BUILDINGS & GROUNDS

Over the past two months we have had three major heating and air-conditioning problems develop.

- The air-conditioning for the kitchen and restrooms stopped working and needs to be replaced.
- The heating and air-conditioning system in the office area needs repairs. The heat does not consistently work.
- There is water in the underground oil tank located near the cemetery. This means that we need to replace the oil tank with an above ground tank and remove the old underground tank.

At the voters meeting on December 15, 2020, the congregation voted to move forward on these projects. We will rely on funding from the 2020 and 2021 budgets and congregational donations.

- Heating and air-conditioning in the office area was repaired on November 17, 2020, with funds from the operating budget.
- We have received proposals to replace the air conditioning system for the kitchen and restroom areas. The lowest proposal that was received is in the amount of \$4,400.
- The new above ground oil tank was installed on November 19, 2020. The installer filled the new above ground oil tank with oil, serviced the boiler, and started the boilers for the winter season.
- Paperwork to remove the old underground oil tank was filed with the Maryland Department of Environment and December 10th, has been tentatively scheduled for the removal of the old oil tank.

Phase I, Installing the new oil tank and the associated work with pumping out the old tank cost is \$3100.

Phase II, Removal and disposal of the old oil tank and site restoration cost is \$3,950. The total cost for both phases is \$7,050.

If you can contribute to help cover the cost of the oil tank project, it would be greatly appreciated. Please mark your contribution as "Oil Tank project".

On a brighter note, I would like to thank Joel Solberg for cutting the grass full-time this past year. Brett Wiggin has offered to help maintain the church grounds this coming year by cutting the grass. Joel has offered to be the backup grass cutter.

I would like to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

- <u>Sunday School Christmas Tree</u> Our kids decorated our Christmas tree this past Sunday with a tree full of great Christmas nativity ornaments. It is always a fun activity and this year it even felt a little more Christmassy as we decorated the tree in front of the open door to increase ventilation. It was definitely a bit chilly outside. Hand sanitizer, masks, open windows and social distancing are the name of the game this year. But if it keeps everyone safe and allows us to keep God's word being taught, then Amen!
- <u>Advent Wreath</u> Our Sunday School classes will be taking turns lighting the Advent wreath prior to the beginning of our 10:30 AM worship service during the 4 weeks of Advent.

• **Christmas Program** - We could not hold our regular Christmas program this year because of COVID restrictions on the number of people in church at one time and worries about the safety for our kids during practices. STEWARDSHIP

As most of you know, our church is in need of our help again. We have had to replace our oil tank and also have to pay to remove the old oil tank as well. The initial bill is around \$7,000.00. So it is time for us to go to God and ask him to help us to help our church. As I was thinking about how to inspire our congregation in this next fundraiser, I went to my bible. I looked up every verse that spoke about oil and immediately found God's inspiration in the Old Testament story of a widow that had her own debts that she was not sure how she was going to pay. She, too, went to God.

2 Kings 4:1-7 - The Widow's Oil

A widow cried out to Elisha as her late husband's debt collectors were coming to take her two sons as slaves to pay the debts. She explained that the only thing she had was "a little oil." Elisha instructed her to go to her neighbors and gather all the empty oil jars that she could. She was then told to go back to her house and take the little bit of oil she had and fill as many jars as possible. She filled every jar until her sons told her there were no

more to fill. She went and told Elisha, and he said, "Go, sell the oil and pay your debts."

In this story, God again directs one of his children to trust Him that the little they have will always be enough as long as we simply follow Him. Whenever God's people have needed Him, He is always there. I have no doubt that the little congregation of St. Paul's Lutheran Church will be no different. It is important for us to be there to take care of God's people and His house, the Church.

To do this, I am hoping that everyone will participate in this new bulletin board fundraiser. To get involved, everyone simply needs to take one of the little brown envelopes from the bulletin board in the main entry and use it to make a donation. Your donation should come from your heart and be as much as God moves you to donate to help cover the costs of the Church's bills to replace and remove our old oil tank (\$7,000.00). No amount is too small. Place



the envelope in the collection plate or mail it to the church office. For money raised, an oil jar will be added to the board to represent the empty jars we bring to God to have him fill for us as we pay our debts for our new oil tank. The more money raised, the more Oil of Joy jars that will be added to the board.

And I am so proud and inspired that to date, two weeks into the fundraiser, **we have already raised \$980.00!** So keep your trust in God, that He will inspire and motivate us to do the most with what may seem like so little as we all come together, again, to take care of God's house. Thank you already for your support, and let's fill the board up with our own Oil of Joy jars!

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<u>1) Give God one very special gift just from you to him.</u> Let this gift be something personal that no one else needs to know about, and let it be a sacrifice. David said in <u>2 Samuel</u> 24 that he would not offer a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing. Maybe your gift to God will be to <u>forgive someone</u> you've needed to forgive for a long time. You may discover that you've given a gift back to yourself. Lewis B. Smedes wrote in his book, *Forgive and Forget*, "When you release the wrongdoer from the wrong, you cut a malignant tumor out of your inner life. You set a prisoner free, but you discover that the real prisoner was yourself." Perhaps your gift will be to commit to <u>spending time with God daily</u>. Or maybe there is something God has asked you to give up. Make this your most important gift of the season.

2) Set aside a special time to read the Christmas story in Luke 1:5-56 through 2:1-20.

3) Set up a Nativity scene in your home.

4) *Plan a project of good will this Christmas.* Adopt a single mom for Christmas. Do you have an elderly neighbor in need of home repairs or yard work? Find someone with a genuine need, involve your whole family, and see how *happy you can make him or her this Christmas*.

5) *Give a surprise gift of service to each member of your family.* Jesus taught us to serve by washing <u>the</u> <u>disciples</u> feet. He also taught us that it is "*more blessed to give than to receive.*" Acts 20:35 (NIV) Giving an unexpected gift of service to members of your family demonstrates Christ-like love and service. You might consider giving a back rub to your spouse, running an errand for your brother, or cleaning out a closet for your mother. Make it personal and meaningful and watch the blessings multiply.

<u>6) Set aside a time of family devotions on Christmas Eve or Christmas morning.</u> Before opening the gifts, take a few minutes to gather together as a family in prayer and devotions. Read a few Bible verses and discuss as a family the <u>true meaning of Christmas.</u>

<u>7) Attend a Christmas church service together with your family.</u> If you are alone this Christmas or don't have family living near you, invite a friend or a neighbor to join you.

<u>8) Send Christmas cards that convey a spiritual message</u>. This is an easy way to share your faith at Christmastime. If you've already bought the reindeer cards—no problem! Just write a Bible verse and include a personal message with each card.
