Editor's note: Don't forget to pack the kids



When I first visited Scotland in 1975, I was scarcely able to disengage myself from work long enough to go to the Philadelphia airport. I arrived in Glasgow with a passport, traveler's checks, and a suitcase stuffed full of damp clothes yanked from the dryer at home. This lack of planning could

have led to a difficult trip, but I was saved by the infinitely warm hospitality of the Scottish B&B proprietors I encountered, and the deft management of the Scottish Tourist Board. I mailed my damp clothes home and let Scotland tell me what to do. It was a serene and wonderful vacation.

So in 1995 I decided that my son and daughter, 12 and 10 years old respectively, should not have to wait until they were adults to find out that they were citizens of this world, and that they should get out there and see it. So we planned a late summer trip to Scotland that had us returning on Labor Day, and departed with an ambitious itinerary and backpacks filled with dry clothes.

Any parents who have had the opportunity to travel with their children don't need me to remind them that it's a lot like herding ducks. You very quickly realize that whatever agenda you may have devised by yourself is going to be adjusted on a daily basis – consciously or unconsciously – by the kids. But the things they add to the mix will be the heart of your journey.

The smartest thing I did was to give them each a disposable camera and a journal, and make sure they had time to work with these tools without my interference. My daughter's daily

assessment of squeaky beds, strange foods, gigantic snails on the streets of Dunvegan, and even the Culloden battlefield are family treasures to keep forever. (And who needs photographs of the Scottish landscape when you can have live shots of snails?)

Early on, serenity was replaced by high drama. Someone told them what the ingredients were in haggis, and they wouldn't eat anything in Scotland for over 24 hours. (I finally broke down and we went to Burger King.) We discovered "Waterworld", the public pool in Leith, packed with water features and overflowing with squealing kids from all walks of life. And then there was the train station in Perth, where the two of them were arguing and behaving so badly I was too embarrassed to intervene. I just moved about 30 feet down the train platform and pretended not to know who they were. Finally, I lost my passport – it wasn't my fault! – but it was an interesting experience trying to get back into the United States.

Looking back, my favorite memory is the feeling of being together, hunkering down in our "family room" in the B&B at night, drinking tea, and feeling very connected to each other. We were safe and comfortable but still unsettled by this strange and friendly place. So if you have the opportunity, take a young MacLeod to Scotland. Be assured it will be more than a memorable experience for both of you, and a lot more adventurous than going by yourself. Just be prepared to learn to love snails – and stay clear of Perth.



Where were you when the lights went out on June 29th?

According to the National Weather Service, a "derecho" is defined as a widespread and long-lived wind storm that accompanies rapidly moving showers or thunderstorms. The most severe derechos are given the adjective "super."

A "super derecho" of violent thunderstorms left a more than 700-mile trail of destruction across the Midwest and mid-Atlantic on Friday June 29, cutting power to millions and killing at least 26 people. This storm was especially severe because of the triple digit temperatures in the greater Washington, DC area.

It still seems odd that we didn't receive any warning about the on-coming storm, despite the fact that it was being covered on radio and TV. After an enjoyable riverboat ride (with no radio or TV), a group of nine of us decided to walk back to the hotel rather than burden the hotel shuttle. There was a lot of "heat lighting" above, but no down strikes or thunder to warn us of what was about to happen.

We were within about four blocks of the hotel when we suddenly heard and saw the wall of wind bearing down on us, only about 100 yards away. There was absolutely no shelter – we were on North Fairfax, between Madison and Montgomery, a small business district buttoned up for the evening. Romma, JDK, and I flattened ourselves against a building and tried to protect our eyes; Sarah Piepgrass, three Canadian cousins, a young woman from Washington, and Ruth MacLeod from Australia felt their way down the street and found a portico large enough for a car – and deep enough for us to get out of the wind. Sarah herded us all in, and then we just watched the front blow by, followed by very heavy rain. The lights went out early on, and the wail of emergency vehicle sirens was constant.

After maybe an hour, Ruth broke rank and set off for the hotel, with the rest of us puddle jumping behind her. Little did we know that the next few days would give us some tough lessons in patience and urban survival.

My story is not that big a deal, I was just lucky to have the van so I could drive Grandma, Jesse Mary, Margaret, Mac and Chief John back to the hotel [following the riverboat event], thinking I was going to take the Chief on a night tour of the monuments. Personal Reflections by Scott MacLeod from the CMS USA 2011 AGM

As a rather unusual submission to the Newsletter, the Pacific Region would like to share the following piece by Scott MacLeod. Scott served as a speaker for the 2011 AGM held in California. He piped for us as well, and explored some of the MacCrimmon piping history. These are excerpts only from his presentation, reproduced with his kind permission. I chose these segments because his personal reflections were definitely a hit with all those who attended. Scott has recently posted a full text of the speech as a blogpost http://scottmacleod.com/piping.htm.

Scott further connected with us at the Pleasanton Scottish Games this September, and shared his piping with those of us at the tent and surrounding areas. – Tammie Vawter, RVP Pacific Region

How did I start to play the bag pipes?

I was playing the piano from 6- 12 and was struggling a little with my mother about practicing, - and she said if I stopped playing the piano, I had to choose another instrument, so I chose the bagpipe, thinking she might not be able to find a teacher for this. So at my father's suggestion, I think, I wrote to Dame Flora MacLeod of MacLeod on the Isle of Skye around 1972, to ask how she would suggest beginning to play.

And surprisingly for a little 12 year old Yankee from Connecticut, she wrote back and said.

"Why don't you contact Seamus MacNeill [who began the College of Piping in 1944] ..." whom I think Dame Flora knew. I think we may still have this letter from Dame Flora MacLeod of MacLeod.

In Scotland, as a young piper

About 2 years later, I went to Edinburgh, Scotland to study at Fettes College, and was a good enough piper to play in the school pipe band. Because I was to be in the Pipe Band, I was also assigned to the NCO Cadre, which was nominally for budding officers ... Kids at Fettes paraded around the campus on Wednesday afternoons, and I, coming out of liberal American [educational traditions], and who had no experience in this kind of kind of normal British 'ROTC / military training' for kids in high school, was assigned to the Officers' Corps – the NCO Cadre. Marching like this was a little bit strange for a kid without experience, but it was good training for being a MacLeod, piping in the Fettes College pipe band. I think it was during the mid-70s that I first became a member of the Clan MacLeod Society for a few years. I recall receiving the magazine.

That spring of 1977, I went up to the Isle of Skye and Dunvegan Castle, and saw our ancestral seat at Dunvegan for the first time in my life. My parents had been there for their honeymoon in 1957. But I didn't see Dame Flora who had written back to me just a few years earlier.

While at Fettes, we were required to go to church, and because I didn't have a suit, but did have a kilt, and this was Scotland, I could wear this instead. I suppose this is an example of being a thrifty Scot.

A UNESCO grant to study bag piping

I returned to Scotland in the spring of 1982 on a ZIS stipendium (a monetary grant for college students to student something of their choosing from UNESCO – United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) to study "Bag piping in Scotland" for which I received something like the equivalent of \$800 to get to and from Munich, West Germany, where I was studying at the University of Munich.

This bag piping paper, written by me as a 21 year old MacLeod, is still in Schloss Salem, which is an old castle and one of the few private Gymnasiums, or high schools, in Germany, and which is the library for all such ZIS, student papers ...

On this trip to Scotland from Munich, I both took a workshop and also went to the Isle of Skye again. When I arrived on the bus at Dunvegan, I saw John MacLeod of MacLeod in the arrival area, but being a little too shy to go up and meet him, I perhaps missed an opportunity.

I lived in Scotland in 2003-2004 studying at the University of Edinburgh in the School of Celtic and Scottish Studies on the very picturesque George Square at the University of Edinburgh.

My focus of study in Edinburgh was St. Kilda, the island archipelago off the west coast of Scotland, for which the MacLeods were the factors, or tax-collectors. I was interested in studying St. Kilda as a kind of virtual place on the world wide web, which people could visit at the National Trust for Scotland's web site. I wanted to think through whether people were actually visiting a virtual site via the internet as place.

Reminiscences of St. Kilda

So when I went to visit actual St. Kilda, which is the largest island archipelago at the greatest distance from Britain, which you can only get to by hiring a boat, I also went to Dunvegan Castle again, for the 3rd time.

There's no ferry or anything to St. Kilda, it's so remote. St. Kildans, many MacLeods included, were birders. They made their living by rappelling from the steep cliffs of St. Kilda, and capturing Gannets, Puffins and Fulmars, by hand I think – at least back 2000 or so years.

And St. Kilda was evacuated by the British government in 1930, when its population had dwindled to around 30 people. At its most populous, St. Kildans numbered around 180 in the late 1700s. What the MacLeods, as factors, came over a rough sea annually to collect was a share of these oily birds. (You can read this paper here -

So, in going to Skye this time, I had the good fortune of meeting John MacLeod of MacLeod, and of sitting and talking with him in the living room at Dunvegan, of talking about Dame Flora, and of hearing of all the records of St. Kilda in Dunvegan, something for future possible study.

We received the good news in September that Nominating Committee Chair **Don Mack**'s surgery to install a pacemaker has been successful, and he is recovering at home. If you want to wish him well, he can be reached at his address on page 3.

FLOWERS OF THE FOREST

Muriel Ethel (MacLeod) Carles 1925 - 2011

Laura Margaret was born in Hamilton Township, Ontario, Canada. She attended the University of Toronto, graduating with a degree in sociology. She later became a Chartered Accountant in Canada.

She moved to New York where she was one of the first women CPAs in the country. She was associated with the hotel accounting firm then known as Harris, Kerr, Forster, and first met the family when she became the resident auditor of the Croydon Hotel. She later worked for over 20 years at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. After retiring from the Museum, she again worked for the family as a resident auditor at the Hotel Delmonico.

Ms. McLeod was a gifted musician and a founder of the Clan MacLeod Society. She is survived by two sisters and a nephew. She is mourned by the Korein family. With thanks to her caregiver Clevet Veronica Sam.



Thinking of September 30th:

As I sit here on September 30th, thinking of the article to write, my mind draws to a couple historic events that occurred on this particular day. The first and most important is that it is my wedding anniversary. This year- my wife (Sara) and I celebrate 17 years of marriage. This is one of the happiest days I will ever know.

The other historical event that my mind is drawn to for this special day is one in Scotland's history. On this day, a big storm struck Scotland in 1263 during the Battle of Largs and turned the tables on Norwegian forces in a battle against the Scots. Despite the Scots victory at Renfrew in 1164, and several campaigns by Scottish kings to conquer the territory, the Norse had retained control of the Isles and Argyll. There they maintained their control under the over lordship of the kings of Norway. The Battle of Largs is not one many folks talk about, and in some peoples mind, not all that significant in the scheme of all the battles in Scotland - - as there were quite a few. This battle was one of the key events prior to Scotland regaining some of its control from The Norwegian Kings.

This battle was pitched between Scottish King Alexander II (along with his son Alexander III); and the King of Norway Hakon Hakonarson. Some historians say that King Alexander II tried to purchase the Western Isles and Kintyre from the Norwegian King several time and each time he refused. So like any good strong willed Scot, King Alexander and his son launched an attack on them, in hopes to reclaim the territory they felt was rightfully theirs. Hakon launched a fleet from Norway(some 200 ships) to the Hebrides. By the end of September, his fleet occupied the Firth of Clyde, where he anchored many of his fleet around the Ayrshire coast. On September 30th when a gale hit Scotland, many of Hakon's ships were destroyed and sank.

The fighting ensued on the beaches and mounds, where each side recaptured their respective grounds. The Scots forced the Norwegian force back to their ships, where more fighting occurred and the Norwegians were forced to submit to the Scots. The Norwegian force now demoralized and defeated, turned tail and fled, and Hakon planned on returning the next summer to re-engage the Scots. Unfortunately during the winter in Orkney, King Hakon died and was succeeded by King Magnus VI. Three years after the battle, King Magnus wanted to bring about peace so he ended the dispute between the two kingdoms and ceded Scotland's western Isles and Kintyre back to Scotland and King Alexander III and on July 2, 1266 the two kings signed the Treaty of Perth. In the Treaty Scotland would compensate Norway with a sum of 4,000 marks, together

with an annual fee of 100 marks payable in perpetuity along with Norway keeping Orkney and Shetland.

Like all good frugal Scots – we were a bit slow in letting go of our money and paying up. The last installment of the 4,000 mark payment did not reach Norway until 1282. It is not known exactly when the annual payments were suspended, but the Norwegians are known to have had difficulties collecting the money owed during the 14th and 15th centuries. The debts were eventually written off as part of the marriage agreement between King James III and Margaret of Denmark (and Norway) in 1468, which ceded Orkney and Shetland back to the Scottish crown.
