited by the Angel of Death, he would pass-over it. The meaning of the test is that the Israelites and Egyptians who believed in the sacredness of the lamb and did not trust in G-d would never perform the sacrifice for it would endanger their lives. First was that they still believed in Egyptian customs and second who would protect them from Egyptian anger. Such people were not worthy of being freed by G-d as they did not trust Him.

The "Paschal lamb' has been carried on from generation to generation as a remembrance of the miracles in Egypt and the loyalty our ancestors showed to G-d.

<u>Zman Cheiruseinu</u> - The time of freedom finally came. Out of Egypt into the wilderness and on to the promised land of Canaan went 600,000 Israelite males and their families. They were to become a free people under G-d devoted to his Torah and loyal to their mission.

<u>Chag Ho'ovin</u> - The holiday of Passover ushers in spring trees and flowers again begin to bloom and the air is once more filled with the sweet fragrance of new life. Spring is the symbol of the holiday of Passover, for just as spring symbolizes the rebirth of nature, so the holiday of Passover symbolizes the rebirth of the nation of Israel. Passover symbolizes a fresh start in life for all the Jewish people; a life filled with Torah devotion and good deeds.

<u>Haggadah</u> - is a Hebrew word meaning "telling". It is the title of the book used for the "Seder" service. It tells the story of our people's fight for life and liberty. It reveals the glory of true freedom. It tells us that it is every man's duty in every generation to look upon himself as though he had personally came out of Egypt. Just think if G-d had not taken our ancestors out of Egypt we would still be enslaved there.
