


Kondak of the Resurrection – Tone 3

The Reading is from the Letter of the Holy Apostle Paul to the Galatians $1{:}11{-}19$



I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that the gospel I preached is not of human origin. I did not receive it from any man, nor was I taught it; rather, I received it by revelation from Jesus Christ.

For you have heard of my previous way of life in Judaism, how intensely I persecuted the church of God and tried to destroy it. I was advancing in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people and was extremely zealous for the traditions of my fathers. But when God, who set me apart

from my mother's womb and called me by his grace, was pleased to reveal his Son in me so that I might preach him among the Gentiles, my immediate response was not to consult any human being. I did not go up to Jerusalem to see those who were apostles before I was, but I went into Arabia. Later I returned to Damascus.

Then after three years, I went up to Jerusalem to get acquainted with Cephas and stayed with him fifteen days. I saw none of the other apostles—only James, the Lord's brother.

The reading is from the Gospel according to St. Luke 8:26-39



They sailed to the region of the Gerasenes, which is across the lake from Galilee. When Jesus stepped ashore, he was met by a demon-possessed man from the town. For a long time this man had not worn clothes or lived in a house, but had lived in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he cried out and fell at his feet, shouting at the top of his voice, "What do you want with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, don't torture me!" For Jesus had commanded the impure spirit to come out of the man. Many times it had seized him, and though

he was chained hand and foot and kept under guard, he had broken his chains and had been driven by the demon into solitary places.

Jesus asked him, "What is your name?"

"Legion," he replied, because many demons had gone into him. And they begged Jesus repeatedly not to order them to go into the Abyss.

A large herd of pigs was feeding there on the hillside. The demons begged Jesus to let them go into the pigs, and he gave them permission. When the demons came out of the man, they went into the pigs, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned.

When those tending the pigs saw what had happened, they ran off and reported this in the town and countryside, and the people went out to see what had happened. When they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone out, sitting at Jesus' feet, dressed and in his right mind; and they were afraid. Those who had seen it told the people how the demon-possessed man had been cured. Then all the people of the region of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them, because they were overcome with fear. So he got into the boat and left.

The man from whom the demons had gone out begged to go with him, but Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return home and tell how much God has done for you." So the man went away and told all over town how much Jesus had done for him.

Jesus restores the demon-possessed man

In Luke 8:26-39, we read the story of Jesus restoring the demon-possessed man in the region of the Gerasenes. This passage is rich with significance, emphasizing Christ's divine authority, His mercy, and the transformative power of God's love.

1. Christ's Authority Over Evil

From an Orthodox perspective, the encounter reveals Jesus' supreme authority over the forces of evil. In the ancient world, demons symbolized the chaos and corruption that kept people from God. In this story, the Automatical Automatic



demons immediately recognize Christ's divinity, calling Him "Son of the Most High God." This acknowledgment demonstrates that evil, no matter how powerful it seems, is subject to God's authority. For Orthodox Christians, this is a profound reminder of Christ's victory over sin and death through His incarnation, crucifixion, and resurrection.

2. Christ's Compassion and Mercy

Orthodox tradition highlights Christ's profound compassion toward those suffering under the power of evil. The possessed man was isolated, living among tombs, separated from society and loved ones. By restoring him, Jesus brings him back to community and family, representing God's desire to restore all humanity to communion with Him. The story reminds us of the Orthodox understanding that Christ came to heal and renew the whole person—body, mind, and soul—and to restore each of us to our intended image as children of God.

3. Transformation and Witness

After being healed, the man wanted to follow Jesus, but Christ told him instead to return to his home and tell others what God had done for him. This is significant in Orthodox spirituality, as it highlights the call to share our own encounters with Christ. The restored man becomes a witness to God's transformative love, spreading the news of his healing to others. The Orthodox Church sees this as a model for evangelism: our lives transformed by Christ become a testimony to His mercy and power.

4. Symbolism of the Swine and Waters

The demons' request to enter the swine and their subsequent plunge into the sea have symbolic meaning in Orthodox interpretation. Pigs, considered unclean in Jewish culture, represent the impurity of the demonic forces. The water, which represents chaos and evil in the Old Testament, here serves as a cleansing and barrier, showing that God's power overcomes darkness. In Orthodox liturgy, the sea often symbolizes the waters of baptism, through which a person is cleansed and freed from the powers of sin and death. 5. Christ as the True Healer and Deliverer

The man's healing points to the Orthodox belief that only in Christ can we find complete freedom from the grip of sin and spiritual bondage. The Church teaches that healing is not only physical but a holistic restoration to spiritual health. This is why the Orthodox Church practices prayers of exorcism, which affirm that Christ alone has power over the demons and that through Him, believers are offered freedom and peace.

This passage reminds Orthodox Christians of their own journey from darkness to light. In the daily life of the Church, we are called to seek healing and liberation from the passions that bind us and to witness to God's work in our lives. The story of the demoniac is a testament that God's love reaches even the most marginalized, outcast, or troubled person. We are all offered a path to healing and transformation through the mercy of Christ, who seeks to restore us to fullness in Him.



In this month of November, we, the Council of Bishops of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA and Diaspora, solemnly gather to honor the memory of the millions of Ukrainian souls who perished during the Holodomor of 1932-1933, a brutal genocidal famine inflicted by the godless Soviet regime. This tragedy was not merely a famine but a calculated act of oppression—a genocide that sought to erase the spirit, culture, and future of the Ukrainian nation.

As we reflect on this dark chapter of history, we cannot turn a blind eye to the ongoing horrors inflicted upon Ukraine by modern-day Russia. Once again, our people are subject to a campaign of destruction aimed at annihilating not only the Ukrainian land but the essence of life itself in our beloved ancestral homeland. Cities, towns, and villages that once echoed with the laughter of children, the vibrant energy of youth, and the caring presence of the elderly are now torn asunder by the godless forces of oppression. Innocent lives are being sacrificed; the sacred gifts of freedom, dignity, and human worth are being desecrated in the cruelest way imaginable.

In our spiritual center, located in the towns of South Bound Brook and Somerset, New Jersey - we hold the Holodomor Memorial - St. Andrew Ukrainian Orthodox Memorial Church, the first of its kind on international soil, dedicated to the memory of those who perished in the Holodomor. This sacred place, established by the sacrifice and dedication of Ukrainian Americans, stands as an enduring witness to the truth of our history and a testament to our faith and resilience as a people.

As Orthodox Christians, we carry a responsibility to educate the world about the atrocities of the past and present. We must instill in our young people, and in all people - regardless of their background, nationality, or race - a clear understanding of the consequences of hatred, indifference, and unchecked power. Only by remembering can we ensure that such horrors never take root in a free and democratic society.

This November, we call upon all faithful, and all people of goodwill, to pray fervently for the souls lost in the Holodomor and the current war in Ukraine. We urge our communities to speak out, to educate, and to act. Together, we bear witness to the sanctity of life and the enduring power of faith, hope, and love in the face of evil.

May the memory of the innocent never fade. May the strength of our faith inspire a world where such tragedies cease to exist.
