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### From the Friends Board President

What is it about a book, or a library for that matter?

Pavlov would love me. Whenever I get around what seems to be an interesting book title I'm drawn to it like iron filings to a magnet.

Some of my earliest memories are of books and libraries. I have a vague recollection of being with my mother and carrying my first checked-out book from a library. I also remember throwing a temper tantrum when my mother said I had to return it. It was

Many of you can recall the names of your elementary school teachers with pride. I can remember a couple of them but Mrs. Wilson, our town librarian, will always hold a special place in my heart. I remember with great pride she once allowed me to go into the stacks and look through all of the town's literary flotsam and jetsam. I remember she said I could have a couple of them and I proudly went home with a near complete (since completed) set of the Literary Digest's History of the First World War. I still have that set. Hoarding? Collecting?

My haunts as a kid were book stores. There were at least two in this small Pennsylvania community because it was a college town. While other kids went to the movies or hung out at the malt shop and later at the chop shop, I hung out in book stores. The only thing that kept me off the weird squad was I played football. One of my proudest moments, as a teenager was when the college library allowed me to check out books as a "townie".

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Fast forward to college and graduate school and there I was spending countless hours not just studying but wandering the stacks and gazing over the literary output of human civilization. I suppose there were some things I wasn't interested in like schematics of steam engines and Bessemer furnaces but I was fascinated by accounts of the "Rocky Mountain College," or the discoveries of the IGY or Moriarty's latest foiled attempt or discussions of paintings on the backs of paintings or mountain wildflowers. It was a great and expansive world and it was limited only by my lack of imagination (and time).

Later, when I decided the West was where I wanted to live, I settled in a small Oregon town named Blue River located about 40 miles west of Eugene where I had gone to graduate school (go Ducks). Those of you who might be a fan of Barry Lopez, another Eastern transplant, might be interested in knowing that he lived in Finn Rock, a small place about five miles from Blue River. You might also wonder what this has to do with books and libraries. Well, there was a resident of the town, a lady named Mrs. O'Brian, who was a retired school librarian. She was appalled that the residents of Blue River had to travel all the way to Eugene to go to the library. So she started her own. And she demanded that certain protocols were to be followed if one was to use the library. First, you had

## From Your Librarian

#### **MARCHING ON!**

We are happy to announce that the Board of Supervisors approved a contract which will bring broadband connectivity to the Main Library in San Andreas and four of our branches. Arnold, Murphys, Angels Camp and Valley Springs will soon enjoy much faster Internet speeds made possible by a California State Library grant of \$90,000.00 which enables us to purchase the hardware and circuits we need to deliver broadband to these locations. The Califa group, a consortium of 220 library systems in California will work with the Corporation for Educational Network Initiatives in California (CENIC) to connect Calaveras County Library to the California Research and Education Network (CalREN.) This network is a dedicated high-speed fiber network which serves schools, universities and libraries in California.

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Lots of acronyms, I know, but I wanted to give you the full picture in case you want to look up any of those we will be working with and supported by in the project.



The San Andreas/Mountain Ranch Friends have taken on the project of redecorating the children's section of the main library. Local artists Lori Kelly and her husband, Pete, will be painting a mural that will have a fantasy literature theme. They will be incorporating some interactive features into the mural. Nancy wants to rearrange the area to make it more child-friendly and liven it up with color and activity centers. We are excited about participating in this project and will be raising funds to finance it.

Also coming soon – we hope –is a free Interlibrary Loan system which will enable our library patrons to borrow books from more than 80 library systems in California. This is another program made possible by the generosity of our California State Library. When we go live with this program, you will find a link to the site LINK+. Once connected, you can look for books and order them online. The requests

will be filled, the books delivered to San Andreas and then on to you! Library systems included in the program are Sacramento Public, Fresno Public, many CSU libraries, as well as Loma Linda University, Occidental College and many more.

With the large, diverse geographical area Calaveras County encompasses our branch libraries are a necessity to serve our patrons.

Maintaining and improving our libraries is one of the areas of focus for your Library Commission.

to find something you wanted to read, then you took it home and when you were finished you returned it, unless you had a friend who wanted to read it and then you could pass it on to them. It was expected that the book would eventually come back to the library. She started the library in the front room of her house. There it remained until the community of Blue River built her a building to house her expanding collection. Her work received international attention and she received donations from all over the world including books from the Emperor of Japan. The only other policy along with her circulation policy was the building was never to be locked and you had to turn off the lights when you finished.

Fast forward to Calaveras County. A lot of time and experiences intervened but my wife Judy and I eventually wound up here partly because there was the same community feel that I had in Oregon, there was a minor literary connection and the sun shone in the winter. You can't imagine how important that was. By the way I met my wife Judy- struck up a conversation actually, because she happened to be carrying a book and I was curious about the title and why she was carrying it. I spent a lot of time on the road, we still had to make a living, and it was a great opportunity to visit bookstores.

As things began to wind down and I became more engaged with the community, I was appointed to the Library Commission by Steve Willinsky. This was the beginning of my involvement with the Calaveras County Library system.

The rest is recent history and you're all acquainted with that history since it's a shared experience.

Books and libraries have been a major influence on my life. Any good that has come from my contributions can be attributed to the influence that books and libraries have had on me. I suppose this also goes a long way in explaining the passion I have for the importance of books and libraries. Nowadays libraries are more than books. We have the Internet, IT, digital this and that, kids teaching adults modern life skills (Teens for Tech), Wi-Fi, and who knows what else is coming. But they're still libraries.

Libraries are alive with opportunities for those who want to seize them and open to anyone with a curiosity about what's around the corner or over the next hill. This curiosity is one of the fundamental aspects that make us human and makes the existence of libraries a necessity.

I wanted to share some of the influences that fuel my belief in and love of books and libraries. This is my story. You each have one and it's your source of passion. It's these stories, some shared some not, that bring us together to support our library system. It's why we volunteer and ask for no recognition. It's why we join our Friends groups. It's why we give rather than take. It feels good because we know we're doing the right thing for the right reasons.

I can say that I'm proud to be part of such a great, selfless group of people whose interests are so important to our shared community values.

Right now, there is a lot of uncertainty about what the future might hold. For me, a significant anchor will be our library because it represents the repository of human experience. It's the reference section for solutions to human folly. Most of all, it's the opportunity for like-minded people to come together. People who have a shared experience, passion and commitment. People who want to keep the light, which is our library, turned on.

**Visit your local library**: Don't have room for all the books your children will love? Your local library has a children's library containing books, books on tape, books on CD, movies and so much more. You and your children can spend time looking through our books or borrow them – for free.

## Book Review by Suzanne Murphys

**Last Bus to Wisdom** by Ivan Doig Publish Date: 2015 by Riverhead Books

#### What I Did On My Summer Vacation

Before he is "11, going on 12," Donal Coleman has experienced quite a bit of moving around. His parents are killed in a car accident, just as things are looking up financially for the family, so he goes to stay with his Gram, a cook on a Montana ranch. Even though it isn't easy and they have to be careful with their pennies, the irascible grandmother and mischief-seeking boy establish a close, loving relationship and enjoy each other's company. Then, of course, life throws Donny another screwball.

That summer Gram needs surgery, and he can't stay on the ranch, so he travels east by Greyhound (the "dog" bus) to stay with his only other living relatives in Wisconsin. As would be normal for any boy traveling by himself on a bus in 1951, he meets a variety of characters, misses a bus, and loses something important. Without any real adult supervision, Donny must use his wits constantly to negotiate the mysterious territory of the adult world, with all its trickery.

When Donny and his great-aunt Kate don't see eye to

eye on practically anything, he is shipped back to Montana. Kate's husband Herman, who is an aficionado of all things cowboy and Indian, hops on the same bus to go on an adventure out West, without telling Kate.

And what an adventure Donny and Herman have. The two "podners" get involved in all sorts of escapades with rodeo stars, Crow Indians, and hoboes. Characters'

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stories unwind with a sense of realism that reveal their shortcomings as well as their virtues. While there is a great deal of hilarity involved, the author treats memorable characters with respect, and Donny's experiences teach him about how life works.

This is an unapologetic coming-of-age tale that hums with humor and dead-on language from the 1950s. It is a story told from ranches and the town of Wisdom (population 98 in 2010) under the big Montana skies. Author Doig invented a young narrator who immediately engages readers with a tale that could have happened, or most certainly should have.
