Overview of the Camp

Allen H. Stewart Lion's Camp was founded in 1922 and the Summer School began in 1946. The Summer School features a camp atmosphere for visually impaired students, ages 9 -18, with classes during the day and recreation and social activities each evening.

Nestled in the trees of Casper Mountain at 8,000 ft. elevation, the camp provides both a beautiful outdoor setting as well as the opportunity to advance educational, recreational & career skills for students based on the **Expanded Core Curriculum for Blind and Visually Impaired Students, Including those with Additional Disabilities**, as approved by the National Agenda Steering Committee, Revised November, 2007.



Expanded Core Curriculum (ECC)

- *Orientation and Mobility
- *Social Interaction
- *Independent Living
- *Compensatory/Access Skills
- *Recreation & Leisure, including outdoor skills
- *Career Education
- *Assistive Technology
- *Visual Efficiency
- *Self-Determination

ECC is addressed throughout the week during daily classes, recreational activities, meal and free times, and the social/personal management skills required in this dorm-style living environment.



Students choose from a variety of classes which include: Orientation & Mobility, braille, crafts, pottery, lapidary, music, adaptive P.E., woodworking, cooking, daily living skills, self-advocacy, career exploration, robotics, assistive technology and adaptive recreational opportunities



such as archery.
