The mission of the summer school staff is to incorporate the Expanded Core Curriculum for visually impaired students into a fun “summer camp” experience in a beautiful setting. STUDENT ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES

1. Student must be visually impaired, as defined by school district or state guidelines, and provide a medical report from his/her eye doctor within the last year with application packet.
2. Student must be between the ages of 9-18, or have special approval from his/her teacher of the visually impaired and the summer school directors if outside that age range.
3. All students must be independent in the care of their basic bodily needs (i.e. toileting, eating, dressing, showering, etc.)
4. Student/guardian/teacher must be able to provide transportation to/from Summer School, arriving and departing at the appropriate times.
5. All applications must be received by June 1st, 2020 and will be accepted in the order they are received.
6. Students must be physically able to stay at the 8,000 feet elevation of Allen H. Stewart Lion's Camp
7. All medical needs must be reviewed on an individual basis by the registered nurse and staff prior to acceptance to Camp. (Please note medical concerns on application and/or director will call if needed.)

****Note: There is no discrimination based on age, sex, national origin or religion****

COST

There is no cost to the student to attend Summer School, other than transportation to/from the Camp. Summer School is funded by the Lions of Wyoming Foundation and the Montgomery Trust Fund.

TRANSPORTATION

All students are asked to furnish their own transportation to the summer school.

- Student needs to arrive between 1:00pm and 3:00 pm on Sunday July 12th, 2020
- Students will depart on Friday, July 17th, 2020 after the “Parents Night Talent Show.” Students may be released at approximately 7:30pm after all activities have concluded. All projects need be picked up and individual dorm spaces must be cleaned prior to departing camp.
- Transportation to-and-from camp might be available for students in some cases.

MEDICATION

Each student *must* bring enough medication for his/her stay at the summer school. Refrigeration is available. No medication is provided. *ALL medication must be checked into the nurse upon arrival Sunday, July 12th, and must be in the original container--including nonprescription pain relievers such as Tylenol, Advil, etc. Please remember EpiPens if applicable as well.*

MONEY

Each student can bring a small amount of spending money to buy pop, candy, snacks or other similar items when they go into Casper for an evening activity. The summer school cannot assume responsibility for money brought to the summer school. Summer school staff can keep student money in an envelope for that student, if preferred.

SELECTION PROCESS

If there are more applicants than space, selection will be based on the following:

- (1) Earliest date of application received
- (2) Need of the applicant for specific vision related services based on discussion with his/her teacher of the visually impaired
- (3) Past attendance at the summer school

Summer School 2020, Class Descriptions

Aids to Daily Living/Cooking: This class introduces students to household and daily living skills. Cooking techniques, using kitchen appliances and utensils safely, and basic meal preparation and clean-up are practiced. Students in this class will also take part in the preparation and serving of dinner on Parent's Night.

Amateur Radio Class: Before the internet or cell phones, there was Amateur Radio. Students will have the opportunity to learn what it is, how it works, how to be a Ham Radio Operator, the Morse Code, and hopefully even have a chance to actually talk to someone in another state or country! It's not only a really fun hobby, its also a great way to help others.

Assistive Technology/Computer: Explore new technology, learn to keyboard or work process, or advance your skills on the Internet or with social networking. This class is for any level of computer user and is student-need based. It includes the use of games, Braille, screen readers or low vision technology to increase computer competency.

Cheerleading: Join the new AHS Cheerleading Team! As a Cheerleader you will promote and spread school spirit! Cheerleading is an exciting sport that builds strength, balance and confidence to lead and encourage your fellow campers to enjoy the day and boost the overall excitement of camp activities using chants, jumps, tumbling and pyramids! Go Lions Go!

Chess: Chess is the classic game that develops spatial thinking and strategies and builds focused concentration. Students in this class will utilize specialized tactile chessboards to learn and play this timeless game. This class is geared for all levels of chess players. Beginners learn basic game rules and opening tactic moves. Intermediate and advanced players may learn sophisticated combinations and strategies and advanced opening moves. Everyone will have fun and gain a new skill set for a lifetime of quality recreation.

Crafts: Crafts of various types will be explored in this general crafts class. Each student will have a project to take home at the end of the week, as well as a great feeling of accomplishment. Perhaps, a new leisure hobby will be discovered.

Digital Photography: Students will be loaned a digital camera for this class and encouraged to explore different aspect of photography. The use of low vision devices will enable students with limited vision to view their work and each student will be given their photos at the end of the week.

Lapidary: One of the favorite classes at Summer School! Lapidary is the art of making beautiful jewelry or projects from rocks and precious stones. Students will complete each step of this process interdependently, from choosing to the stone to mounting the finished product in a setting. Each student will have project to take home at the end of the week.

Creative Writing: Though this is a literacy class for those that utilize both braille and print. Class instruction will include all levels of braille, both reading and writing. Instruction is based on the needs of each individual student and can serve as an introduction to braille or more advanced instruction for the experienced braille student. Students will work on fun and engaging writing assignments.

Music: If you love music, this class is for you!! Discover your hidden talent or bring your favorite instrument to further instruction and have fun. You don't have to be a musician for this class, just enjoy and appreciate any type of music!

Orientation and Mobility: Becoming a safe and efficient traveler is one of life's greatest skills as a visually impaired individual. O & M helps develop or advance skill and confidence in independent travel. Lessons are individualized to meet the needs of each student, and may include residential or business travel in and around Casper. Use of the white cane and low vision aids are taught, but this class is not limited to white cane users.

Outdoor Adventures: If you love camping, hiking and nature, this is the class for you! Learn a new and exciting skill that will help you learn about the wonders of the great outdoors. Acquire the skills necessary to navigate through the wild, build shelters from scratch, and live off the land, all while leaving no trace!

Pottery: Try your hand at a pinch pot, a special creation, or throw some class on the wheel. Pottery class gives exposure and experience to the craft of making things with clay. A kiln in the craft cabin allows you to glaze and fire your project before taking it home.

Recreation/Physical Activity: Individual and group physical activities are experienced in this class—developing strength, confidence and movement. Individual instruction is given to students with special interest. Do you want to ride a tandem bike, play a game with teammates, learn to swing a bat or hike? Any interest in movement makes this a great class!

Robotics: Students in the robotics class will be introduced to exciting world of robotics. Course instruction includes a brief introduction to robot design, development, programming and control systems. Students will learn how robots perform tasks and how they are used in the world today. Students will have the opportunity to design and build with Lego NXT robotic kits as well!!

Transition to adulthood: This will focus on the transition to a post-secondary experience and is a great resource for students entering high school. Whether your plan is college, vocational training or the work force, having a plan for the next few years is critical. This will focus on, mock interviews, filling out an application, resume writing among other topics to help students prepare for their transition to adulthood.

Woodworking/Shop: This class teaches safe use of basic shop and woodworking tools. It incorporates measuring, cutting, painting and other woodworking skills as students construct a special project to take home.

Yoga: Yoga is an excellent way to reinforce spatial and body awareness concepts. Yoga class will promote flexibility, strength and endurance. Yoga will be practiced at a peaceful pace, fostering an environment of deep relaxation.
